ANNUAL REPORT OF THE DIRECTORS.

To the Shareholders of Sherwood Cemetery:

In submitting the twentieth annual report of Sherwood Cemetery, your Directors are pleased to be able to announce that the result of the past year's work has been satisfactory and that after payment of all amounts due a balance of \$56.62 on the year's transactions appears to the credit of the company.

The sum of \$350 which was on deposit in the Merchants Bank of Halifax was withdrawn with accrued interest during the past year. Of this amount \$300 has been invested in a mortgage, and the balance, \$70.70, has been placed to the credit of the bank account of the company, making the total balance now on hand \$175.70. The receipts for the past year, \$428.62, and the balance carried from the previous year, \$120.08, are shown below.

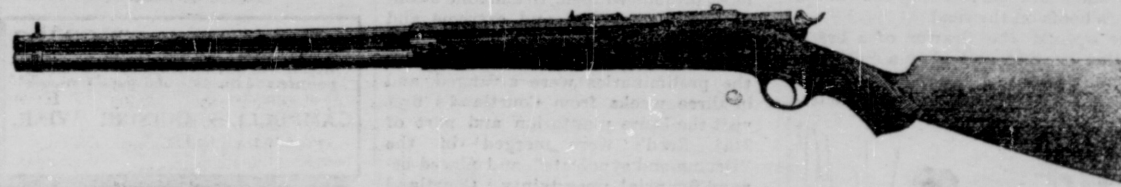
