## Two Are Charged With Car Theft

SUMMERSIDE — Francis Elmer Champion, Glover's Shore, Summerside, and Allan Joseph Cormier, St. Eleanor's, appeared before Magistrate W. Chester S. MacDonald in county court yesterday on separate charges of theft of a motor vehicle. They are charged with theft of a 1965 Vauxhall, the property of A. E. MacLennan Ltd., Summerside.

After electing trial by magistrate, Champion pleaded guilty to the charge. The accused was remanded in custody till July 7 for sentencing.

Cormier pleaded not guilty to the offence after electing trial by magistrate. The case was adjourned till July 7.

Gerald Dymet, Springhill, N.S., and Joseph M. Arsenault, Summerside, each pleaded guilty to impaired driving charges. The Dymet case was set over to August 4 for sentencing and Arsenault was assessed a fine of \$75 and costs of 10 days. OTTAWA (CP) — Ottawa Rough Riders have a few lineup holes and a number of empty spectator seats to fill for the approaching Canadian Football League season but Coach Frank Clair and General Manager Red O'Quinn are confident both will be filled by the time the season opens.

The Riders have one of the smallest training camps in recent years with only 52 players and Clair expects to cut seven or eight after Thursday's intra-squad game.

"We didn't have to do a full recruiting job this year," the veteran coach said in an interview. "Our offensive backfield is pretty well set. Most of the players we brought in were for the interior line."

O'Quinn has had some problems in the contract department but his major concern is selling tickets. With a late fall start on construction of a new grandstand arena project, the Riders will have to go on the road for any playoff contests.

The prospect of having to travel to see playoffs could hurt home crowds this season. But an even stronger threat to the gate is the Riders' past record of three consecutive second-place finishes and losses to Hamilton Tiger-Cats in the Eastern Conference final.

**CAN DISCUSS BOMBING**

It is typically found in the middle aged family man. She ceals a considerable length with the alcoholic's family and particularly with the wife, who she said, often suffers with emotional problems of her own and will require treatment herself, if she is to become re-adjusted.

On the treatment of alcoholism, Sister Mary Henry said that the future looked brighter on P.E.I. with the decision made to establish a center for the early treatment of alcoholics at the former St. Vincent's Orphanage property on the Malpeque Road. The building, she said, will be re-named to reflect its new function.

**NON-DENOMINATIONAL**  
The new center will operate on a non-denominational basis through a board of governors and an application for an Act of Incorporation will be sought during the 1967 sitting of the Provincial Legislature. The center will be started by a manager, a field worker, three attendants and a cook and it is hoped that financial assistance will be forthcoming from both the provincial and federal governments. Financial support from the general public, she added, will be required for capital assistance and supplies.

Present plans, she noted, call for the centre to be opened in early September.

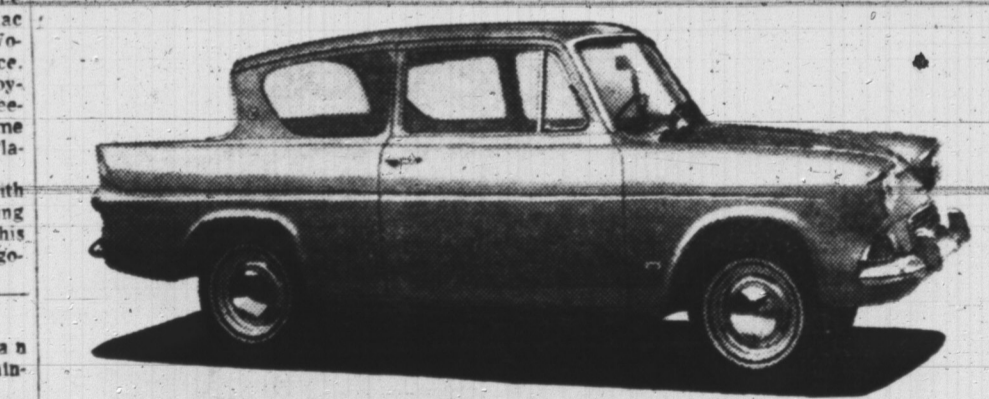
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
