Continued Triumphs.

The result of the by-elections of yesterday confirm the opinion expressed by THE EXAMINER that there is throughout the Dominion a decided change of public opinion in favor of the Liberal-Conservative Party and the honest and business-like administration of the Hon. Mr. Abbott.

Circumstances in Peel and Halifax were in favor of the Opposition. Mr. Featherstone, the Opposition candidate for Peel, was particularly popular on account of the practical services he has rendered the cattle trade between Canada and Great Britain; and he was, on that account, supported by many Conservative voters.

HEARTZ IS TRUMP. One year ago, we noticed with pleasure that Mr. John Hertz of 2720 Marion street, Denver, Colo., had been elected President of the Bricklayers and Masons International Union, then held in Toronto, Canada; and on January 5th, 1892, Mr. Hertz left for Indianapolis, Ind., and was re-elected to the presidency by acclamation.

FIRE AT MARGATE.—The Summerside Farmer says: Mr. William Cardwell, of Margate, met with a considerable loss early last Saturday morning, in the burning of his farm buildings. This was a pigery, workshop and woodlouse combined. There had been a fire in the farmers' boiler the previous day but at night his father was in the building at ten o'clock and there was no sign of fire. At about four o'clock next morning old Mr. Cardwell was awakened by a light and it was discovered that the building was on fire. When noticed the fire had gained so much headway that the roof was falling in. How the fire occurred it is difficult to surmise as the building was only three years old and everything was tight and sound. Four pigs worth at least \$100, and a boiler worth \$14 and a great many small articles such as are usually stored in a farm building of this sort. A low estimate the loss is between \$300 and \$400. Mr. Caldwell has insurance to the amount of \$100.

VICTORY!

Result of Yesterday's Polling. Liberal Conservatives Win Five Out of Six Elections.

And Redeemed Two Seats From the Grits.

A Splendid Triumph

Public Opinion in Favor of Our Honest and Patriotic Government.

Toronto, Feb. 12.

Yesterday the great premier province of the Dominion did noble work, and the Conservative Party may well rest upon its magnificent won laurels for a few days at least. The Government carried.

NORTH VICTORIA, SOUTH VICTORIA, EAST BRUCE, EAST MIDDLESEX.

While Peel has remained Grit.

In straight English, this means that the party of good government has more than held its own in the constituencies won at the general election, and redeemed two seats, viz: North Victoria and East Bruce. At the general election East Bruce returned Mr. Trux, (Grit), by 114 of a majority; yesterday this gentleman tied conclusively with the same candidate, Henry Gargill, and the latter is elected by 13. The greatest victory, however, is in North Victoria, where, a year ago, Mr. Barron (Grit.) carried the County by 202 votes, and yesterday was defeated by Mr. Hughes by 150 majority. In South Victoria Charles Fairbairn has increased his majority from 25 to over 100, and Mr. Marshall's majority of 155 in March last in East Middlesex, has been raised up to the splendid majority of 483. At this general election, Featherstone (Grit) was elected in Peel by 54, and the same gentleman has increased his majority to 112.

There was even more enthusiasm in Toronto last evening than at the general election, and the tremendous obituary which went on for the thousands in front of the newspaper offices when the news of Kenny and Stairs' victory in Halifax arrived were repeated again and again.

The constituencies that voted yesterday are overwhelmingly agricultural, except Halifax. None can deny but that Mr. Leachter and Unrestricted Reciprocity have received their death-blow. The procession, however, will be continued in East Elgin today.

HALIFAX, Feb. 11.—7 p. m. Kenny and Stairs were elected here today. Their majority will likely be about five hundred.

HALIFAX, Feb. 12. Owing to the blizzard all the returns from the county have not yet come to hand. It is estimated that the Conservative majority will be fully 500.

Big Blizzard—Sudden Death.

HALIFAX, Feb. 12. The worst blizzard experienced here for years raged last night. Bad reports are expected from the shipping. At the close of one of the police yesterday, Patrick Dawson, who had been working in the interest of the Conservative candidates, dropped dead.

General Telegraphic News.

GUTHRIE, O. T., Feb. 10.—The scenes witnessed at El Reno the past 48 hours out rival anything ever seen in the territory. The town was entirely at the mercy of the vandals. The court officers joined in a wild rush for claims, and all business was suspended. A house was broken into, and the people driven from their homes. Governor Leary has ordered troops to the scene, and Secretary Noble has been wired the condition of affairs. Great excitement prevails.

MONTREAL, Feb. 10.—The Quebec Chronicle of yesterday referring to the Baie Des Chaleurs' commission says: There is no longer any doubt that there are two reports and both are now in the possession of Lieut. Governor Angers, Judges Baby and Davidson are still here. Their report has been submitted to the government. We are in a position, however, to say that there is but an exceedingly slight difference between the two reports, both of which concern the grantees of those implicated in the Baie des Chaleurs scandal.

SPRINGFIELD, Ohio, Feb. 10.—The Hon. John J. Lewis, of Columbus, said yesterday that Governor Cleveland is not a candidate for the Democratic presidential nomination. He said Cleveland told him during an interview a short time ago that he had come to an age when he appreciated leisure, and besides that he dreaded the horrors of a presidential campaign.

NIOLET, Quebec, Feb. 10.—Hon. L. Beaujeu, minister of agriculture, accepted the Conservative candidature in this county yesterday. All local ministers have now chosen their constituencies. Hon. T. C. Casgrain, attorney general in Montserrat; Flynn, crown lands, in Matane; Tallon, in Chibouilly; Pelletier, in Dorchester; Hill in the St. Antoine division; and Nantel in Terrebonne.

MURRAY BAY, Que., Feb. 10.—Mr. Simard, M. P. for Charlrobo, has been confirmed in his seat and declares that he will in the future support Abbott's government.
