JAMES ALLAN RAMSAY AULD

On Friday June 3rd, 1955, Mr. James Allan Ramsay Auld of West Covehead, P. E. I. died in the Prince Edward Island Hospital, where he had been taken four months before, following a severe paralytic stroke.

Although this was his second attack (the first came some years before) there seemed reasonable hope for his recovery. After a third shock, however, his condition worsened, and in spite of every possible care and attention, he slowly weakened to the end.

Mr. Ramsay Auld was a good friend and true, loyal and dependent on his recovery. He was a successful farmer who never spared himself in his work.

He was a communicant member of the West Covehead United Church and he always took a great interest in his church. For many years he was the faithful secretary and treasurer taking all his church responsibilities seriously, and ever loyal in both worship services and business meetings of the Pastoral charge.

Mr. Auld was born in 1891 and lived all his life on the West Covehead home. He was the only son of the late Mr. and Mrs. Charles H. Auld.

In 1915 he married Miss Gladys Olive Craswell, who now mourns the loss of a beloved and faithful husband. He is also survived by the late Mrs. Walter C. Auld of Charlottetown, and Dr. C. R. Benson Auld in Halifax, Nova Scotia, and by five devoted grandchildren.

His funeral was the largest ever seen in the community, and the services were conducted by Rev. Norman Green B.A., Minister of the Covehead charge, assisted by Rev. Howard Christie, B.A., of Trinity United Church, Charlottetown, and by his former pastor, Rev. Phos. A. Wilson B. Sc. now retired.

The beautiful solo, "One sweetly solemn thought" was feelingly sung by Miss Helen Wilson, accompanied by Mr. Arthur Vessey at the organ; and the hymns sung by choir and congregation were "The Lord's My Shepherd" "Unto the Hills Around", and "Rock of Ages Clef For Me."

The death occurred at the home of her daughter, Mrs. Cecil Birch of Amherst, Nova Scotia, on Monday, May 22nd of Mrs. Ephraim Phillips in her eighty-first year, following an illness of almost three weeks, when everything that was humanly possible was done to restore her to health.

On Tuesday a service was held in the funeral parlors in Amherst, conducted by the Rev. Mr. Campbell, after which the remains were taken to Tyne Valley, her former home, where her entire life had been spent (with the exception of the four years she had lived in Amherst).

They rested at the funeral home of her nephew, Mr. G. Roy Phillips until May 26th, when friends and relatives came to pay their last respects to one whom they had known, and loved for many years; after which the funeral cortege moved to the Presbyterian Church where the service was conducted by the Rev. Mr. Baxter of Hampton United Church, a former pastor and good friend assisted by Rev. A. J. MacDonald of the Bideford United Church and Rev. Mr. Mawhinney of Tyne Valley Presbyterian Church.

The hymns used were "The Lord Is My Shepherd" and "Peace, Perfect Peace". S., also four grandsons, Stanley and Freddie Wheeler, and Carmen and Lowell Birch. A dearly loved son, Stanley, a veteran of World War Two, passed away in 1948, which was a sad blow for his mother, who had many infancies, two other children died in infancy.

Mrs. Phillips was a daughter of the late Samuel Ramsay of Tyne Valley, and his wife, Mary Jane Henderson, and was one of a family of thirteen children, of whom there are still living, two daughters, Mrs. W. Ultimatum In South Viet Nam

SAIGON, Viet Nam (Reuters)—Militant members of South Viet Nam's revolutionary committee Tuesday delivered an ultimatum to Premier Ngo Dinh Diem, declaring that if he doesn't shake up his government immediately they will "go to the people" for action.

"Whether the problem is settled by force or by peaceful methods depends on the people," they said. The revolutionary committee seized power temporarily in May during the army's street battle here against the Binh Xuyen private army. It is a self-appointed body which has spread its influence over South Viet Nam through extremist young men but had kept in the political background since the battle of Saigon. The letter was published in the absence of committee chairman Nguyen Bao Toan, now on a Philippines tour, and first vice-chairman Ha Huy Liem. It was signed by acting vice-chairman Ho Han Son and secretary-general Nh Lang.

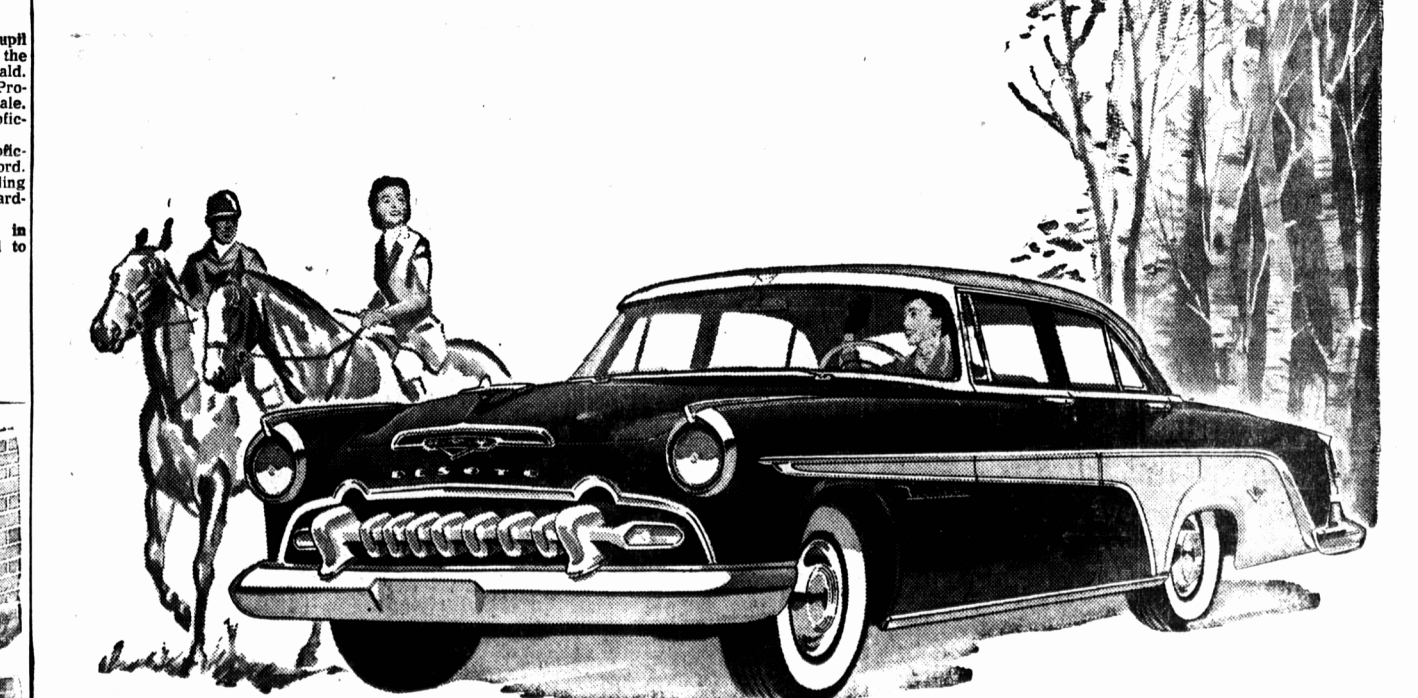

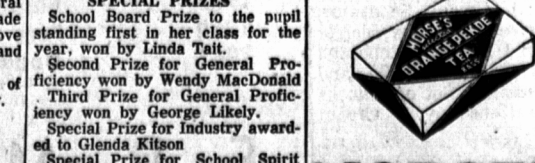
