

### Three Accidents Probed By Police

**SUMMERSIDE** — The Borden RCMP detachment investigated three accidents over the weekend, the most recent being Saturday night in Crapaud.

This accident saw only one vehicle involved. A half-ton truck, reportedly driven by Ken MacLean of Charlottetown, failed to make the turn as it came down the hill into the village from the direction of Borden. The vehicle broke through a guard rail and went over a 15-foot embankment.

The vehicle sustained heavy damage and it was believed that both the driver and another occupant were taken to a hospital in Charlottetown but this could not be confirmed last night.

Friday night, Garnet Stewart of Crapaud lost control of the half-ton truck he was driving in heavy rain. The vehicle sustained heavy damage as it veered off the highway into the wooded area.

Saturday morning at approximately 8 o'clock, vehicles driven by Roland Ramsay of Borden and Lloyd Bonness of Summerside sustained damage estimated at \$350 when they both turned into the same parking spot on the Borden pier.

## Hon. Paul Martin Visits O'Leary On October 26

**TIGNISH** — Hon. J. Watson MacNaught, minister of mines and technical surveys, addressed an organizational meeting of the Liberal Women's Association at Tignish last week in the Legion Community Hall following a meeting of poll chairman earlier in the day.

Other speakers were Robert Campbell, M.L.A., Russell Perry, chairman of the West Prince County Liberal Association, and Andrew Wells, speaking on behalf of Mr. MacNaught.

Mr. MacNaught devoted most of his talk to organization within the party for the election campaign, and the important role played by women in the political life of the Liberal party. ## Mines Minister Talks To Funeral Directors

**SUMMERSIDE** — The federal minister of mines and technical surveys, Hon. J. Watson MacNaught, gave an address Saturday night to Island funeral directors at their annual convention here, on Northumberland Strait transportation dating back to the time of Confederation, as well as discussing the proposed causeway.

Most of his address pertained to the combination causeway, tunnel and bridge, to be built from Jourmain Island, N.B. to Borden at an estimated cost of \$148 million.

The need for such a causeway had become more evident over the years as a result of the increase in motor vehicle traffic to and from this province.

With this increase in traffic, averaging 10 per cent per year, it was realized that the ferry service was becoming inadequate, he said.

This combination causeway will initially have two lanes of traffic and one rail line but will be constructed so as to be possible to add two more traffic lanes at a cost of an extra \$10 million. "It would appear," the minister said, "that by 1980 the additional two lane will have to be put in to accommodate the increase in traffic."

It is hoped, he said, that sufficient fresh water can be located to construct these cylinders in Borden. He added that engineers are drilling and testing for fresh water supplies there now.

The minister was introduced to the convention by William J. Brown of Charlottetown.

Johnson, who comes here Sunday from Washington, D.C., and will hear the Pope's peace appeal to the UN General Assembly.

**HAS KINSHIP WITH CHURCH**

That international body, Pope Paul has said, has a kinship to the church's broad "concept of humanity" and its "spiritual mission to the world."

"Our only intention," he declared, is to plead for "harmony, justice, brotherhood and peace among... men beloved of God."

There is an urgency in the journey and it comes in a testing time for the UN.

It also comes against an ominous backdrop of strife and gunfire—of bloodshed in Viet Nam, of smouldering tensions in the Near East and the Dominican Republic, of battles between India and Pakistan, or rumblings from China.

Amid the portents, darkened by the further dangers of wider war and modern man's capability of nuclear destruction, the Pope takes to his new path in an ancient cause.

The church's world-wide corps of bishops, assembled at the Vatican council in Rome, were to join in a special mass of prayer Monday for the Pope's mission. Other Christians, great and humble, offered similar petitions.

—It will be the first trip to the western hemisphere by a reigning Pope.

—It will be the longest papal trip in history—4,200 miles each way, a total of 8,500 miles—exceeding his 2,904-mile round trip to the Holy Land and 8,000-mile flight to India last year.

—It will be the first Papal visit outside Italy to a predominantly Christian land in 151 years and it comes among hints of even wider travels soon, perhaps across the Iron Curtain into Poland.
