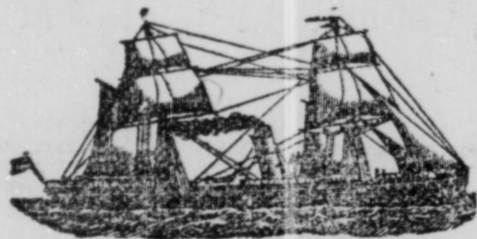

BOARD OF TRADE.

A quarterly meeting of the Board of Trade was held last evening, the President, Mr. Horace Hazard in the chair. After the reading of minutes and correspondence, Mr. F. S. Jost was elected a member of the board.

Mr. L. L. Beer introduced the potatoe question, and a general discussion followed as to the causes of the comparative failure of the crop of the present year, as well as of recent years.

Messrs. Aitken, Fall, Newson, McKinnon and others took part in the discussion which, before it was ended, embraced grain as well as potatoes. Finally the following resolution, proposed by Mr. D. A. McKinnon, moved by Mr. Fall and seconded by Mr. Paton, was adopted:

Resolved, That the Minister of Agriculture, Ottawa, be communicated with, with a view to sending an expert here to enquire into methods of improvement in the growth of grain and potatoes, and as to what remedies are the best preventative of rust and the potato bug, and whether a general change of seed is advisable.

In accordance with this resolution, Messrs. L. L. Beer, D. A. McKinnon and J. Newson were appointed a committee to communicate with the Minister of Agriculture.

Local and Other Items.

POLICE COURT.—A prosecution against two lads for annoying persons in their dwellings was adjourned until Saturday.

ILLEGAL FISHING.—Before A Lord, Fishery Officer, to-day, Alexander Macdonald, of Point Prim, confessed to fishing lobsters in the close season, and was fined \$55 and costs.

A QUESTION.—A correspondent desires to know if the local government have no better employment for their officials than scouring the country with summonses? This is a question for the Premier.

COAL ARRIVALS.—The following schooners arrived yesterday from Dominion Coal Co's Mine, C. B., with cargoes of slack, run of mine and nut coal to Peak Bros. & Co: Ceto, Katurb, Nellie Reid and Albert P.

ST. DUNSTON'S CATHEDRAL.—Work upon the southern spire of the Cathedral is progressing well. The cross upon the top was placed in position last evening, the operation being witnessed by a goodly number of people.

THE OPERA HOUSE.—There was a large audience at the Opera House last night, and the performance of the "Forever Devil's Auction" was greatly enjoyed. The company give their closing performance to-night, when a big house is expected.

A TERRIBLE DEATH.—A young woman named Marie Cousineau residing at St. Laurent, a suburb of Montreal, met with a terrible death a few days ago. A vicious horse trampled her to death, dragging her some distance. Her clothes were torn off, her head crushed to a jelly, and one of her arms was pulled out at the socket.

A PLUCKY FEMALE.—Edward Walsh, a Halifax man with a bad reputation, went into the Dartmouth ferry office on Saturday night last and snatched \$100 from the counter. He was making off with the money when the lady ticket seller laid hold of him and screamed. The young woman kept her grip firmly till the military police, standing by, ran up and arrested the thief.

AT THE BUTTS.—In the rifle competition at Georgetown yesterday for the Fisheries Protection challenge cup, the team of five from the Kingfisher won with a score of 181 points against 162 by the Acadia, 154 by the Curlew and 133 by the Osprey. The cup was held last by the Osprey. In the match for the Acadia and Kingfisher cup the Acadia won with 155 points to the Kingfisher's 152. The weather was unfavorable for shooting.

CHURCH IMPROVEMENT.—The Trustees of the Souris Methodist Church are expending four or five hundred dollars in improving their church. Hot air is being introduced. The building itself has been raised three feet. A new entrance way with small spires on either side will make quite an improvement in the appearance from the street. With a fresh coat of paint and other adornments this church will be quite an ornament to the village. Rev W G Mathews is the popular pastor. Mr W R Dingwill is the contractor for the wood work.

THE ROLLO BAY VOTE.—It must not be supposed that because the Rollo Bay Poll is the only one on the Island that shows a majority against prohibition, and because of the recent seizure of smuggled rum found in the woods in the neighborhood, that the people of that locality are less temperate than their neighbors. The residents of that fine settlement, we are glad to be able to say, are among the most temperate, law-abiding and upright to be found anywhere within the broad Dominion. Their votes were, no doubt, given conscientiously; and the smuggled rum was not brought there, it may safely be inferred, for home consumption.

WRECK OF THE CONFEDERATE.—Captain Forrest, of the wrecked schooner Confederate, arrived in this city last evening. He had two men from Cape Breton with him on the schooner when she was wrecked. A heavy sea was running all day, and about four o'clock in the afternoon a mast broke. Subsequently, while the crew were making some temporary repairs their only axe was lost overboard. Seeing that there was no chance of saving the schooner captain Forest and his two companions took to the boat, a very small one, and started to row to the shore which, they did not reach until about four o'clock next morning. They were tossed about all night on the raging waters, and one man was kept bailing all the time as the waves were sweeping over the boat. The experience was one that they are not likely to forget in a hurry. As already stated there was no insurance on either vessel or cargo.
