Mr FULL is having a platform built across Steam Navigation Co's Wharf, so that grain can be raised out of a vessel lying at the wharf, and conveyed by hand-cars into the upper story of warehouse on the opposite side. He expects, in a few days, a schooner load of Ontario wheat coming by way of Boston. At present the flour mill is turning at ornamental rate of one hundred and fifty barrels per day.

GRAND MASTER of masons of the grand lodge of Canada, J. Ross Robertson, Toronto, has issued a circular to four hundred lodges under his jurisdiction, suggesting the 24th inst., which is the festival of St. John the Baptist, be observed as decoration day in the craft and also that the members should attend Divine service on the Sunday following, the collections to be devoted to whatever charitable object may be selected by the respective lodges.

The young Englishman who masqueraded in this city as "R. v. Mr. Blanchard," has gone to Montreal, having been provided with the necessary ticket by some gentleman who became interested in his case. Since a letter has been received here from his mother, which stated that he had caused her great anxiety and trouble, and in order to send him out to Canada she had to sell some of her furniture, giving him \$20 beside his ticket. She is now residing with friends.—Hfx. Chronicle.

At a meeting of the Fish and Game Protection Association held at the office of the President R. R. Fitzgerald, Esq., on the 3rd inst. The last year's report was reviewed and suggestions offered for the present season. The secretary reported the capture of eight nets during last year by the special wardens which the society was instrumental in having appointed. They decided to have the same service continued during the present season. The association expended upwards of \$100 last year in enforcing the law. A memorial was drawn up to be presented to the Minister of Marine and Fisheries at Ottawa, asking the co-operation of the department in the work of the Association was endeavoring to accomplish. All the members seemed to fully realize the necessity of a most thorough and vigor us policy of protection to the fish and game of the province.

Y. S.S. Co., which made her first arrival in St. John on Friday last. City of Columbia is a fine ship of about 2000 tons and with splendid passenger accommodation, having 82 large and well ventilated double-staterooms, with splendid saloon, music room, smoking room, &c. She will run for the present between St. John, Yarmouth and New York, until the company have their second boat ready when the Columbia will be placed on the route between Charlottetown, Halifax and New York direct. She will be the first steamer running direct to Charlottetown and will fill the long felt want of our shippers by giving them direct and rapid connection with New York. Capt. Allan is already known as one of the most gentlemanly and courteous captains and his old friends will be glad to welcome him when he arrives in Charlottetown.

LYING IN STATE

Thompson to be Premier

Cummings Convicted of Cheating.

The Prince of Wales Reprimanded

OTTAWA, June 9.—On Monday night Rev. Mr. Bogart read the Anglican burial service to the members of the late Premier's household. Sir John's body was then taken to the senate chamber, where it now lies in state. The room is heavily draped in black, and a number of floral offerings, one being from Lord and Lady Stanley. The Governor General and the members of the cabinet received the body at ten o'clock, and then the doors were opened and the general public were admitted. Hundreds of people availed themselves of the opportunity to take a last look at the chieftain's face. The Conservative members of the House of Commons will take charge of the remains, and keep watch in relays of fours an hour and a half. The members of the cabinet will probably be the pall-bearers.

According to the programme the funeral procession will be led by a squad of Dominion police, followed by the Dragoon Guards, eight abreast; the officiating clergy; undertakers; twelve pall bearers; six barbers (Dominion police) followed by the hearse mourners; governor-general and staff; senior officers of troops; senior naval officers; governors of Ontario, Quebec, Nova Scotia, New Brunswick; and Manitoba, in the above order, with those of the other provinces if present; members of the cabinet; general officers of the army not in the command; senators; members of the house of commons, and press gallery; provincial executive councils; legislative assemblies; foreign consuls; deputy ministers; various societies; civic bodies; political clubs and deputations.

Thompson the Man.

OTTAWA, June 9.—Sir Hector Langevin will be asked to form a Cabinet but he will decline the honor. Then Sir John Thompson will be called on to assume the leadership and no doubt he will undertake the task.

The Baccarat Scandal.

LONDON, June 9.—After being out fifteen minutes the Jury in the baccarat scandal case returned a verdict against Sir William Cummings. The evidence was strong against him and the verdict was expected. Cummings thus stands condemned as a cheat.

LONDON, June 8.—The trial of the suit of Sir Wm. Gordon Cummings against Mr. and Mrs. Arthur Wils n, Mr. and Mrs. Lyette Green and Mr. Berkeley Levett for damages on account of alleged slanderous statements made by them in regard to the baccarat playing of Cummings at Tranby Croft last September, was resumed to-day. Sir Charles Russell concluded his address for the defendants and Sir Edward Clarke took the floor in behalf of the plaintiffs. He created a great sensation by his reference to the Prince of Wales. He said that it had been a common talk, that the Prince's continual presence in court during the trial had been for the purpose of restraining the lawyers engaged in the case from commenting upon the prince's connection with it, but he intimated that the presence in court of the prince would not prevent his making any comment necessary. He had a painful duty to perform, and he intended to perform it honestly and impartially. As he spoke, Sir Edward squarely faced the Prince of Wales, upon whom every eye in the court was fixed, and who nervously crossed his legs while the audience was utterly aghast at what was considered the audacity of the attorney. Commenting on Sir Charles Russell's statement that Cummings' name would be stricken from the army list, (even if the jury found for the plaintiff), Sir Edward said in a loud voice, that it would be impossible for the authorities to do any such thing as to leave on the list the names of Field Marshals the Prince of Wales and Gen. Williams.

Destroyed by Forest Fires.

FREDERICTON, N. B., June 9.—The intercolonial station at Kent Junction was destroyed by forest fires.

Killed on Parade.

BERLIN, June 9.—While a company of Grenadiers were exercising before the emperor several men were prostrated by lightning. Two died.

A Judge Charged With Contempt.

FREDERICTON, June 9.—Judge Stedman charged with contempt of court in connection with the famous Queen's County election case came before the Supreme Court this morning in charge of the sheriff and was sworn to interrogatories. If not asked in four days he will be discharged.

The June Term of the Supreme Court met at noon to-day a Summerside—the Master of the Rolls as presiding Judge. The following Grand Jurors were sworn and empanelled:—Robert H. In the charge to the Grand Jury, the Judge in laying down the duties of the jury, referred to the working of the Canada Temp rance Act, and said that no matter what opinion they might have of the advisability of the statute, yet while it was the law of the land, it was their duty to see that it was properly enforced and that if they knew any case in which the prosecutors or magistrates or bailiffs neglected to perform their duty, then it was their right and duty to present the facts to the court when bills of indictment would be preferred and the guilty parties punished.

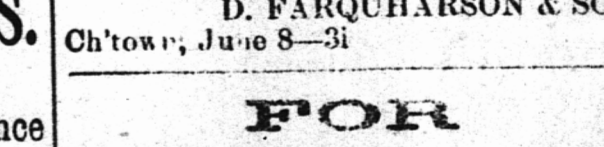

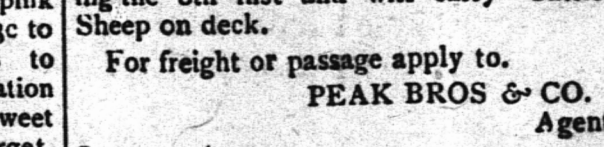
