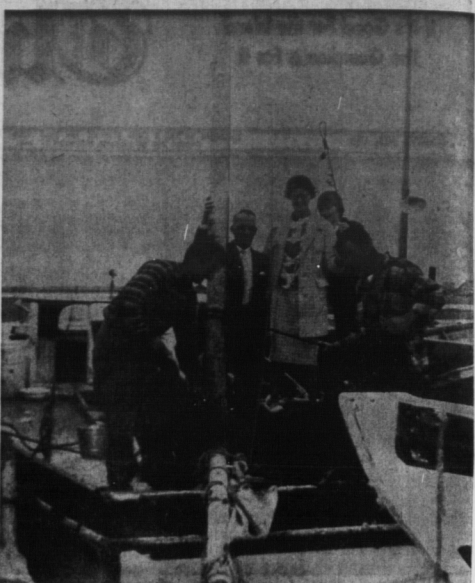


Barn Damaged By Fire As 470 Chickens Lost

Typhoon Rain Floods Japan

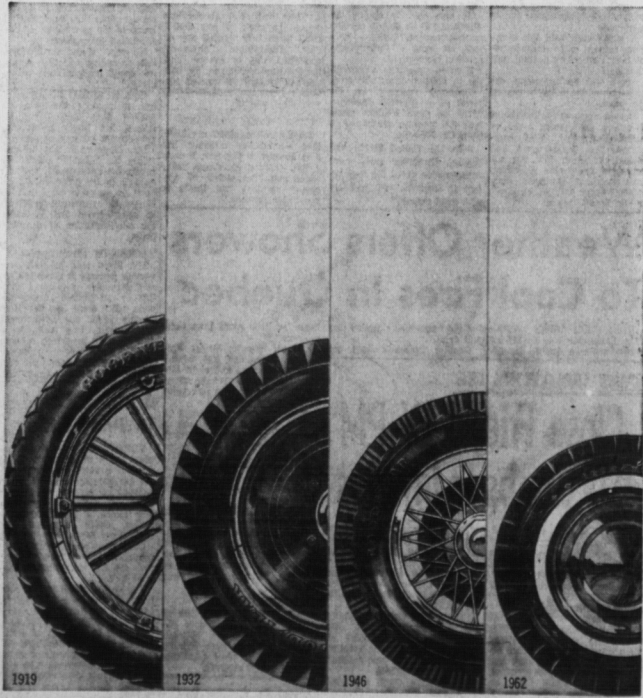
TOKYO — Floods and landslides in southern Japan triggered by violent monsoon rains during the weekend have left at least 46 persons dead and injured.

57 Injured. Nineteen persons are missing.

About 40,000 homes were destroyed or damaged, police said today.

While the rains had diminished this morning, weather officials warned of new downpours if Typhoon Joan nears Japan.

Joan's centre was located 175 miles south of Okinawa at 9 p.m. Sunday, moving northwest at nine miles an hour.



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
