MANITOBA SCHOOL QUESTION.

Mgr. Merry Del Val's Only
Request.

Refused by Premier Greenway.

OTTAWA, July 9.—It is learned that the object of Hon. Mr. Sifton's visit to Winnipeg was to induce Mr. Greenway to change the school regulation by which the number of pupils to entitle them to a Catholic teacher should be reduced from 25 to 15. This is the only concession Mgr. Merry Del Val asked. Otherwise, it is stated, he will report to Rome in favor of the settlement as agreed upon.

Mr. Sifton was not, however, successful in inducing Mr. Greenway to make the change.

MONTREAL, July 9.—The thermometer rose to 93 here yesterday, and the great heat continues.

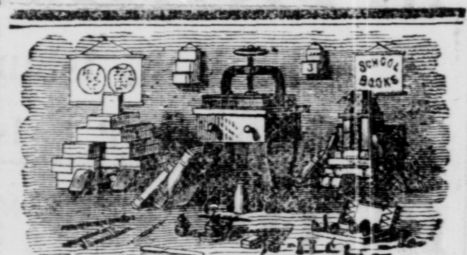
Sir Wilfred's Programme

McGill University.

MONTREAL, July 9.—F. P. Walton, B. C. L. Oxon., has been appointed Dean of the Faculty of Law at McGill University and lecturer on Constitutional Law and History and Roman law.

TURKEY AND GREECE.

The Sultan has Decided to Test the Coercion of Europe to the Utmost.

LONDON, July 8.—Greco-Turkish affair appear to be re-entering an interesting stage. Today the Porte despatched a circular to its representatives abroad containing a skilful defence of the Turkish case and declining to consider any frontier line in Thessaly north of the River Peneios, which it regards as the natural boundary.

It appears that the Sultan has convinced himself that the powers will not resort to coercion, and has decided to test the alleged concert of Europe to the utmost. On Monday he summoned a council of ministers for an extraordinary sitting of the Yildiz Kiosk, with the result that after a heated discussion a report was drawn up in favor of resuming hostilities if peace should not be concluded within a week. The minister of war sent telegrams to Edhem Pasha announcing the decision.

The Turks are rapidly strengthening their position in Thessaly, massing troops in Domoko, and fortifying Velestino. According to a circumstantial report of a conversation between the Sultan and an officer of his household, Abdul Hamid complained that the war had been forced upon him and that when he was victorious, Europe refused him either territory or indemnity. Therefore, he intended to resist to the utmost. He said: "We have nothing to fear. The six powers failed to coerce Vassos and his two thousand adventurers. What can they do against 300,000 victorious troops in Romania?"

"Supposing they wished to coerce me, who would undertake the task. I have information from all the capitals of Europe indicative of the indecision of the powers. Edham was a fool not to have summoned the Greek army and to have advanced to Athens, but he may be there yet. If no concessions are made within a few days I shall give the orders to advance. We can indicate our own terms from the Acropolis. Everything is ready for immediate action."

According to this report, the Sultan discussed the possibility of Russia and Germany attempting coercion, and declared that he was entirely ready to meet them both.

The foregoing may be, perhaps, only a "bluff," and it is even alleged in some quarters, among others by the Italian admiral, Cani varo, at Crete, that peace is actually in view. But it is significant that Gen. Smolenski had long conferences with King George and M. Reili, at Athens, today, and will start for Thermopylae tomorrow to assume command of the first division.
