Pasture Improvement Contest's Underway

Any farmer interested in the foregoing is invited to participate. The objectives may be listed as follows: To provide information on recommended pasture practices. To assess the individual farm forage program with that of others in the county and this year a new objective. Also to establish the value of pasture per acre once other feed costs have been taken into consideration.

In order to achieve the latter those taking part in the program will be encouraged to keep records which will provide information on: Milk or beef produced on grass. The number of animals carried per acre. The cost of supplement feed, and the value of each pasture acre during the grazing season.

With the constantly increasing need for more livestock and with the realization that forage is the cheapest feed there is much to recommend improved practices in the handling of pasture and forage.

Dr. S. S. Martin of Ottawa, presenting the report of the advisory nursing committee, said ever-changing legislation in all fields of medical care made it imperative for the order to emphasize to its members the importance of being highly qualified in public health nursing.
