Railway Plans Considered By Montague Trade Boards

The King's County Board of Trade and the Montague Junior Board of Trade held a combined meeting last evening at the Bison Restaurant to discuss the C.N.R. application to discontinue passenger services from April to December.

The meeting was preceded by a delicious chicken dinner in the rainbow room at which Mr. R. K. Clements, president of the King's County Board, presided. Present also was Mayor Bruce H. Yeo, representing the town of Montague. Mr. Clements also presided over the discussion meeting considering the C.N.R. brief which was read by the chairman. It was the considered opinion of the members that the passenger service in this area (Montague-Georgetown) might be discontinued without any undue hardship inasmuch as very few use the railway transportation facilities except during the winter months when such service, according to the brief, would be restored.

The freight service, however, presented an entirely different picture. It was felt that any curtailment of this service must be opposed most strenuously, and that every guarantee of a daily freight service must be forthcoming, and that section 8 of the C.N.R. brief was definitely misleading and guaranteed nothing. The meeting felt that until it received positive assurances of a daily freight service it must categorically oppose any change in the present set-up in this area.
