Tommy Davis Of Dodgers Takes 2nd Batting Crown

CINCINNATI (AP)—Tommy Davis of Los Angeles Dodgers edged three former titleholders in winning the National League batting championship for the second straight season in 1963, official averages confirmed Saturday.

The final statistics released by the league's service bureau showed that Davis finished on top with a .326 average. This marked the first time a National League repeated as the leading batter since Stan Musial of St. Louis won three consecutive crowns in 1950, 1951 and 1952. Davis captured the 1962 title with a .346 mark.

Roberto Clemente of Pittsburgh Pirates, the 1961 batting champ, was second last season with .320. He was followed by Hank Aaron of Milwaukee and Dick Groat of St. Louis with .319 each. Aaron was the circuit's top batsman in 1959 and Groat in 1950.

Tommy Davis is a 24-year-old outfielder, born in Brooklyn. Last season was his fourth in the big leagues. He hit .276 and .278 in his first two years with the Dodgers.

Maury Wills, Dodgers' fleet shortstop, tied a league record by leading in stolen bases for the fourth consecutive year. He stole 40 times in 1963, considerably under his record total of 104 in 1962.

Musial, who announced his retirement from the game in September, established or extended three major league records. They were for most total bases, lifetime, 6,184; most long hits, lifetime, 1,377 and most seasons, 100 or more games, 21. The Cards' outfielder hit .283 in 124 games last season.

Frank Bolling of Milwaukee had the most sacrifice bunts, 17, while Ron Santo of Chicago collected the most sacrifice flies, 11. McCovey had the longest consecutive game batting streak, 24.

Pinson, Santo and Cards' Bill White were the only players to participate in each of his club's 162 games.

St. Louis had the highest team batting average, .271. Then came San Francisco, .258; Philadelphia, .252, pennant-winning Los Angeles, .251 and Pittsburgh, .250. New York Mets had the lowest mark, .219.

Giants slammed the most home runs, 197. Cards scored the most hits, 1,977.

Joey Giardello Captures Boxing Title From Tiger

ATLANTIC CITY, N.J. (AP)—Joey Giardello, a battle-scared veteran, won the world middleweight boxing crown from Nigeria's Dick Tiger Saturday night in 15 rounds on a widely cheered decision at Convention Hall.

The 38-year-old Giardello, pro for 16 years, was given eight rounds by referee Paul Cavalier, the sole official, who voted five for Tiger, the 3-0-1 favorite, and called two rounds even.

Giardello used the old pattern of job, sharpshoot and move against an ever-present opponent, Tiger missed often and seemed to have trouble catching up with Joey.

There were no knockdowns and neither fighter appeared to be in trouble at any time as Giardello took an early lead, quickly widened it and closed strong.

MISSED FIRST TIME
Giardello had missed on one previous try for the 160-pound crown when he fought 15-round draw with Gene Fullmer in Roxman, Mont., in 1960. Since then, Tiger had twice defended against him.

Tiger, unbeaten in 10 fights over a three-year span, had not fought since he whipped Fullmer last August in Nigeria. At 150 pounds, Tiger had trouble untracking himself against an elusive target.

Giardello, 158 pounds, flicked a left jab, moved away and then cut loss with his right hand at long range. Tiger stalked but failed to throw enough punches. When Tiger did cut loose, too many were wild and too many were blocked.

Referee Cavalier gave the

new champ the first, fourth, sixth, seventh, eighth, ninth, 11th and 14th rounds. He scored the second, third, fifth, 10th and 12th for Tiger and called the 13th and 15th even. The Associated Press card was 9-5 in favor of Giardello.

Tiger was making his third defence. Both the others had been against Fullmer, from whom he won the title Oct. 23, 1962, in San Francisco.

It was the climax of a long uphill battle for Giardello. He was in trouble with the law in 1955 for assault on a gas station attendant and served time in jail.
