#### Tenders for Steamship Lines.

TENDERS will be received at the Finance Department, Ottawa, up to and including the 1st day of May next, from persons or companies, for the performance of the following steamship service, viz:—

1st. A line of mail steamers sailing from Halifax to Havana, thence to Kingston, thence to Santiago de Cuba, thence to Canada; and (2nd) a line of mail steamers between Canada and Porto Rico and adjacent islands. Trips to be made by each line fortnightly. Steamers to be of a size sufficient to carry 200 tons of cargo and to be able to steam twelve knots an hour, averaging not less than eleven knots an hour. ### Brain-Forging.

The Popular Science Monthly for April contains an article on "Brain-forging in Childhood," which ought to be read by every parent and teacher in America. It is from the pen of Dr. William A. Hammond. This eminent physician has observed in his practice the evils that follow the over-exertion of the brain in children. He has seen children who were forced to pore over books when they ought to have been asleep or at play, suffering from serious nervous derangement, and in a fair way of becoming ruined for life. From his knowledge of the structure and the powers of the brain and its relation to the other parts of the body, he knows what are the results of over-tasking it when it is weak and immature. He therefore speaks on the subject as one having authority, and it is most unwise to disregard what he says. Besides his teachings recommend themselves to men's common sense, and agree with their experience as far as it goes.

Unthinking and ignorant people, because hard brain-work is not accompanied by visible signs of exertion, imagine that it is not exhausting. This is what Dr. Hammond says on the subject: "Every person who has tried both knows that one hour of intense mental exertion fatigues the whole system more than does a corresponding amount of the most severe physical work." He shows why this must be the case, and what he says is worthy of the most careful attention of those to whom the care of children is entrusted. "The reason for this," he adds, "is evident. The brain not only furnishes the force for thought and the other elements of the mind, but it keeps in action all the other organs of the body. If, therefore, the mind takes more than its share of force, the heart, the stomach, the lungs, the muscles suffer, and the feeling of weariness is experienced." Those, then, who cultivate the brains of children at the expense of the other organs of their bodies, cripple them and do their best to make them unfit to fight the battle of life. A healthy body is just as necessary for the life equipment of a young man or a young woman as a cultivated mind, and the system that forces the mind at the expense of the body does the young of either sex a grievous injustice.

Dr. Hammond would not put books in the hands of a child before he is ten years old. He would give the young a chance to grow. But the child's education need not progress he makes. Education by means of the senses, voluntarily and eagerly carried on, is the only education which Dr. Hammond would give the young human creature for the first ten years of his or her life, and he does not consider the delay time lost as regards education in the common and conventional use of the term. Dr. Hammond says: "If he does not begin to look at books till he is ten years old, he will by the time a year has elapsed, read better than a child that has begun to learn his letters at three or four. He starts in the race with an unweary and a better developed brain, and in the long run through life will win more prizes than his precocious competitor."

### Miss Braddon's Big Income.

Novel-writing now-a-days is a precarious and not very profitable calling. A very fair price, as things go, is \$2,000 for the serial rights of a full-length story, and assuming that the author makes \$400 by the three-volume edition, and as much by a cheap edition, his total profit would amount to 2,800—not a great deal, considering the labor and time that the writing of a novel involves. On the other hand there are undoubtedly prizes, and if a writer reaches the top of the tree and is as prolific as Miss Braddon, he can make, if not a great fortune, at any rate a handsome income by his pen. Miss Braddon, I should think, makes more money by fiction than any other writer of the day. Her fertility is prodigious. I believe Miss Braddon gets about \$5,000 for the serial rights of a new story, and as she writes something like two a year, or at any rate two in three years, her takings from this source alone must be considerable. There may be two or three writers who command as high a price, but none who is equally popular and prolific. Whether her works will live is another question, I am speaking of the present.
