RED SKELTON, IN M-G-M'S HILARIOUS "WATCH THE BIRDIE"

If you think one Red Skelton is funny, wait until you see three "Reds" in M-G-M's hilarious new comedy, "Watch the Birdie," showing at the Prince Edward Theatre, Thursday. In what is undoubtedly the most uproarious concoction of laughs, gags and slapstick antics the popular comic has ever appeared, he enacts not only the hero, Rusty Cameron, but Rusty's father, and his grandfather!

Rusty is a photographer who meets the girl of his dreams, Arlene Dahl, when she rescues him from a watery grave. He eventually romances her, and also captures her heart by saving her from a fleeing at the hands of her unscrupulous financial adviser, played by Leon Ames, but before this happens he becomes involved in so daffy and howling a series of adventures that the spectator has a hard time catching his breath from one laugh to the next.

From the story's very opening, in which Rusty gets tumbled up with a pneumatic drill, through such episodes as his contortions in photographing the opening of a real estate development owned by Miss Dahl, his baffling experiences with a deep-freeze unit, the scene in which he goes to a clinic to cure his cold, an unforgettable incident in which he is propelled through the water by an outboard motor, to the final wild chase in which he and Miss Dahl escape their pursuers via a two-story straddle truck, "Watch the Birdie" unfolds a parade of furious-paced funny situations which pile on top of each other in a frenzy of laughter.

Each of Skelton's three-fold characterizations is a gem in itself. As Rusty he is the resolute, eager-to-please but totally inept cameraman never making a step without a comic blunder. As Pop he plays another "lame-brain," even daffier than the son. As Grandpop he becomes the boulevardier and slick ladies-man.

Magistrate's Court At Georgetown

Stipendiary Magistrate for King's County, Joseph W. MacDonald, K. C., held Court on Friday, April 13th, at 2:30 p.m., in the Court House in Georgetown. The first case was that of a resident of Glen Williams, charged under section 223 of the Criminal Code of Canada, with unlawfully causing a disturbance by swearing on the road. The party charged pleaded "guilty" and after being found guilty he was fined \$20.00 and costs of \$5.20, and in default of payment to serve one month in King's County Jail.

The next case involved a resident of De Gros Marsh, charged with being unlawfully intoxicated in a public place, contrary to Section 20, sub. sec. 2 of the Prince Edward Island Temperance Act. The party pleaded guilty and was fined \$20.00 and costs of \$10.00 or one month in jail.

The final case saw a resident of Montague charged under Section 57 (c) of the Public Works and Highway Act, with having unlawfully operated a motor vehicle in excess of 7500 lbs. on a public highway. The charged party pleaded guilty and was fined \$5.00 and costs or 10 days in jail.
