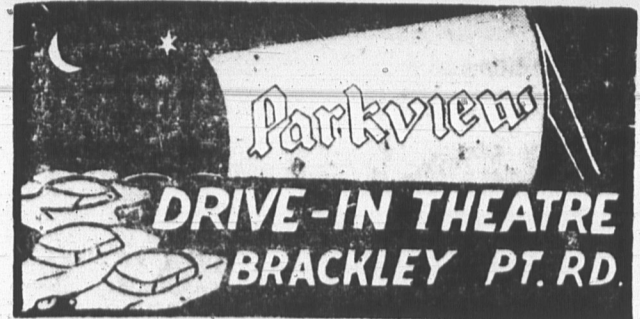


Lions Meeting Held Recently

 It was decided to hold a chicken barbecue for all club members and their wives later in the month and a number of members were appointed to make the necessary arrangements in connection with this event.

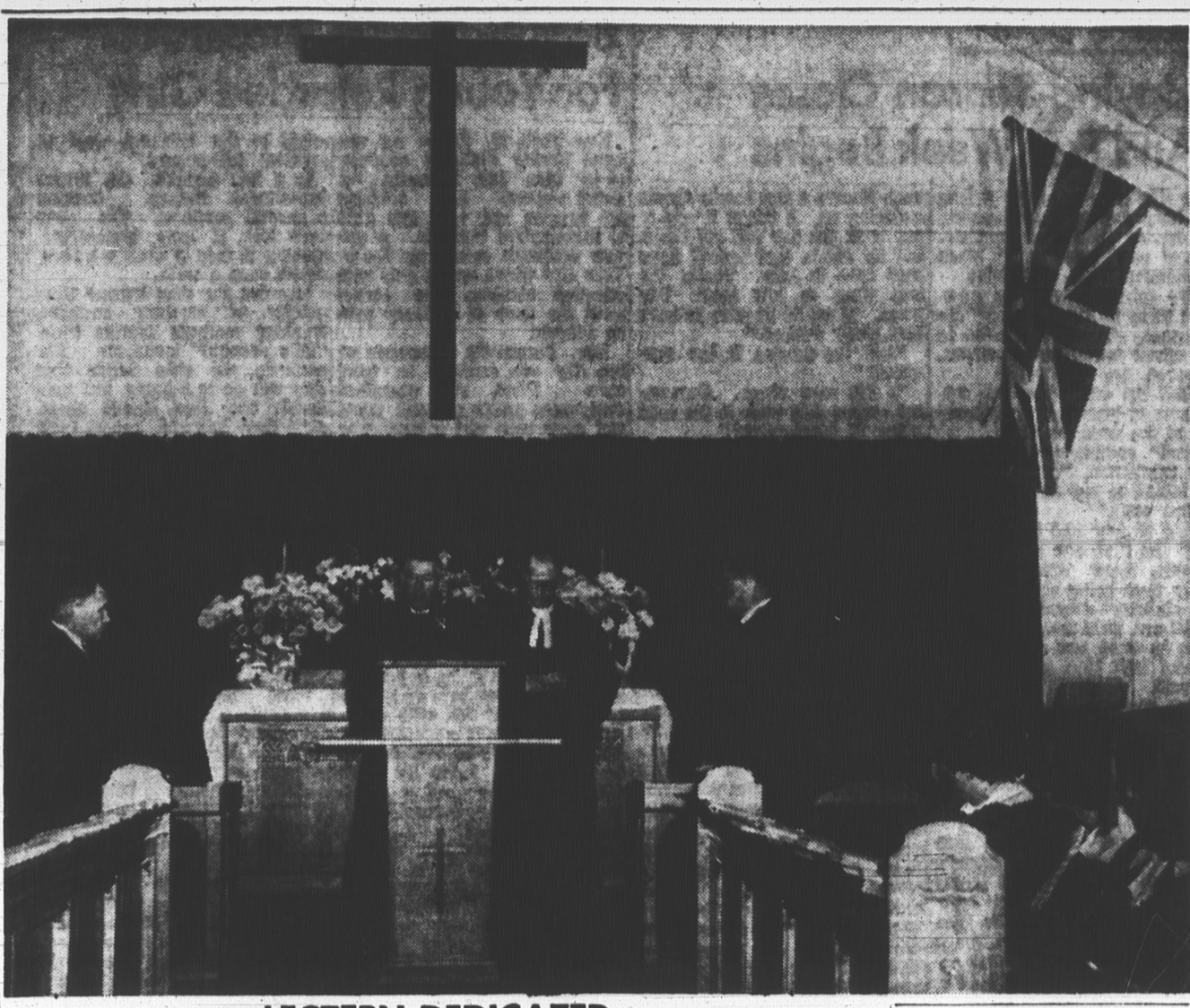
H. Arsenault Dies Suddenly
 The death occurred at the Prince County Hospital on Sunday August 7, of Hubert Arsenault, at the age of 73, after only a few weeks of illness.
 Hubert Arsenault was born at St. Hubert son of the late Mr. and Mrs. Joseph M. Arsenault. He has lived in various parts of the Island and New Brunswick until about twenty years ago when he built himself a home in St. Hubert and has lived there until last January when he moved to the Summerside Manor in Summerside where he remained until a few weeks before his death when he had to enter hospital.
 He was married to the former Christina Doucette of Timish. He is survived by a brother-in-law Dolore Arsenault of Summerside and several nieces and nephews. He was predeceased by a brother Moses who was killed in action during World War I, also by a sister Marie Anne (Mrs. Dolore Arsenault).

Premier Gives Reply To Statement
 In replying to a statement made Saturday morning by the Leader of the Opposition, W.R. Shaw, Premier Alex Campbell said that Mr. Shaw had come to the meeting initially with a purpose of Thursday's meeting with Howard Darling, chairman of the Canadian Maritime Commission.
 "The meeting initially was a courtesy call from Mr. Darling to meet with me and determine the most appropriate time for the commission hearing into the proposed increases in CNR ferry rates," stated Premier Campbell.
 "As to Mr. Shaw's statement alleging that the opportunity has been lost for Island groups to make representations to Mr. Darling, I can assure the leader of the opposition this is not the case."
 "I have expressed the feeling of Mr. Darling that it would not now be convenient either for the government of the province, people in the tourist industry and those in agriculture to set their work aside and begin preparations for the full scale hearing on ferry rates.
 "I believe therefore that these hearings will not occur before late October and Mr. Darling will be in the province one month prior to the hearings to make arrangements for all interested individuals and groups to have their say," stated Premier Campbell.
