Bernard Murphy, the incorrigible young lad arrested for the larceny of a flask of liquor from the store of Donald Steele, was given three months with hard labor. Two drunks, John Stewart and Michael Madden, were fined \$1 or 20 days, and \$8 or 40 days respectively. Stewart, who was arrested in his possession a "skull-tracker," a very dangerous-looking weapon, with a solid iron top. For carrying this he was fined \$10 or 30 days, and the weapon was confiscated.

After the ceremony Mr. and Mrs. Aronson departed for New York to spend their honeymoon, after which they will return to their home in Winsted, Conn. THE EXAMINER extends congratulations.

A SOCIETY SESSION.—Count De Villeneuve left his wife in France 18 months ago and came to Canada. His wife, who is still in France, is worth several millions of francs. Their marriage proved no happier than the majority of French marriages, and the Count left France in charge of a consular post and was lodged in jail. Mrs. Dillon accompanied him by the same train and registered as the Countess Villeneuve. It appeared that Villeneuve's arrest was at the instance of the French Government, in consequence of charges of forgery made against him in France. The accusation is that before leaving for Canada the Count forged his wife's name for some \$6,000. Affidavits were sent to Canada and submitted by the French Consul-General here to Judge Chauveau, extradition commissioner, who issued the warrant for Villeneuve's arrest. The affair creates a great sensation both here and in Montreal, and the Count will fight extradition. Mrs. Dillon is connected with the De Beauguis and other leading families of French Canada.

THE CHEESE INDUSTRY HERE

Good Results, Good Prospects.

Quality Second to None in Canada.

PROFESSOR ROBERTSON and Mr. Dillon returned to Charlottetown yesterday (Friday) morning, after attending meetings of the patrons of the eleven dairy stations. Notwithstanding the almost impassable condition of the roads, the halls and schoolhouses were crowded in every case. Printed reports giving a summary of the business at every factory and also a statement of every patron's account were distributed, and the farmers expressed themselves as well satisfied with the returns from last season's operations. The season's business at the eleven factories reached the following totals:

The average price realized for the P. E. Island cheese for the season was more than one-quarter of a cent per lb. higher than the highest price received by any factory in Ontario or Quebec, of which a report has been published. The purpose of the Dominion Department of Agriculture in establishing dairy stations in the several provinces was to make them centres of information and illustration for the farmers. The Department undertook to manage the eleven dairy stations on P. E. Island last year to meet the emergency which was caused by the farmers erecting a large number of factories before they were prepared to manage them themselves. The new factories on the Island hereafter can be modelled after these factories and the farmers have many objects in view in them to guide them in carrying on the business successfully. In those districts where the farmers are not fully prepared with cows and feed to give a cheese or butter factory a good support, the Dairy Commissioner recommends that the erection of buildings be deferred for a year.

The quality of P. E. Island cheese has proved to be entirely satisfactory to the English merchant who purchased most of the output of last season. Since the first shipment from New Perth, the reputation in the market has been highly creditable—being second to none from Canada. Mr. Arthur J. Rowson, of London, England, who purchased the cheese which were exported from the New Perth factory in 1892, was again the purchaser of the Island cheese. In an interview which appeared in a London (Eng.) paper, Mr. Rowson, who is one of the largest London importers of Canadian cheese—having imported no less than 160,000 boxes last year—said of this province: "It is sending almost the best cheese now, while the quality of cheese from other parts of Canada has shown improvement."

The outlook for an increase of business in the cheese trade on the Island is excellent, the farmers being quite enthusiastic. The Dairy Commissioner estimates that there will be an increase of fifty per cent. from the factories which ran last year, besides the product from the new factories which are being started this year. Butter-making will be commenced at the New Perth factory in October, after the cheese-making season is ended. Butter-making may also be commenced at Kensington and Cornwall, if the farmers are ready. The New Perth butter-making factory, for the first year, will serve the large patrons of the Vernon River Bridge, Montague Bridge, and Murray Harbor factories.

The New Perth, Vernon River Bridge, Cornwall, Dunk River and Kensington factories will be opened 14th May, and the other factories will be commenced on 1st June. The Dairy Commissioner desires the patrons of the different factories, who are competing for the medals at the several factories, to send him by mail to Central Experimental Farm, Ottawa, a statement of the whole number of milking cows kept on their several farms during the time when milk was supplied to the factories. As soon as the names and numbers of cows are obtained, the names of the successful competitors will be engraved on the medals. One gold medal is given for the Province and one silver medal to each of the other factories. It has been suggested that several large pieces of farmers and their families be held in connection with the dairying movement during next summer. Prof. Robertson has intimated that he will attend three or four of these gatherings and deliver addresses. The arrangements as to places and dates are not yet made, but it is probable that picnics will be held at Montague Bridge, Kensington and Cornwall as central points. The time will likely be early in July.

Prof. Robertson leaves by the Capes on Monday, and Mr. Dillon will stay to address meetings at different points for ten days.
