CITY.—At an emergency meeting of the City Council this morning, called by Mayor Haviland to consider certain matters in connection with the office of City Clerk, a resolution was passed ordering that the Clerk furnish security to the amount of \$2,000, either by guarantee policy or two sureties of \$1,000 each. Mr. Davison said that he would furnish the two sureties. No action was taken in this matter of an assistant clerkship. A special meeting of the Council will be held on Monday next, at eleven o'clock, to appoint an auditor in the place of H. M. Davison. We understand that Mr. Davison will enter upon his duties as City Clerk to-morrow.

The Journal reports that it was decided that the next meeting be held in Charlottetown, and that the executive committee of the D. C. S. be asked to get, if possible, Rev. Dymon Hague, or failing him, Rev. Dr. Partridge, both of Halifax, to preach at the service and address a missionary meeting in the evening.

Nationalists' Manifesto.

Purged of Parnell, the Party Address the People of Ireland.

Justin McCarthy takes the Lead

"United Ireland" Invaded.

LONDON, Dec. 10.

The anti-Parnell members of the Irish parliamentary party have issued the promised manifesto to the Irish people. It enumerates the charges against Parnell, and says if he is re-elected the Tory government will resume power, coercion will receive a new lease, and the struggle for Home Rule be lost to the living generation. It states that the question for the Irish nation is: "Lose all for Parnell, or win all without him." The signers refuse to believe Gladstone desired to dictate, and say Parnell deserted him. They did not desert him. They pledge themselves to remain an independent party, insuring final victory for the Irish cause under the auspices of the Alliance of the British Democracy and the Irish people. Some forty-seven signatures are attached to the manifesto, headed by Justin McCarthy.

DUBLIN, Dec. 10.—Midnight. Late to-night a strong party of Parnell's opponents re-occupied the office of United Ireland. The invaders destroyed all the "leaders" prepared by Lowry, installed an editor to-day by Parnell, turned matter found set up into the fire, and took possession of the ledgers and other books and documents belonging to the concern. All was done in the name of Wm. O'Brien. A strong posse from various labor societies was left as a garrison with instructions to remain on guard day and night and resist by force any further intrusion by Parnell and his friends.

Fatal Fall. BANGOR, Dec. 10. This forenoon at the American Ice Co.'s, houses men were at work placing roof trusses upon an addition being erected. Five men were on a staging 45 feet from the ground when a two inch plank, which furnished its principle support, broke, and they fell the entire distance. Joseph Hammond, a bench man, aged 35, of South Brewer, was instantly killed. He leaves a widow and seven children. Thomas Vessar, of Bangor, was fatally injured. He has a wife and four children. The others were badly injured.

The Newfield Mystery. HALIFAX, Dec. 10. A telegram received by the Marine and Fisheries Department this morning from Captain Guilford, of the Newfield, says that Daniel Morrison, a coal trimmer, died last night from his injuries. The others will recover. An investigation will be held into the cause of the disaster. This makes two deaths. The accident still remains a mystery.

Killed Himself. DIGBY, Dec. 10. Charles A. Moore, of this town, deliberately placed a revolver in his head about 2 o'clock this morning and shot himself dead in the presence of his wife and children. Excessive drinking is the only cause assigned. Moore was about thirty-five years old.

Fire. HARTFORD, CONN., Dec. 10. A fire this afternoon caused \$6,000 damage to the residence of Bishop McMahon and his Roman Catholic priests. The fire started from a furnace.

The Quebec Bridge. QUEBEC, Dec. 10. Le Canadian credit's the Boston & Maine Railway Company with a willingness to build the Quebec bridge if the Provincial Government will guarantee \$200,000 of its cost.

Another Strike. NEWARK, N. J., Dec. 10. The entire force in Clarke's thread mills in this city and Kearney went on strike this morning. Over 300 men and girls are out.

Valuable Estate. HALIFAX, Dec. 10. The estate of the late J. S. McLean was settled in the Probate court to-day, showing a value of over \$216,000.

Strike Ended. LONDON, Dec. 10. The strike of dock laborers at Cardiff has ended. The employers conceded to the chief demands of the men.
