Scheduled Free X-Rays For Institutions' Staffs

Health Minister Henry W. Wedge has announced that, as a winter project of the Division of Tuberculosis Control, patients and staffs of the various institutions for the care of the aged in free chest x-rays. Mr. Wedge said the P.E.I. TB League is utilizing their mobile x-ray equipment in these surveys.

It was pointed out by the minister that in this century the burden of the T.B. problem has shifted from young adults to older persons.

Reviewing the 55 sanatorium admissions during 1965, it was pointed out that 27 were over the age of 60, three being in the 80 to 90 age group.

Today there are 15 patients under treatment in the sanatorium over the age of 70 years. It is generally agreed that geriatric patients who in the past were considered too old to have T.B. were the chief source of infection to the young.

Today, due to more selective mass chest x-ray surveys and the increasing awareness of the family doctor that tuberculosis is not uncommon among old people, health officials are diagnosing and segregating and treating more old people than ever before.

Students of infectious diseases have found that most old people "break down" because they were infected with tuberculosis germs early in life, those who did not become ill, developed a degree of immunity but harboured the germs which remained dormant for years and then flared into activity when their general health became impaired.

The most common conditions associated with spontaneous re-activation of dormant tuberculosis are: old age, alcoholism, late development of diabetes, cortisone therapy for arthritis, and chronic debilitating diseases.

It is for these reasons that mass chest x-ray survey are carried out annually among groups of aged persons, especially in institutions for the aged with the object of detecting unknown chest disease and preventing the spread of any contagious disease among the staffs of the various institutions. The 1966 programme of the Division of Tuberculosis Control in co-operation with the P.E.I. Tuberculosis League will begin this year in Charlottetown with mass x-ray surveys of the patients and staff of the three local institutions for the aged: Sacred Heart Home, today and tomorrow; Provincial Home for the Aged, Feb. 3 and Feb. 4; Beach Grove, Feb. 10 and Feb. 11.
