

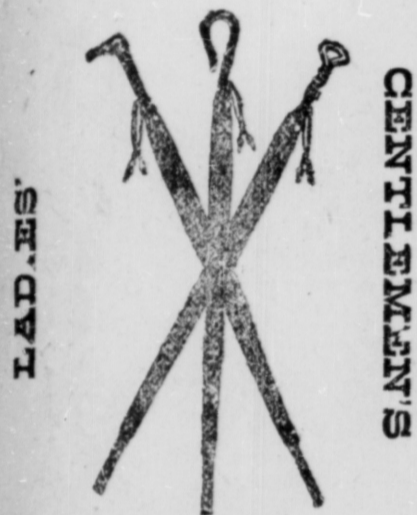

**GREAT BRITAIN'S GOOD OFFICES**

Offered by the Duke of Devonshire.

In the course of a recent address the Duke of Devonshire said:

"At present we are spectators of war between one of the oldest and proudest European states and one of the youngest and most powerful communities of America, in the foundation of which Great Britain has taken so large a share and in whose fortunes she has taken so much interest."

The Duke of Devonshire further said that both belligerents admitted that Great Britain had no right or interests which prescribed any other course than one of strict neutrality; and while he admitted that "not even the dictates of humanity warrant action on our part, that could be construed as unequal for interference, in a quarrel which is not ours," he felt sure that the country would join in the wish that, if opportunity ever offered itself, the good offices of Great Britain, if asked for should serve to bring to a speedy and honorable conclusion the war which, however inequitable it might have been, was attended by conditions more than usually pathetic. The address of the Duke was received with applause.

**Discipline.**

Sir,—In reply to the letter which appeared in The Guardian of May 5th I beg to ask how is a Principal of any school or college to maintain order if he allows the students to disobey his orders at their will, as it is reported the young man in question did? In all institutions, both civil and military, complete subordination is the keynote of success, and I do not see why the P. W. C., should be held as an exception to this rule.

The name of Dr. Anderson has become a household word among teachers of this Province, not to say anything of the number of his students who have left this Province and made their mark in such Colleges as Cornell, McGill and Dalhousie. THE ELECTRA has resumed her regular service after being on the slip at Pictou undergoing repairs.

FROM HALIFAX.—The steamer City of Ghent arrived this morning at 5 o'clock, and will sail on return this afternoon via Summerside.

BAITING UP.—We understand that some Schooners of the Newfoundland fleet are buying herring for bait at Georgetown and Souris.

THE SEWERAGE BILL.—A public meeting of citizens will be held in the Market Hall tomorrow (Saturday) evening at 8 o'clock to consider the sewerage bill now before the Legislature.

THE BULLETIN.—The already sufficient supply of n-w-papers in Charlottetown has been supplemented by a little 4 page sheet "The Bulletin," which made its first appearance this morning. It promises to give the latest war news, but careful examination reveals no despatches later than those which appeared in yesterday's second edition of THE EXAMINER.

RAILWAY ACCIDENT.—A bad smashup occurred on the I. C. R., near St. Anne, Quebec, about two or three o'clock on Tuesday morning. A light engine and a freight train, running at full speed, met head on, with disastrous results. The driver on the light engine and the fireman on the freight train were killed outright, and other train hands were injured. Both engines were badly wrecked, while some of the box cars were also greatly damaged. The collision blocked traffic on the road some nine or ten hours, the Maritime express from Montreal being delayed about that length of time. It is said that the accident was due to the engineer on the light engine over-running his orders.

THE SMITH CASE.—The coroner's jury in the case of Philip Smith, the Charlottetown shearer who died at New Glasgow on Monday afternoon under suspicious circumstances, will resume their investigation to day. According to the New Glasgow Chronicle, Dr Keith, who was called to see Smith on Saturday, found him suffering great pain which he said was caused by a kick. Smith, however, would not tell the doctor who kicked him. Smith had been visiting Pictou before he was taken ill, and some people think that he took cold or was hurt while there and that his trouble did not develop until he returned to New Glasgow. The evidence, so far, taken has not proven foul play against anyone. Smith was 56 years of age.
