His text was 2 Tim., 11-2. He gave five reasons or excuses for the dance:

1. You must have some amusement. But there are other amusements besides dancing.

2. You might better dance than do something worse—slandering your neighbor or the kissing play; but you surely do not dance so as to keep from it, so this is not dancing in an accomplishment; but Webster says an accomplishment is an elegance of mind or manner. But dancing does not require much mind, and does not improve the manners. It takes very little mind to dance.

3. You say conscience does not condemn. More the pity. My watch might say it was eleven o'clock, but I know that would be wrong and it would be a poor guide. Your conscience, I think, will not be regulated and kept right.

4. You say the Church does not object. Here we read many quotations from the Roman Catholic Church, English Episcopal, Presbyterian, &c., show that all the churches were as one on the question. Please don't slander your church by saying that it does not oppose dancing.

5. If you don't dance, what will you do? A serious question! We would advise you to get better accomplishments and more brains.

6. Some say the Church does not object. Here we read many quotations from the Roman Catholic Church, English Episcopal, Presbyterian, &c., show that all the churches were as one on the question. Please don't slander your church by saying that it does not oppose dancing.

7. If you don't dance, what will you do? A serious question! We would advise you to get better accomplishments and more brains.

8. Ask these five questions:

1. What effect will it bring about on your influence? It makes your profession ridiculous. Better a millstone hung about your neck than a load of sin on your conscience, but only your own, on this question.
