Annual Meeting Tignish C. W. L.

The annual meeting of the Tignish Catholic Women's League was held on April 26th, the feast day of Our Lady of Good Counsel in the assembly room of Our Lady of the Angels Convent with an attendance of twenty-five members.

The President Mrs. F. J. Skerry was in the chair. Reverend J. A. MacDonald our spiritual director was guest of honor.

The meeting opened with the recitation of the League prayer by Father MacDonald, after which the President addressed the gathering. She welcomed the members and congratulated them for the fine spirit they showed in coming to the meeting on such a stormy day. Mrs. Sherry extended thanks to Father MacDonald for his kindness all through the year. He was always ready and willing to assist with any problem that arose, his careful and wise advice was always gratefully received by the President and members.

She also thanked the executive and conveners with their committees who played such an important part in helping to make the year such a successful one, and a thank you was extended to all the members who were always willing to work whenever called upon. The President said the amount of work undertaken during the past year seemed very great but with the splendid co-operation given by the members, each taking their share it helped to make the burden light, and she stated that she was confident she would again meet with this same true spirit during the coming year, as each and every one will follow the C. W. L. motto: "For God and Canada".

Mrs. C. F. Morrissey, recording secretary submitted the report of the years activities which are as follows:— There were fifty-seven paid-up members. During the year twelve regular monthly meetings were held, with always a good at-

tendance. All meetings opened with the League prayer and closed with a prayer for Christian peace in the world.

The treasurer's report showed a balance on hand at beginning of year, April 1950 of \$53.02. Receipts for the year amounted to \$583.20 with expenditures of \$519.02, making a total balance in bank at the end of April 1951 of \$116.06. The following conveners submitted reports: Church— Each month two members volunteered to do the cleaning of the sanctuary one day a week and before all feast days, several others of the members joined and all light glasses were washed and the brass candle holders polished.

The convener and her committee changed and washed collars on vestments when necessary, several of the vestments were sent to the cleaners and one set of vestments were re-lined. A Easter money was solicited to buy flowers for the Repository on Holy Thursday and the Altar for Easter Sunday; on all other feast days flowers were donated from the members' gardens, and were arranged by the convener and her committee.

The C. W. L. purchased a carpet for the sanctuary and the work of sanding and refinishing the floor was also paid for by the sub-division. Acolyte candle holders were paid for and a donation of ten dollars was given the pastor to help with washing the walls of the Church prior to painting.

The education convener made several visits to the class-rooms of the two schools during the year and presented small prizes to be awarded as the Reverend teachers wished. Money was voted for prizes for the June closing and the members gave individual prizes. Contributions were made to the St. Dunstan's Girls Scholarship Fund, the National Catholic Girls Scholarship Fund, and to a local boy attending a seminary.

At Christmas time a treat of fruit was purchased for the teachers and pupils, and the sub-division contributed towards the Halloween party for all children of school age in the district.

you are soon informed of the fact if you should step ahead of the line.

The journey home took us through the Robb's Hood country of England or Sherwood Forest. The trees are of no gigantic size, but it is actually the only thickly wooded section in England. It is going to be turned into a park; but during the war great quantities of ammunition were stored there and it has not yet been entirely cleared away. We also passed through the Killam Oil fields, a very small area at present, but the only section where oil is found in England.

About an hour's run from London is Cambridge with its famous university buildings. The buildings there are much more modern than in Oxford and the one chapel we were in (King's Chapel) was one of the most beautiful we saw in England.

Back to Berkhamstead and preparing for Paris. We found that Canadian dollar travellers' cheques, in Britain, must be marked for the country in which they are to be used. Unfortunately, we were not told of this in Canada, but I was able to have mine changed into United States dollar cheques, which are valid in every country in the world.

Another difficulty was visas— these were required for every country but Switzerland and meant in all about a dozen passport pictures with trips to the various consulates. After filling in several forms, and the production of a fee about the equivalent of \$2.00 for each visa, a stamp was placed in the passport to permit admittance to the respective country.

The trip to Paris, via Newhaven— Dieppe, was across the wide part of the English Channel and took the best part of a day. The French coaches were of the compartment type, like England, except that there is just no limit to the number of passengers carried. In contrast to the brick of England, Paris seems to be dominated with gray stone buildings. Fortunately, a friend in England who was familiar with Paris, arranged accommodation for us at a central hotel. Although it was far from modern, it served the purpose and saved us the trouble of trying to get accommodation in a city that we didn't know or didn't speak the language. We later learned that hotels in Paris are classed by stars, from one to four, which are over the hotel door, a four star hotel being the best.

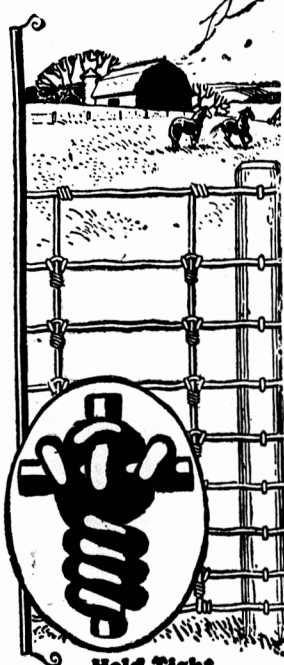
