DesBrisay acting as best man. A number of friends of both the contracting parties were present, and the newly wedded pair began their life partnership under the most agreeable auspices. As they left the house they were attended by hearty good wishes and a generous shower of rice and shoes.

Schooner Seized.—The Gloucester schooner Eastern Queen, Capt. Seesley, arrived at Souris several days ago, and was chartered to load potatoes and turnips by Messrs. Matthew, McLean & Co. She was ready to sail yesterday afternoon, but when Capt. Seesley applied to Collector Foley for his clearance papers, that official refused to issue them, and refused, also, we are informed, to give the captain any reason for so doing. Later on in the evening the schooner was seized on a charge of violating the Customs Act. The offence for which the schooner was seized is alleged to have been committed last year, when, it is said, the vessel was under different management.

Pleased With Canada.

OTTAWA, Nov. 10. The banquet to the British Empire delegates to night was a grand success. The report of the delegates is most satisfactory. They are unanimous in their belief that Canada has localities and occupations suited to all who come with a determination to succeed. They express varied opinions as to different portions of Canada, but are unanimous in their belief that Canada has agricultural resources second to none in the world. They pay a warm tribute to the Minister of Agriculture for his energy in the Agricultural Farm scheme, and even advise that the new British Minister of Agriculture should come to Canada to get pointers as to his duty. The delegates are all fluent speakers, which adds much to their usefulness when they return home and meet those whom they represent.

Preparing for the Last Act.

WOODSTOCK, Nov. 10. Birchall had a long interview with his wife yesterday and is busy settling his worldly affairs. He still maintains wonderful nerve and never exhibits the faintest tremor of excitement except when he is moved by his wife's tears. He expected to become heir to considerable prosperity next spring, and is making his will so that his wife will receive the benefit of it. When his wife is absent he is jovial and light-hearted as ever and cares little for the gravity of the situation. The preparations are in progress for the judicial tragedy on the 14th. The scaffold will be after the usual drop weight pattern.

The New Lord Mayor.

LONDON, Nov. 10. Joseph Savory was to-day installed Lord Mayor of London with all the pomp that has for years attended the ceremony of installing the chief officer of the city. The weather was fine and large crowds lined the streets to witness the Lord Mayor's show. A number of the survivors of the Crimean war and the naval brigade took part in the parade.

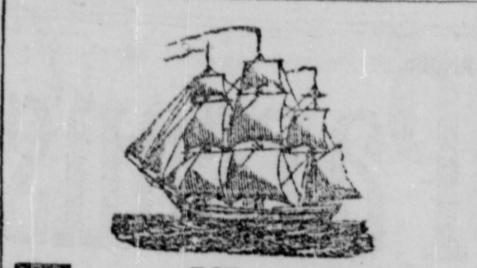
