Neurotic Husband Makes Wife Victim Of His Folly

Dear Mary Haworth: During the 18 months we have been married, I have met my husband six times. Now we are expecting a child, which he says isn't his, though he knows it is. He is very jealous, always harks back to things in the past, and wakes me at all hours of the night to quarrel about them. He has beaten me many times, so that I've had to have to talk over our problems, but he reacts so badly that I don't ask any more.

I had a nervous breakdown last November, after a conversation I telephoned to tell me of her affair with him, which he admitted. He has beaten me many times, so that I've had to have to talk over our problems, but he reacts so badly that I don't ask any more.

I know something is wrong with him mentally. He can be very nice, loving and kind; then suddenly he has terrible moods.

As his companion in moral disorder, you can't expect to know happiness, good fortune, peace and the like. Nor can you

possibly be an elevating influence on his wife while you stay in that situation.

Had you departed from your husband, decisively, as a simple necessity of self-respect, along about the time he began to make a habit of beating, insulting and tormenting you, you might have become of some help to him. You might have begun to develop the moral fortitude and firmness of purpose that would lead him gradually out of darkness and into the path of righteous living.

Your husband is a problem to himself and others, including you. And you are a problem to yourself — and to your family, obviously.

If your husband won't accompany you to the pastor, then for the sake of the child, you should seek analytical-oriented counsel from a family relationship expert, to give you the gist of how to grow up, and also, to give you some idea of how far off the beam of maturity you are at present.

Let's hope that your pastor is, in truth, a good shepherd of his flock, and will have the enlightenment and conscientiousness to steer you into consultation with suitable counselors, capable of administering the psychiatric, spiritual and social therapy you should have.

In my opinion, the Family Service Bureau of the Salvation Army's Social Welfare department, at Avenue of the Americas, New York 11, N.Y., is probably uniquely qualified to help you rebuild your life on a solid foundation. Provided, of course, that you cooperate with all your might — thus giving God a chance to bless, reinforce and prosper your efforts. — M.H.

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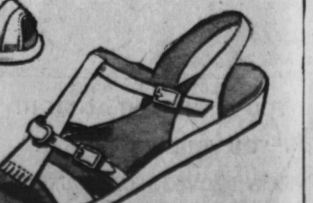
