Invents New Technique For Open Air Theatres A recent issue of the Financial Post in referring to the future of open air theatres serving surrounding rural communities without movie houses, makes special reference to the industry's future optimism as stemming from the invention of Mr. Gordon F. White, an Ottawa moving-picture expert, which holds promise of revolutionizing Canadian drive-ins.

White's unit will make it possible to show outdoor movies in daylight. The effect is accomplished by using a one-piece transparent plastic screen "energized" by a coating of leipolarized material, covered partly by a protective canopy to keep out extraneous light. The projector is enclosed in a "shadow" box behind the screen. The unit sells for \$50,000. Work is under way on the Trafalgar Drive-In at Oakville, Ont.; a double-barrelled pioneer, which will not only be the first to make use of this new machine, but also the first Canadian open-air theatre equipped to handle three-dimensional films. It will be a 1,000-car twin-screen unit and is expected to cost over \$200,000.

Record Blood Clinic Attendance At Ch'town There were 117 registered at the concluding session of the Charlottetown Blood Donor Clinics held at Red Cross headquarters yesterday afternoon. This brought the grand total for Charlottetown to 501 for the three clinics, a record attendance for the number of hours of operation.

Ident Eisenhower and Prime Minister Churchill agree there should be a high-level meeting with Russia in appropriate circumstances. In Bermuda they will discuss whether the circumstances are appropriate now.

Final Communiqué The final communiqué said the ministers "reviewed the state of relations with the Soviet Union and agreed that no opportunity should be lost of composing or at least easing the differences which at present vitiate the world."

Integration Possible The speaker believed a solution could be found and if it would integrate Canada as never before. One of the things which will greatly aid in accomplishing this is a greater acquaintance with the people themselves in order to link all parts of the country together.

Refers To Middle East The communiqué itself referred cautiously to the discussion of the Middle East in these words: "The prime ministers recognized the international importance of the Suez canal and of the effective maintenance of the military installations in the canal zone. They agreed that it is in the common interest that the outstanding issues in the Middle East should be settled on the basis of ensuring the peace and security of the Middle East countries, consistently with the sovereignty of each and promoting the social and economic development."

Leading Figure In Montreal Dies MONTREAL, (CP) — Michael Hirsch, 89, for many years a leading figure in philanthropic and charitable undertakings, died Tuesday.

He was born in Richmond, Que., and came to Montreal with his parents in 1875. He became associated with the cigar and tobacco business, first in a retail store. Later, with his father and brothers, he founded the firm of J. Hirsch and Sons. He retired from active participation in business in 1921.

He was an incorporator of the Federation of Jewish Philanthropies and in 1929 was joint chairman of a campaign which raised money to build the Jewish General Hospital. He was also a member of the Canadian Manufacturers Association and the Montreal Board of Trade.

Death In Winnipeg Of Mr. Frank Gaudet

Mr. W. A. Gaudet received a telegram from Winnipeg yesterday morning announcing the death of his brother Frank in that city. Mr. Gaudet, who left here many years ago, was employed by the Canadian National Railway and at the time of his retirement some years ago, was a conductor on the run between Rainy River and Winnipeg.

Older residents will recall his prowess as a hockey player when the seven-man team was in vogue and the Gaudet brothers, Frank and Jack, starred on the "Victoria's".

Mr. Gaudet is survived by his wife, whom he met and married in Western Canada, and one son Fred, who also resides in Winnipeg. Another son Jack, an air pilot, was killed in the last war. Other surviving relatives are five brothers, Arthur, Fred and Henry in Charlottetown, Jack in Montague and Louis in Toronto.

Increase Shown In Rail Traffic

Paced by heavy shipments of potatoes the exports via rail from this Province showed another sizeable increase last month on the Borden-Cape Tormentine route of the C. N. R. Carloads of potatoes rose from 653 in May of last year to 857 this May and the total exports rose from 1,071 cars to 1,222. During the same period the imports also showed an increase from 1,859 to 1,976.

The principal other commodities shipped last month with the May 1953 figures in brackets were empty barrels 8 (0); eggs 9 (11); turkeys 54 (32); lumber 16 (10); flour and feed 145 (164); fertilizer 443 (335); gas and oils 246 (211); lime 297 (309); brick and cement 39 (37); building material 17 (34).

Of the carloads shipped from here 726 originated at points between Charlottetown, Summerside and Borden while 1,474 of the incoming carloads went to that region. There were 251 cars shipped from points east and south of Charlottetown and 313 imported. The balance of 245 cars leaving here started from west of Summerside, the only section to show a favorable trade balance. The imported carloads amounted to only 199.

Italian Election Results In Doubt

ROME, (AP)—Premier Alcide de Gasperi's pro-Western coalition government won an absolute majority in the Italian Senate, but its majority control of the Chamber of Deputies was still in doubt. Reversing a previous decision not to release before Wednesday a party announced Tuesday night final official figures showed the government won 125 out of the 243 Senate seats.

De Gasperi's own Christian Democrats captured 116 Senate seats, and their allies in three other parties won nine. In the last Senate the government coalition had 196 seats, but the upper house of Parliament then comprised 344 members. Many appointed seats have been abolished.

The far left captured 87 seats, the Communists took 54 and the Socialists 28. A Socialist-Communist alliance won 115 seats, and there is one independent leftist totalled 109.

Most Spectacular Gains Resurgent far rightists made the most spectacular gains. Monarchists won 16 seats and the neo-Fascist Italian Social Movement nine, for a total of 25. These two parties combined had only three in the old Senate.

Six lifetime senators make up the total of 243. The great question mark is whether de Gasperi's government also will win more than 50 per cent of the Chamber of Deputies vote. Under a new law, any party with 10 per cent of the vote or more gets 6.5 per cent of the chamber seats.

Unofficial Figures Unofficial figures from 60 of the 91 provinces Tuesday night indicated the government coalition was receiving almost exactly 50 per cent. For this reason, it appeared that final tabulations would determine whether de Gasperi's forces were slightly over or slightly under 50 per cent.

Of 19,695,793 votes unofficially tabulated out of about 28,000,000 in the chamber election, the centre coalition had 9,821,183. The far left had 7,402,190, and the far right 2,472,420.

The Primate will arrive here by car accompanied by The Rt. Rev. Robert H. Waterman, Lord-Bishop of Nova Scotia.

Prior to attending the Diocesan Synod meetings in Halifax, Archbishop Barfoot attended the Coronation of Queen Elizabeth II returning to Canada by air.

Commencing at 4 p.m. in the Confederation Chamber the Primate will meet His Honor Justice MacGuigan, Administrator of the Government of Prince Edward Island, Premier A. W. Matheson, Mayor J. D. Stewart of Charlottetown, Mayor Henry Wedge of Summerside and other leading citizens of the Province.

Following a dinner at St. Paul's Rectory given in honor of His Grace by the Anglican clergy of the Province, a special jubilee and visitation service will be held in St. Paul's Church commencing at 8 o'clock, to which the public is welcome. Immediately after the church service a general reception will be held in the Parish Hall.
