

### Big Tourist Convention For City In 1955

Mr. George V. Fraser, director of the P.E.I. Travel Bureau, recently returned from Windsor, Ont. where he attended the annual meeting of the Canadian Tourist Association. Last night he said he had made arrangements to have the 1955 convention of the organization held in Charlottetown. The vote for the location was unanimous. En route home he called at Montreal for conferences with travel agencies and others connected with transportation companies to discuss promotion of the island as a tourist area. The Canadian Tourist Association has a membership of 242 and each year sees new members. They are made up of the travel directors of the 10 provinces, representatives of the major transportation companies, large hotels and resorts throughout Canada and the big nationally owned magazines of America. Mr. Fraser tried to get the convention to Charlottetown for 1955 — centennial year — but they are booked two years in advance. He was re-elected a director of the association.

### Navy To Recruit Men For Emergency List

When the Navy's recruiting team visits the island next week, they will be looking for applicants for the R. C. N. (R) Emergency List. The Emergency List of the Royal Canadian Navy Reserve is open to ex-naval personnel, fishermen, and those who follow the sea as a profession. An emergency list man does not have to attend regular drills at the Division and thus men living anywhere in the Province are eligible. He may apply for naval training however at any time of the year. Training is given in H. M. C. Ships and shore establishments. The navy gains of course by having at its disposal in case of an emergency a number of seagoing men who have been trained in navy ways. The men gain by being able to take naval training at full rates of pay during the off seasons when they would not otherwise be gainfully employed. Men from the ages of 16 to the mid-forties (depending on rank and experience) may enroll.

### DECREASE IN FIRE LOSSES NOTED BY THE PROVINCIAL FIRE MARSHAL

Mr. T. A. Campbell, the Provincial Fire Marshal, has announced that the fire losses throughout the Province were considerably lower in 1953 than in 1952. Losses in 1952 amounted to \$475,264.50. In 1953 the loss was \$231,616.00, — a decrease of \$243,648.50. Two persons lost their lives from fire in 1953.

Figures released by the Fire Marshal's Office show a total of 301 fires reported in the Province in 1953. Of these, 105 were in Charlottetown with a property loss of \$50,557.00. The largest fires in the Province in 1954, to date, were the Hall and School at North Rustico belonging to the Roman Catholic Episcopal Corp., with a property loss of approximately \$88,000 which occurred on July 10th, also a fire in Murray River which originated in the restaurant owned by Mr. Milburn Buell, destroying stores and dwellings nearby, resulting in a property loss of approximately \$30,000, on May 16th.

In Summerside the property loss amounted to \$15,719.00, with thirty-six fires reported. One hundred and six farm fires throughout the Province showed a property loss estimated at \$105,715.00, caused by sparks on roofs, defective or overheated chimneys, and heating equipment, apart from gasoline motors, careless handling of kerosene, gasoline and other flammable liquids, and in some cases lightning. In recent years we have had many serious farm fires caused by threshing machines with blowers which blow the straw into the loft. The fire starts in the blower from overheated bearings, or metal to metal contact which causes a spark to be blown into the loft filled with loose straw, resulting in a sudden fire and a complete loss of all crop and equipment. In a fire like this, the rural Fire Departments, which are equipped for small fires only, are practically helpless, and can do nothing other than to save the surrounding buildings, at which they have proven most efficient in many such fires.

**SUBURBAN DEPARTMENTS**  
Spring Park and Parkdale, suburbs of Charlottetown, which were recently incorporated under "The Village Incorporation Act," have formed Fire Departments. Both are well trained and would play an increasingly important role in the time of Civil Defense, by reason of their natural strategic location around target areas. They would be considered the first source of support to Charlottetown, should it require assistance or First Aid in time of conflagration. been answered quickly and effectively, states Mr. Campbell. It has long been the accepted idea that the fireman's responsibility to the community is to put fires out when they happen, but a great many of us should feel that an equally important job is to prevent fires from happening. We note from our records that the greatest number of fires take place in the months of April and November, during clean-up time when people are raking up dead grass and burning up old rubbish and leaves. These fires many times get out of control and are the cause of many calls to our Fire Department, resulting in great damage to property.

By a Dominion Proclamation the week of October 3rd to 9th, across Canada is "Fire Prevention Week" and dates back to 1911. Since then it has been widely and faithfully observed. In 1911, the fourth anniversary of the great Chicago fire which occurred October 8th, 1871, the Fire Marshals' Association of North America suggested that October 9th of each year be set apart in order that the public be given the much needed lesson of fire prevention. This was the beginning and eleven years later, the whole week, including Fire Prevention Day, as it was then known, was officially proclaimed "Fire Prevention Week." It is now tradition that "Fire Prevention Week" is always the week in which October 9th falls.

As Fire Prevention Week is aimed at bringing the lesson of Fire Prevention before the public, therefore the Fire Marshal has asked the local Assistant Fire Chiefs and all others in the Fire Service to live up to this year's Fire Prevention slogan:—"Let's grow up — not burn up!"

### George Cadbury Died Monday

**BIRMINGHAM, England, (CP)**—George Cadbury, the man who developed England's thriving milk chocolate industry after taking a tip from a Swiss farmer 50 years ago, died at his home here Monday, he was 76.  
Cadbury's family was in the chocolate and cocoa industry. He joined the firm in 1898. While he was vacationing in Switzerland in 1903, a Swiss dairy farmer suggested chocolate would be better if milk were added to it.  
Cadbury tried and the result was so popular that by 1939 his company was using 26,000,000 gallons of milk a year to make milk chocolate.

Prince Edward Island's percentage of Grade A hogs shows the high percentage of 57.7 for the month of August as compared to 28.0 for the whole of Canada. The province of Alberta shows a low of 17.1 for the month. The only provinces giving the Island any serious competition were New Brunswick and Nova Scotia with 46.1% and 45.8% respectively. Island Yorkshires have consistently topped the list for all of Canada. New Brunswick's and Nova Scotia's fine showing is attributed only to the fact that they are the biggest importers of Island live hogs.
