A STRANGE COINCIDENCE.—A ten-year-old boy named Willie Enright was killed while playing with some boys on the railway tracks at the foot of Brock Street, Toronto, on Saturday afternoon. He was standing on the end of a car that was being unloaded, when some other cars were shunted into it. The boy was knocked off, and falling on to the track, the car passed over his neck, killing him instantly. His father was killed in a similar manner at the same place a few years ago.

FATALLY BURNED.—The five-year-old son of Mr. John Weatherbe, blacksmith of Vernon River, was fatally burned on Monday afternoon. It seems that during the temporary absence from the house of the child's father and mother, he and the other children began playing with some lighted sticks, with one of which he set his clothing on fire. His parents heard the child's cries, and rushing into the house, found him clothing a mass of flames. Before they could extinguish the fire the little fellow was so badly burned that he died on Tuesday.
