SPECIAL DESPATCHES TO THE EXAMINER AN EXTRAORDINARY STORY

An Islander Mixed Up in a Case of Forgery.

GLOUCESTER, Mass., March 30. The cashier of the City National Bank last night said that on March 14th they received a telegram from the First National Bank of San Francisco asking if a draft for \$50, drawn by Allan L. McDonald, would be honored. A reply in the affirmative was sent. On March 22nd the draft was received and paid. On the 23rd another similar dispatch came from the same source. Then he surmised that a forgery had been perpetrated. Inquiry was made and it was found that Allan L. McDonald, whose name was on the forged paper, was in Prince Edward Island. Meantime, a draft for \$100,000 was received by the First National Bank. When the California Bank was notified of the forgery, word was sent to arrest and hold McDonald. A telegram was received yesterday by a young man named Allan McDonald from the culprit, saying, "I am in jail. What shall I do?" He did not know of any such person in that locality. A number of former residents of P. E. Island said they believed the forger was a nephew of Allan McDonald, who was acquainted with the latter's business when living here. He was formerly a travelling agent. He travelled for a liquor dealer in Boston. Allan L. McDonald, whose name is forged, owns some vessels and other property here.
