Parnell's Land Act.

Sad Drowning Accident at Georgetown.

LETTERS TO THE EDITOR.

A Protest.

SIR,—On the behalf of P. E. Island exhibitors of live stock at the New England Fair, recently held at Bangor, I feel it my duty to protest against the manner in which they were treated by the St. John officials of the New Brunswick and Intercolonial Railways.

"Shippers in each case to prepay charges at regular tariff rates, and if the stock or articles are returned at close of fair, unsold, the amount prepaid will be refunded."

Any person would suppose from the above that the refund would be made at once on the presentation of the proper certificates, either at St. John or Bangor. The Bangor agents, however, said that the refund of charges would be made at St. John, but the official representing the New Brunswick Railway, at St. John, said he had no authority to do it.

The Intercolonial Railway agreed to "return stock and exhibits free, when accompanied by the certificate of the Secretary," but this agreement was, in some cases, deliberately violated.
