DEATH OF AN ISLANDER.—Mr. Duncan McLaughlin, a native of P. E. Island, a tanner and carrier by trade, died very suddenly at Sackville on Saturday last, from congestion. McLaughlin was in the employ of Mr. Abner Smith, tanner and shoe manufacturer of Sackville. He was highly respected. He was about 60 years of age and unmarried.

A LIVELY OLD MAN.—St. John has a fisherman who can hold his own with any man in the province, says the Sun. He is 83 years of age, and is still able to go out in his boat every tide, that is twice in twenty-four hours. He and his mate were in the market slip yesterday afternoon, with about 2,000 gaspereaux and a couple of hundred shad, the result of one day's fishing.

GOT TWO YEARS.—John Canning, aged nineteen years, arrested at Parrsboro some time ago for stealing a gold watch and chain, was on Tuesday sentenced to two years in the penitentiary at Dorchester for the crime. Canning stole the watch while drunk, and as soon as he realized his crime was taking it back to the owner when arrested.

CRUELTY.—About seven o'clock last evening a pedlar's wagon, driven by a man very much under the influence of liquor, came to a sudden halt, the teamster being thrown therefrom and the wheels of the vehicle passing over his right arm. The poor horse was more an object of pity than the man, it being lacerated on the hips, exposing portions of raw flesh. Such cruelty should be punished.

REGENT SHIPMENTS.—The Farmer says: Part of the cargo of the Northumberland on Tuesday was 128 barrels of oysters and a consignment of live hens, the latter going to Lexington, Mass. On Wednesday Mr. W. K. McKay, of this town, sent away two very fine drivers for Messrs. Leaman and Whitman Halifax. Mr. Burgess also took away three horses for St. John and Mrs. James Barnard shipped another. Mr. John Layden also shipped 18 fat cattle. On the same day 232 barrels of oysters formed part of the Northumberland's cargo.

LIKES THE COUNTRY.—Mr. Frank Darke, who went to Regina, N. W. T. this spring, has returned home for his sisters, who are going to accompany him to his new home. Mr. Darke has along with Mr. Pope Balderston, formerly of North Wiltshire, seeded 175 acres of wheat this spring, he having rented a farm all prepared for the crop. This farm yielded about 52 bushels of No. 1 seed last year. The crops are now doing finely and the prospects for an abundant harvest were never better. There is plenty of moisture in the ground and the magnificent weather they are now having, makes an abundant crop almost a certainty. The weather was something backward there as well as here in the early part of the season, but lately has been magnificent. Mr. Darke is delighted with his new home and intends going into stock raising and doing a butcher business as well.

DOMINION PARLIAMENT.

House of Commons.

Hon. Messrs. Bowell and Foster off for Washington.

OTTAWA, June 2.

In the House of Commons yesterday, the debate on the redistribution bill was continued. A number of Quebec members spoke for and against it.

Hon. Mr. Bowell and Hon. Mr. Foster have gone to Washington. It is understood that they go at the request of Mr. Blaine to discuss, personally, certain matters which were left over at the February conference, chiefly in reference to the details respecting the mutual right in Canadian and United States internal navigation.

Behring Sea Arbitration.

Sir John Thompson One of the British Arbitrators.

Hon. Mr. Tupper to Prepare the British Case.

MONTREAL, June 2.

The Star's cable from London says that Great Britain's acceptance of Sir John Thompson as one of the British Arbitrators in connection with the Behring Sea arbitration gives satisfaction. An eminent jurist will be chosen as another British arbitrator, while an eminent advocate, probably a member of the British Government, will be selected as the British advocate.

OTTAWA, June 2.

Hon. Mr. Tupper has been nominated by the Imperial authorities as their agent to prepare the British case before the Behring Sea arbitration. This will necessitate Tupper's leaving for England before the end of the session.

The Canadian Fisheries.

(Daily Bulletin.)

HALIFAX, June 1.

Nova Scotia.—The cod fishing has been good to-day at Digby, Liverpool and Point Medway; fair at Lockport, Lunenburg and Canso; but poor at Port Latour. At Whitehead some boats had 200 mackerel, while they are fair at Lunenburg, poor at Liverpool and a sprinkling at Port Latour. Lobsters are good at Digby, fair at Lockport and Port Medway; but poor at Port Latour, Liverpool, Lunenburg, Whitehead and Canso. Herring good at Lockport and Whitehead. Herring and mackerel are reported struck off at Liverpool. Haddock fair at Lockport, Lunenburg, and a few at Port Latour. Haddock fair at Digby and light catches of halibut and hake at Lockport. Gaspereaux fair at Port Latour and Liverpool and a few at Port Medway. Also a few salmon at Port Medway and Canso, C. R. Cod fair at Arichat, Ingonish, Cheticamp and Mabou; but light at St. Peters and Lunenburg. Mackerel fair at Lunenburg and a few at St. Peters and Ingonish, while at Peit Degrat some netters had 200 per man. Lobsters fair at St. Peters, Arichat, Cheticamp and Mabou, but poor at Lunenburg and Ingonish. The catch of haddock is light today at St. Peters and Ingonish, as well as of gaspereaux at Ingonish and Mabou. All kinds of fish are scarce at Port Hood.

P. E. Island.—Cod and lobsters very plentiful from North Cape to westward of Island, and are improving to eastward, where the catch has been light during the past week. Cod are fair at Georgetown and Malpeque, and a few lobsters at Georgetown. Luncheon fair and a few herring at Malpeque and Georgetown, respectively.

Magdalen Islands.—Cod good, lobsters fair, and a few mackerel and haddock. New Brunswick.—Sardines good, cod and haddock fair at Campobello. Lobsters good and a few salmon at Point Escuminac. Quebec.—Cod good at Newport Point, Grand River and Perce, and fair at Paspébiac. Herring good at Newport Point and Perce, poor at Grand River and a sufficient supply at Paspébiac for bait. Lobsters good at Newport Point, fair at Perce, but poor at Grand River. Salmon reported fair at Gaspe. Ice procurable at Digby, Lockport, Canso and Georgetown.
