

# TV's Ruining Children

**LONDON** (Reuters) British parents protested Sunday that television is ruining their children's development, and their speech and turning them into neurotic idiots.

And a study of young American Western movies aren't helping the problem.

Dr. Simon Yodanis, secretary of the council for children's welfare which chased horror comic books from newsstands, said "vigilante" groups will watch for sex, violence and suffering on English TV programs.

The council also received comment from America in which the British television regularity may be improved.

Dr. A. H. Griffith, senior medical officer at Cardiff reports in more plays from children's books, more programs for creative hob-

bies, more time devoted to children and the opening of a school drama conference.

Sir Robert Fraser, director of the British Broadcasting Corporation, said television has been blamed for the backwardness of some children in the United Kingdom.

"The need for speech stimulation is sometimes found in children from homes where there is a ritual of nightly mass fixation on the TV-addicted family site, transferred by the idiot's lant from year to year in his annual medical report.

"This constant absorption of one visual stimulus in children may mean that some children have not learned to name letters or colors, are unable to repeat simple nursery rhymes or comprehend numbers—all of which were in his annual medical report for their parents' sake."

**Ship Lobsters In Dry Shavings**

**ST. ANDREWS, N.B. (CP)**—A shipment of New Brunswick lobsters packed in light, dry wood shavings leaves Saint John Airport for Belgium today, an experiment which may have a major effect on the entire world lobster industry.

The shavings replace the usual weighted dice packing which weighs more than the lobsters. Dr. W. L. MacMillan, vice-president of Conley's Lobsters Limited here, said Sunday night experiments show the shavings will keep the lobsters alive and in good condition six days or more.

Mr. William said the system was proposed by Belgian buyers. Today's shipment consists of 210 cases, each containing 50 pounds of lobster and five pounds of packing.

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**THOR MISSILE Lands Short**

**CAPE CANAVERAL, Fla. (AP)**—The U.S. Air Force's Thor missile was shot skyward Friday but the effectiveness of its flight was in doubt.

The defense department in Washington fired behind the firing of the 1,500-mile Thor at a success but later said the weapon "landed short of the intended target area."

The long, gleaming white missile left its launching pad, hovered in fire, it went straight skyward after firing.

Then it turned into a graceful arc and veered to the southwest over the missile testing range in the Atlantic Ocean.

**Pearl Harbor Raid Recalled**

**PEARL HARBOR (AP)**—A small group clustered on Ford Island Saturday faced the fast deteriorating battleship Arizona and vowed that out of the sacrifice made by her 1,102 dead would come "an everlasting memorial to vigilance and preparedness."

The Navy Club of the United States dedicated its Pearl Harbor memorial on the island in the midst of this naval base, three navy chaplains intoned prayers for the men who died in the attack on the Japanese bombs destroyed the pride of the Pacific fleet at her.

The ceremony keynoteed a drive to raise \$500,000 which will provide a concrete and steel casing around the rusting, bomb-torn battleship, and make it into a permanent memorial.
