BEATING THE RECORD.—A Springfield, Mass., despatch of the 14th says that the pacer Johnstone went a quarter mile to beat his record on that day in 2 1/4 seconds, the fastest time for the distance ever made in the world.

MILITARY.—The members of No. 2 Battalion G. A. will meet at the Drill Shed, to-morrow (Tuesday) evening, at eight o'clock for the purpose of making arrangements for the annual prize competition, to be held at Kensington Rifle Range on a day to be decided upon.

PRACTICAL JOKING.—On Saturday night, or Sunday morning, some wag tacked an illuminated placard with "Dunville Irish Whiskey" upon the door of a Queen Street merchant, well known for his temperance zeal, and the sign shone out conspicuously all day yesterday.

NOVA SCOTIA GOLD FIELDS.—The Nelson gold mine at Brookfield, Lunenburg Co., N. S., has proved of unusual richness. Mr. W. J. Nelson brought into Bridgewater recently, a bar of gold weighing one hundred and fifteen ounces, crushed from twenty tons of quartz, the output of eighteen days labor.

LARGE SHIPMENT OF SHEEP.—There was quite a scene around the I. C. R. yard at St. John yesterday morning, the railway people having their hands pretty full to attend to six car loads of about 1300 sheep that were being sent to various parts of Massachusetts by dealers in New Brunswick and P. E. Island.

VALUE OF LAND.—The value of land in England has fallen 33 per cent. in ten years, but this is nothing compared with the decline in some parts of New England. An exchange reports the sale of a Vermont farm with buildings for fifty-two dollars, the farm cutting fifteen tons of hay per year. Evidently access to the great market of 60 millions of people has not brought universal prosperity to Vermont.

A HANDSOME FORTUNE.—Says the Halifax Chronicle: The estate of the late Mrs. Judge Wilnot is valued at \$40,000. The will has not yet been probated in consequence of the absence of the witnesses. It is understood that Mrs. Wilnot leaves \$200 each to her eighteen nieces, \$100 to her nephew, son of Dr. Lewis, and \$8,000 to charities, principally in New Brunswick. Edward Wilnot, half brother of the late judge, is said to be the sole executor.

BURGLARS ON THE MOVE.—An attempt was made to break into Senter's grocery store, corner of Grafton and Cumberland streets, at an early hour on Sunday morning. The would-be burglars were frightened off before effecting an entrance. Several other attempts at burglary are reported. There is evidently a gang at work, and it would be well for citizens generally to see that their doors, windows and cellar hatches are securely fastened before retiring to rest.

BURGLARS.—During Saturday night the premises of the late Ralph Brecken, Esq., Linden Grove, were invaded by cellar thieves who effected an entrance through a coal cellar hatch, only capable of admitting a small boy or grained man. A raid was made upon a quantity of provisions, after which they sought an entrance to the dwelling by ascending the stairway, but were disappointed on finding the door bolted. Numerous partly burned matches marked the track of the thieves. Anyone possessing two bull dogs—one metal, the other animal—will please leave them for use at the premises.

Nova Scotia News.

HALIFAX, Sept. 16.

The artillery detachment returned from Quebec this morning, after an unprecedented success. They won both shifts, forty and sixty-four pounder prizes, besides several individual prizes.

An interesting lawsuit is likely to result out of an order of the Chief Justice on Saturday. The Queen Hotel was advertised to be sold at 12 o'clock under a foreclosure order, at the suit of the Enos Collins estate. The amount due was over \$37,000. Mr. Sheraton has spent about \$16,000 for repairs since he became manager, and all this was likely to go. Mrs. Sheraton has a lease. She applied for a stay, and Donald Keith and Joseph Seaton paid the amount due into the court at her instance. Just as the Sheriff began calling for bids the order was served on him.

The Foot Guards' Trouble.

OTTAWA, Sept. 15.

Lieut.-Col. Macpherson, of the Governor-General's F of Guards, has resigned command of the regiment. The matter was decided by Sir Adolph Caron to-day. The Colonel will not, however, retire from command of the corps for about three months, when his successor will be named. The object of this move is to get the department out of the necessity of establishing a dangerous precedent in allowing officers to resign their Colonel out of command by resigning in a body.

A Narrow Escape.

NIAGARA FALLS, N. Y., Sept. 16.

Charles Perry, who went through the whirlpool rapids on August 28th, 1887, in a life boat, attempted the same feat this afternoon. The boat passed the whirlpool rapids and out of the whirlpool safely, but when about half a mile below the whirlpool the waves dashed in the manhole door, forcing him out into the boat. Being thrown overboard he swam through the dangerous rapids to Lewiston, a distance of three miles, where fishermen picked him up in an exhausted condition.

Irish News.

DUBLIN, Sept. 15.

Eighteen families in Clare Island avoided eviction by paying the rent. Five families were evicted. A large meeting was held in Phoenix Park to-day to protest against the imprisonment of Thomas Maroney, in jail over a year and a half for refusing to testify in the case of Herbert Stain's tenants. Lord Mayor O'Brien and other prominent Nationalists addressed the meeting. Several reporters were present.

Opening Delayed.

RIVER DU LOUPE, Sept. 16.

The opening of the Temiscouata Railway will be delayed till about the 1st of October by the giving away of some temporary crib work, owing to a landslide on the bank of Lake Temiscouata when filling and ballasting were in progress.

The Yellow Fever Scourge.

JACKSONVILLE, Sept. 15.

The official bulletin for the 24 hours ending 6 p. m., gives the new cases as 74 and the deaths 9. The total cases to date are 995, and the total deaths 126. Some 37 nurses arrived to-day.
