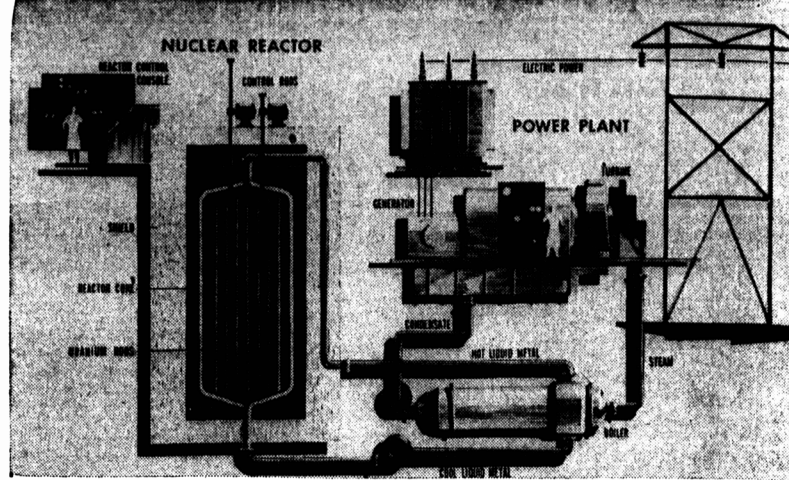

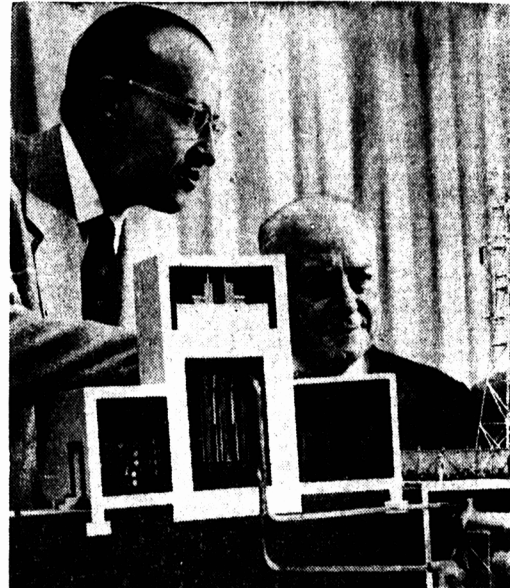

One Plant Could Feed 2,000 Homes With Atomic-produced Electricity



Dr. Chauncey Starr, left, director of a U.S. aviation company's atomic energy research department, is shown describing the scale model of a proposed pilot plant for the generation of electrical power from atomic energy, based on a design completed by the company for the Atomic Energy commission. At right is J. H. Kindeberger, chairman of the board. Top photo shows a schematic drawing of the proposed pilot plant. Heat produced by atomic fission in reactor, left, would be absorbed by a liquid metal passing through the reactor core. Liquid metal is then piped to water boiler, lower centre, where steam is produced. The steam would drive the turbine generator, centre, producing electricity. About 8,000 kilowatts, enough to supply 2,000 average homes, could be produced by the pilot plant.
