

Story of Dieppe Raid Today in New History

 A new history of the Dieppe raid in English writer living in Canada spells out in 200,000 words of well-researched detail the story of the tragic yet heroic reconnaissance in force on August 19, 1942. The book, "The Story of the Dieppe Raid," is published by McClelland and Stewart's Sept. 4.

The first half, "The Shame," tells of the planning for the Aug. 19, 1942, raid. The second half, "The Glory," describes the carnage on the beaches where 3,869 of the 5,000 - man force were killed, wounded or taken prisoner.

Robertson draws few conclusions that have not been cited in other books and official documents but the detail of his study and the extensive use of material of first-person interview makes from planners and veterans who fought through what hot summer day make his history one of the most complete on record.

He views Maj. Gen. J. H. Roberts, the Canadian commander of the assault, as a planner of the raid but places some blame for the costly results on General A. G. L. McNulty, Canadian army commander, and Gen. H. G. Crerar, commander of the first Canadian Corps. These senior officers, he contends, made no attempt to consider or amend the military plan.

Robertson has high praise for the gallantry of the individual soldier and says that "if men behave at moments of crisis in accordance with the manner in which they have learned the lessons of history, then Canadians should look back in pride and quietly exult in the happy memory of those who just came."

LEARNED VITAL LESSON
 Mr. Robertson says one of the most important lessons of the war was learned at Dieppe — "how not to go about an invasion." The central attack was "against a strongly defended port without overwhelming firepower to support it brought to the beachhead."

But from Dieppe came lessons that led to final victory in the Second World War.

"None of the techniques, equipment or assault tactics which contributed so vastly to the success... on D-day could have emerged from Dieppe," Robertson says.

He is critical of British planning that brought about the invasion of Normandy. The Dieppe raid but places some blame for the costly results on General A. G. L.
