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Agriculture Meeting In O'Leary

—There was a very enthusiastic Federation of Agriculture meeting in the O'Leary Hall on Friday afternoon Feb. 17. Chairman was Mr. Errol Stetson and Mr. Bernard Shea was secretary. The first speaker was Mr. Charles Yeo, St. Eleanor's, president of the Prince County Federation of Agriculture. Mr. Yeo explained the fine service that the Federation of Agriculture of Canada is rendering to the farmers, mentioning the price of butter being set at 58 cents a pound. The government originally was going to set the price at 50 cents but due to the efforts of Dr. Hanan, president of the C. F. A. the price was raised to 58 cents. The C. F. A. had asked that the price for eggs be 46 cents a dozen. It was set at 38 cents which means about 32 cents for the farmer. The speaker said the C. F. A. has 400,000 members and is particularly strong in the West and Ontario but while the Maritimes were slower getting started they are now making splendid progress towards organization and new members. The membership fee is three dollars in P. E. I.

Mr. Yeo mentioned marketing boards, which are not selling agencies, but which will put a price on farm produce, put a price on cost of production and will regulate the price the consumer will have to pay. The marketing boards would regulate the flow of commodities so that the price would remain constant and that there should be no glutting of the market. The speaker mentioned the fact that the Dominion Minister of Agriculture at the recent C. F. A. meeting in Niagara Falls discussed the marketing boards.

On Feb. 28 the farmers in all their school districts will be asked to vote on the questions:—Are you in favor or not of marketing boards? Are you in favor of Daylight Saving Time?

In each school section the farmers will be organized with a chairman, a secretary and an alternate member, in case the chairman or secretary is absent.

The following were appointed in their respective school sections:—UNIONVALE: Errol Stetson, Edmer MacLellan and Earl Jelly; O'LEARY: Alvin Palmer, Waldo Phillips; MOUNT ROYAL: Chapman Jelley, Harry MacDonald, Raynall McNeill; CARLETON: Beaton Crozier, Carrol MacWilliams, Barn Webb; WOODSTOCK: Roy Arbing, Gilbert Gaudet, Arthur Cornish. The second speaker was Mr. Cyrus Poirier of Summerside, secretary of the Prince County Federation and who has been active in Co-operative work since 1913. He explained about the Federation set-up. There is a Provincial Federation of Agriculture, a Maritime Federation, a Canadian Federation and in conjunction with about 20 countries, an International Federation of Agriculture.

The addresses of both speakers were interesting, instructive and informative. Mention was made of the splendid work of Mrs. Robert Woodside, who is an enthusiastic booster in the work of the Federation. Many questions were asked by members of the audience and answered by Mr. Yeo and Mr. Poirier. Many of the farmers paid their dues and joined the Federation.—O

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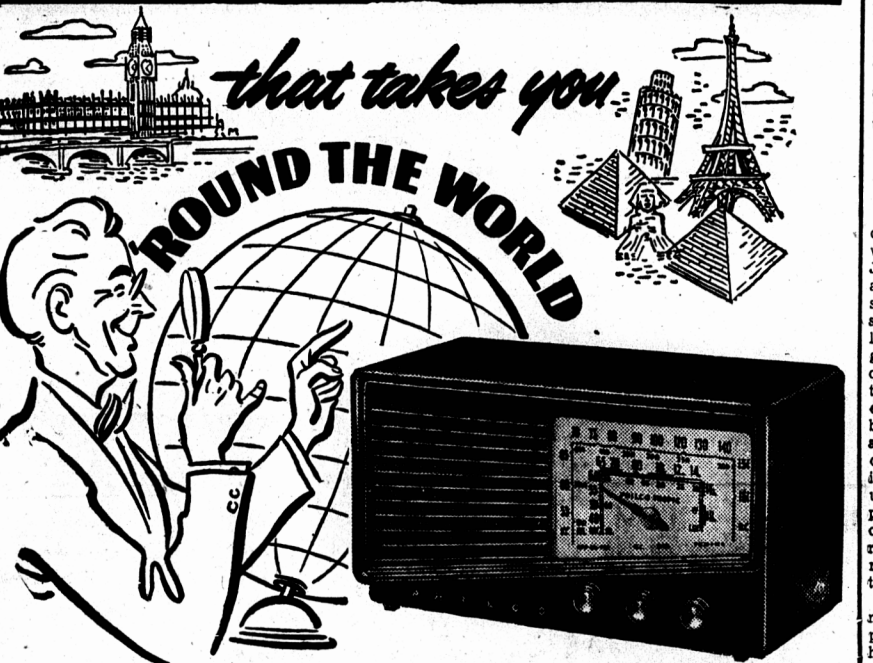

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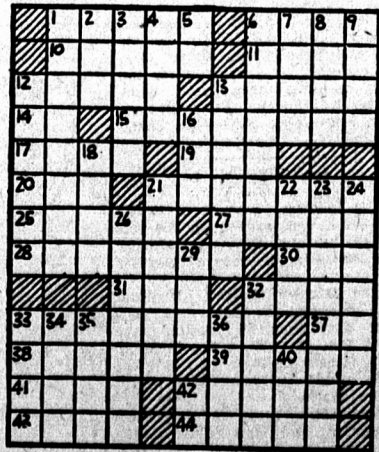
