LONDON, Nov. 16 (AP) - Defence Minister Emanuel Shinwell told the House of Commons today British casualties in Korea to date are 51 killed, 158 wounded and five missing. About 10,000 British troops are engaged.

Canadian Crop Figures For 1950 Are Announced

OTTAWA, Nov. 16 (CP) - Canada's 1950 wheat crop was placed today by the Bureau of Statistics at 461,730,000 bushels, compared with last year's 367,406,000 and the 10-year average of 394,000,000.
The oats crop was placed at 420,328,000 bushels, more than 100,000,000 bushels higher than last year's 317,916,000.
The latest estimate of the barley crop was 171,328,000, ahead by 50,000,000 from the 1949 total of 120,408,000.
Flaxseed at 4,540,000 bushels, was double last year's 2,284,000. Rye was up to 13,346,000, compared with 10,100,000.
Generally, increases were shown for other crops, with the exception of dry peas and dry beans which declined slightly from last year.
The potato crop, estimated at 97,400,000 bushels, compared with 89,200,000 in 1949. Declines were noted in Prince Edward Island and New Brunswick, but these were offset by increased output in other Provinces, with the exception of British Columbia.
The Bureau said losses due to late blight may run to about 11 per cent in Prince Edward Island and to some 13 per cent in Nova Scotia and New Brunswick.
In sugar beets, Canada is expected to achieve a record 1,100,000 tons, compared with last year's 858,700.
The dry peas output is placed at 829,000 bushels, down from 936,000 in 1949, while the dry bean crop of 1,385,000 bushels is down from last year's 1,766,000. Acres sown to both crops were below 1949 levels.
Hay and clover is estimated at 13,200,000 tons, slightly above the 1949 crop of 12,100,000, but well below the 10-year average of 15,200,000. The alfalfa crop at 3,200,000 tons, compares favorably with last year's 2,800,000. Fodder corn at 6,940,000 is higher than the 5,900,000 last year. Grain hay is placed at 1,100,000 tons, against 900,000 in 1949.
In other crops, the mixed grain harvest at 74,000,000 bushels is sharply up from last year's 56,000,000; buckwheat at 3,900,000 bushels is up 300,000 from last year. Turnips and mangels for livestock feed, excluding the Prairies for which no figures are yet available, are placed at 23,000,000 hundredweight, well above last year's 19,000,000.

Bob Hope Seeking Two Million Damages

LOS ANGELES, Nov. 16 (AP) - Comedian Bob Hope today filed a \$2,010,000 damage suit against Life Magazine and radio columnist John Crosby, charging they libelled him by asserting he stole comedian Fred Allan's jokes. Hope alleged that the Nov. 6 issue of Life, under the title "Seven Deadly Sins of the Air," implied he was guilty of plagiarism, a practice which he said the entertainment industry regards as unethical.

One Of Founders Of A. A.'s Dies At 71

AKRON, O., Nov. 16 (AP) - Dr. Robert Holbrook Smith, 71, one of the founders of Alcoholics Anonymous, died today after a long illness. Alcoholics Anonymous is an organization composed of persons who have overcome the drinking habit. Its purpose is to help habitual drinkers.

Addition To Mint May Cost Million

OTTAWA, Nov. 16 (CP) - Canada's increasing population demands more coinage and the mint, opened in 1903, can't keep up with the demand, officials said today.
So a new wing, consisting of a basement and two storeys, costing between \$500,000 and \$1,000,000, is to be built.
Officials hope this will increase the mint's present capacity of about 30,000,000 coins a year to close to 100,000,000 a year.

Draws Life Term For Wife's Death

PICTON, Ont., Nov. 16 (CP) - James Fosbray, 28-year-old R. A. F. veteran, today was convicted of manslaughter in the fatal stabbing of his red-headed wife, June, in a snowbank at Napanee, Nov. 28, 1949.
He was sentenced to life imprisonment.
The jury added: "We recommend no mercy."
Fosbray, who was being tried for a second time for murder, showed no emotion at the verdict which ended the 10-day trial. He stood with his head bowed.
Asked if he had anything to say prior to sentence being passed, Fosbray said: "No, sir."
Fosbray won a retrial five days before he was to be hanged, following a verdict of guilty of murder returned by a jury last June 16 at Napanee. He also won a change of venue from Napanee to Picton for this second trial.
He spent more than six hours in the witness box relating the events that led to the stabbing shortly after he returned to Canada from a visit to his former home in England.
He said he lost his reason when his wife told him she planned to leave him to live with another man.

While the number of parties exhibiting in these sections was not large, yet there was great interest taken because of its educational value. Competition was keen, with Roy Woodside finally being tops in get of sire and progeny of dam. They were certainly very nice foxes, well developed and in excellent condition.
Standard white marked foxes, which were a sensation at the shows from 1938 to 1942, have suffered a big decline in numbers because fashion's trend has been away from the white marked fox, although recently prices for them

The greatest interest perhaps was taken in the standard platinum, all classes of which had fair-to-good entry lists except extra lights. The breeders put on a great display and many of the foxes were so similar that it gave Judge George Calbeck a hard time to make his decisions.
