Kelly Loses Bid In Golf Tourney

SEATTLE, Aug. 19 (CP) — Pete Kelly of Fredericton lost his bid in the U. S. amateur golf tournament today when he was defeated in the second round, 6 and 5, by James Molinari, San Francisco. Kelly drew a bye in the first round. Canada's entries were eliminated in the second round. The American League Chicago White Sox kept New York Yankees from gaining ground in the pennant race by beating the world champions 3-1 last night behind the seven-hit pitching of 34-year-old Marv Brissom. The Yanks remained two games ahead of the runner-up Cleveland Indians who were beaten in the afternoon 6-5 by Boston.

The New York Giants gave signs today that they may be ready to repeat their great late-season drive of last season that gave them the National League pennant.

The surging Giants opened their fourth and final western swing yesterday by sweeping a double-header from the Chicago Cubs 5-0 and 3-1. At the same time the league-leading Brooklyn Dodgers currently 6 1-2 games ahead of the pack, split a two-night double-header with Cincinnati, blanking the Reds 3-0 and then losing 6-3.

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At Chicago the Sal Maglie scattered eight hits to gain his 13th victory for Brooklyn in the opener. It was his fifth shut-out. Bobby Thomson smashed his no. 18 homer that was good for two runs in the seventh inning to give Hoyt Wilhelm, third New York pitcher, the second game decision over Warren Hacker.

The Cincinnati victory was the Reds' first win of the season against the Bums on the home grounds. Willard Marshall's seventh homer and Ted Kluszewski's triple provided the five Red Sox runs. Hurler Johnny Rutherford was charged with the loss.

Boston edged Cleveland in the last of the ninth after outfield errors by Larry Doby and Harry Simpson had enabled the Red Sox to tie the ball game up at 5-5 in the seventh.

Henry Gallant, another cutie on the base paths, just couldn't get on to demonstrate his bag of tricks. He never looked worse with the bludgeon.

Bill Allan showed signs of re-surgency youth by knocking the horsehide into Granville Street for an automatic homer. Bill didn't seem to realize it was an automatic, and he tore around the sacks much too fast for a doddering old fellow in his late sixties. (This last could be an exaggeration, but they say that when they lit the candles on Bill's last birthday cake it looked like a bush fire in New Brunswick.) He retired early in the contest, and was replaced by Ken Walker, who takes about a month of constant play to get back to his batting eye. Time is a too short for Ken this year, perhaps, but he showed last summer he could lose the apple in Granville Street residents' front yards as often as any of them.

Vance Harris played in right field and demonstrated again that he is one of Summerside's most promising junior ball players. How the C and B team could use this boy's hitting ability in their series with the Abbie Juniors! We don't know how Vance happened to get off on the wrong foot with the Curranites, but he says saying "you'll be sorry" with the old hickory.

Danny "Gunner" Cox played third base for the airforce boys, and his work at the hot corner makes us think Meier will not be missed so badly at short after all. Don MacKenzie fills in very well in short field, and Richard does a better than fair job at second.

By the way, who started that ugly rumor that Stan Richard couldn't hit a curve ball? He's been hitting everything that comes his way lately, so if there's something he can't hit, how about somebody dishing it up?

Top Ranking Tennis Stars Win Matches
 TORONTO, Aug. 19 (CP) — Canada's Davis Cup players and leading stars from the United States eased their way into the fourth round of the Canadian lawn tennis championships today. All but one—Montreal's Brendan Macken—made it with ease.

Macken was forced to three sets before defeating Rodolpho May, 22, of Mexico, in the third round men's singles.

Curly-headed May, rated fifth in Mexico, took the first set and seemed well on the way to victory in the second when Macken broke through his service to win 2-6, 6-4, 6-2.

Macken, who obviously had trouble getting started, double-faulted three times in one game.

Later in the third round singles, left-handed Henri Rochon of Montreal defeated Pete Stewart of Toronto, 6-1, 6-3.

Stewart, a finalist in recent Toronto district tennis competition, forced the game in the second set but failed to match Rochon's bewildering variety of cuts.

Blonde Lorne Main of Vancouver played his steady, two-handed game to defeat Andy Stern of New York City in straight sets, 6-3, 6-4.

In one of the most heralded matches of the tournament blonde Hugh Peacock of Toronto was defeated by Dick Savitt, United States ace from Orange, N.J., 6-1, 6-0.

Savitt rarely exerted himself but the young University of Toronto student put up a stiff battle and forced the match to deuce games on several occasions.

Sauer, Doby Run Away With Slugging Honors

NEW YORK, Aug. 19 (AP) — Hank Sauer, of Chicago Cubs and Larry Doby of Cleveland Indians, with lead their respective leagues in both home runs and runs batted in, are making runaway races of the major league slugging derbies.

Slugging statistics compiled by the Associated Press today disclose that Sauer tops the National League with a lusty .581 mark, 69 points better than his nearest competitor.

Sauer has amassed 251 total bases in 432 at bats and included among his 125 hits are 27 doubles, three triples and 31 home runs.

Figures include Monday's games. Doby, the American League pace-setter, with a robust .575 average, owns a 50-point bulge over his closest rival. The smooth-working outfielder has collected 111 hits for 223 total bases in 388 trips. His hit total includes 18 doubles, eight triples and 26 homers.

Brooklyn's Gil Hodges is closest to Sauer in the National League. The Dodger first baseman has accumulated 192 total bases in 375 appearances to the plate for a .512 figure.
