Let's Talk It Over

This is the time of year when schools might vary their program of instruction a little by giving the pupils a few lessons on water safety. The swimming and water safety classes held on the Island during the past few years are doing wonderful work, but teachers cannot go wrong in supplementing this instruction because it is probable all children who face the risks of summer bathing do not join these classes, and in any case such precautionary teaching will bear a lot of repetition. Senior classes in hygiene should feature in June artificial respiration, and care of the patient who has been rescued from drowning. No one knows when knowledge of this kind among school students will save a life.

A news item reports that "nearly 1,200 Canadian children under 15 died in traffic accidents last year." Compare that staggering total with polo deaths in Canada in the same period, a total of 225. At last an All-Canada conference of highway safety met at Ottawa this month to find some answer to this problem, and institute a program to cut the wholesale slaughter on our highways. Let us hope that a real solution can be found, and in the meantime, Mr. Moto! If you and I can do our share by driving with a little extra care when children are in the vicinity, we all know that it is quite possible that we may be exonerated from all blame in a highway accident involving a child, and yet know in our hearts that with a little extra care the accident might have been avoided. The thoughtlessness of children lays most of the responsibility for an accident at their doors, but extra care on our parts may still prevent the tragedy.
