Fire Damage \$4,000 At Gulf Garden Plant

GEORGETOWN — A stubborn fire causing an estimated \$4,000 damage broke out at the Gulf Garden Food plant here Saturday morning.

The fire was fought by both the Georgetown and Montague Fire Departments.

As far as can be ascertained the fire was caused by a short circuit in a temporary electric service cable. The cable was lying across a hot steam pipe which ran from the service building to the main plant.

The location of the fire was in the centre of the west wall just below the roof level. It smouldered for several hours in the partition between the cold storage area and the laboratory.

To completely extinguish it it was necessary to cut a section of the roof approximately three feet wide and 20 feet long, as well as a section of the west wall and part of the ceiling and wall of the laboratory.

The management of Gulf Garden Foods had recently announced an approximate two week delay in the start of production because of the late delivery of certain pieces of refrigeration equipment. The cold storage area was to have been tested for several days at a temperature of approximately 22 degrees below zero.

The fire will set this test back about eight days while the repairs to the area are made.

St. Dunstan's High School Enrollment Up

An increase of 21 students over last year's enrollment at St. Dunstan's High School was noted in figures released last night by SDHS principal, Rev. Francis Cameron.

The total number of grade 11 and 12 students this year is 223, compared to 202 last year.

Grade 11 has 120 students compared to 112 last year, while 12 has increased from 90 to 103.

Fr. Cameron also noted one addition to the teaching staff, Eric Doucette, BA, BSc, who will teach in the French department.

MONTAGUE — Wayne Lannigan of Ontario, formerly of Montague, and Cameron Munro of Whim Road were rushed to the Kings County Hospital yesterday afternoon about 3 p.m. when a late model convertible thought to have been driven by Lannigan left the highway near the town of Montague.

Both men were reported not to be in serious condition although both were severely shaken up and received cuts and bruises and will remain in hospital overnight.

Damage to the car was estimated at \$150. The Montague detachment RCMP are investigating the accident.

It is believed a third person in the car was unhurt.

Dr. Mark MacGuigan To Offer For Liberals

Dr. Mark R. MacGuigan has announced he will offer his name for the Liberal nomination in Queen's County at the nominating convention Saturday.

Dr. MacGuigan said, "I have found such widespread support for my candidacy from all sections of the community that I have decided to allow my name to go before the convention and to accept the nomination if it is offered to me."

This is not Dr. MacGuigan's first political battle. He was the Liberal candidate in Toronto St. Patrick in the 1963 Ontario provincial elections where he narrowly missed unseating Hon. Kelso Roberts, then the minister of lands and forests and a former attorney general who had held the seat for 20 years.

He is the vice-president of the Toronto and district Liberal Association and is closely associated with Andrew Thompson the new leader of the Liberal party in Ontario. Dr. MacGuigan seconded the nomination of Mr. Thompson at the Liberal Convention last fall.

Dr. MacGuigan is vice-president of the Canadian Civil Liberties Association and a member of a special committee of the federal government on hate propaganda.

STILL UNDECIDED

Ira Lewis of York another of the names mentioned in connection with the Queen's Liberal nomination said last evening he is still undecided whether he will offer again this year.

Mr. Lewis, a farmer, points out that P.E.I. did not have an agricultural representative in the last Parliament.

B. B. (Bus) Jones, a farmer, from Bunbury, might offer for the Queen's Liberal nomination.

Dr. Frank MacKinnon, principal of Prince of Wales College, is another whose name is heard often in regard to the Liberal nomination for Queen's, but he

has been out of the province and has not been available for comment.

In King's County a number of names are heard regarding the Progressive Conservative nomination for that riding. Their convention is set for Sept. 22 in Montague.

Leo Rossiter, minister of fisheries and municipal affairs, when asked last evening if he would be offering his name for the Conservative nomination, replied, "I haven't made up my mind yet."

Melvin McQuaid of Souris, a former provincial treasurer, said he had been approached to allow his name go for nomination, but he too is undecided. "I have not come to any decision," he said.

ANNOUNCEMENT TODAY

In Prince County, Rev. David MacDonald, the United Church minister in Alberton, is expected to announce his intentions today. Mr. MacDonald has been approached by members of both parties to offer his name at their conventions. It is expected he will allow his name to go before the Conservative one being held Saturday in Summerside.

Other than the possibility Mr. MacDonald might offer at the Prince County Liberal convention there have been no names mentioned as opposition to the sitting members.

Hon. J. Watson MacNaught is expected to get the Liberal nomination in Prince. Angus MacLean and Heath MacQuarrie the Conservative nominations in Queen's and John Mullyally the Liberal nomination in King's.

complicity in the smuggling operation that founded with a \$33,000 seizure of heroin at the Mexican border here in 1963.

Those due to go on trial with Rivard are Montrealers Joseph Raymond Jones, 35, Julien Gannon, alias Jerry Massey, 35, and Charles Emile Groleau, all held on \$100,000 bail.

The 50-year-old Rivard has been under \$500,000 bail—highest in the history of this long-time smuggling area in the Texas southwest.

Frank James Cappola of Bridgeport, Conn., where an alleged Rivard directed shipment of heroin was supposed to have changed hands in 1963, is free on \$100,000 bond and due for separate trial later. Two Mexicans who have been charged are still at large, so far as is known publicly.

few miles from the frontier of the disputed state of Kashmir.

The thundering boom of artillery shells and tank fire hung over the city, the bazaar was deserted, with long lines of shuttered shops in its twisting alley ways, and outside on the dusty roads, to the interior of Pakistan, hordes of frightened refugees plodded through the dust away from the gun fire.

But it was in the centre of the city, in the maze of bazaars and markets, that the horrors of war struck the unsuspecting Pakistanis. The bomb struck like a giant earthquake, ripping apart houses and shabby shops and crumpling a mosque to ruins. The delicately fashioned white minaret lay in a rubble choked alley way where rescue teams dug for bodies, fearful of tottering walls apparently about to collapse on them.

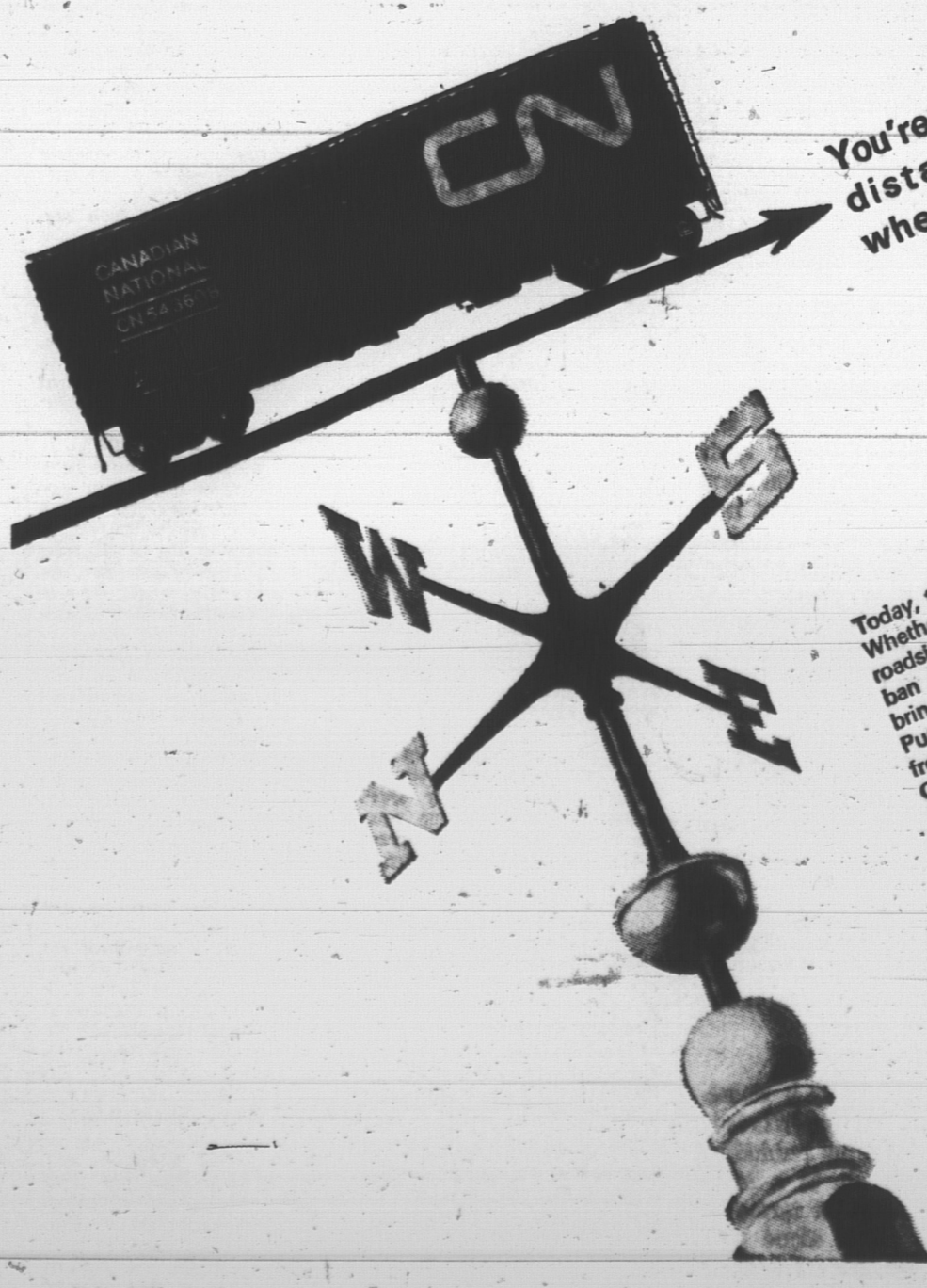
