Large Attendance At Rose Valley Field Day

The fourth in a series of Field Days sponsored by the Division of Illustration Stations in cooperation with the Provincial Department of Agriculture was held on the Illustration Station operated by J. W. MacKenzie and Son Rose Valley on Friday evening, August 10th.

A record of over 250 farm folk attended this meeting which was highlighted with an address by Mr. Malcolm MacLeod, Past President of the Prince Edward Island Women's Institute and their representative at the Convention of the "Associated Country Women of the World" in Copenhagen in 1950.

Mrs. MacLeod gave a very interesting address on her recent trip to Copenhagen and her impressions of Women's Organizations in European countries.

Farmers were afforded an opportunity to tour the managed woodlot on Mr. MacKenzie's farm where a selective cutting program has been instituted.

By avoiding the practice of clear cutting and adopting selective cutting measures, forest lands are treated as a regular farm crop and continuity of income is assured.

The farm woodlots of Prince Edward Island not only serve as sources of fuel and building material but play a vital role in conserving the water supply in the soil.

By controlling the flow of streams, and protecting the soil from erosion and drifting, the woodlot is an inseparable part of the farm, and studies in land use and farm economics have shown how indispensable will managed woodlots are to the average farm enterprise.

Mr. Frank Myers, M. L. A., Crapaud, addressed the farmers present and congratulated Mr. MacKenzie on the splendid work now in progress on his Illustration Station.

Mr. W. F. Alan Stewart, Strathgarny, spoke briefly and in his congenial manner, voiced the appreciation of the farmers for the splendid program featured at this Field Day.

During the course of the evening, films of an agricultural nature were presented by Mr. I. L. Tuplin in cooperation with the National Film Board.

Grateful appreciation is extended to the Women's Institute of Rose Valley who served light refreshments during the course of the program.

Comments Work
W. R. Shaw, M.B.E., Deputy Minister of Agriculture congratulated Mr. MacKenzie and members of his family on the splendid work they were performing on their Illustration Station.

Field Days such as this, the speaker pointed out, afforded an excellent opportunity for individual farmers to meet agricultural workers, observe the results of field experiments and discuss mutual problems.

Marketing prospects for agricultural commodities were reviewed by the speaker who indicated that, at the present time, the outlook appeared comparatively good.

Farmers were urged to devote a greater amount of attention to their dairy cattle and to lean more toward a mixed farming program.

Dr. G. Fisher, Director of Veterinary Services for Prince Edward Island spoke at some length on the Veterinary service now available to farmers of the Province.

Farmers were invited to take advantage of this splendid service now at their disposal and to feel free to inspect the modern well equipped laboratories at Charlottetown which have very efficient staffs.

Dr. Fisher pointed out that greater care should be exercised in nutrition and felt that the proper feeding of brood sows is most important if losses in the young are to be kept to a minimum.

Sanitation in the care of dairy cattle is also of prime importance, the speaker emphasized, if Mastitis is to be controlled.

Mr. I. L. Tuplin, Fieldman, Provincial Department of Agriculture suggested that a Community effort should be made to eradicate noxious weeds particularly Wild Radish.

With the use of 2.4 D as a spray, Mustard or Wild Radish, the speaker pointed out, could be eradicated within a few years.

Spray should be applied while the weeds are growing vigorously and preferably before coming into bloom. Weed seeds are carried from one field to another by birds, Mr. Tuplin stated, so the cooperation of all farmers is required if the destruction of this weed is to become a reality.

Mr. R. C. Parent, Superintendent, Experimental Station, Charlottetown, dealt with the topic "The Place of Grass Silage and Loose-Housing of Cattle in Prince Edward Island Agriculture."

In the housing of young cattle, Mr. Parent felt that the loose-housing type of barn offers many conveniences for the farmer, particularly where farm labour is a problem.

This more modern type of barn eliminates a good deal of heavy work and is comparatively cheap in construction.

Farmers were invited to inspect the loose-housing barn now erected at the Experimental Station, Upton and to view the upright silo now filled with grass ensilage.
