HE DOES NOT MIND DEFEAT

The government candidate for East Queens, Prince Edward Island, in the coming federal election, is a man with a history. Mr. McKinnon was made attorney general in the Farquharson government a year or so ago, and was obliged to seek re-election. Though it was a provincial by-election Sir Louis Davies was so interested in that he went about the district holding meetings, promising the people a government railway if they elected a government candidate, and the good by the with isolation if they elected another man. Ten years ago when Dr. Pugsley asked the people whether they would have Mr. McKinnon and a railway, or the man of their choice and get no road, they replied to the insolent threat and bribe just as Carleton did.

Attorney-General McKinnon was not elected. Yet he held on to his office. Autumn passed and winter found him still attorney-general. Spring came and the Pineau deal was consummated. This and the breach of faith by Wise kept the Government in power. The session was called in the spring and the attorney general had no seat in the chamber. He drew his salary and sat among the visitors. All summer he held on to the office and pay without mandate of any constituency. Now he is a candidate for the house of commons. He will be defeated by Mr. Martin, the sitting member, who was re-nominated yesterday. But perhaps he will think that a defeat should entitle him to sit in the gallery of the house of commons as attorney-general.—St. John Sun.

M. A. P. says:—Lieutenant General Kelly-Kenny is one of the officers whom the present war has in every sense of the word brought to the front, and the recent grant of a good service pension to him is admittedly well deserved. An additional £100 a year, however, is not of itself of much account to the gallant General, who has a considerable private income, and apparently shares Lord Kitchener's views that a soldier married is a soldier spoiled, as he is still a bachelor. He is not a very popular man, speaking generally; he has not the happy knack of winning spontaneous regard like Lord Roberts, for example, and there was a good deal of jealousy felt about the appointments which he has held of late years at home; but in the present campaign he has amply proved that the authorities were not so short-sighted as some people appeared to think when they pushed him on in his profession. General Kelly-Kenny is a soldierly, good-looking man. He is extremely shrewd, devoted to his profession, and has always gained the good opinion of his superior officers. Somewhat reticent in manner and cautious by nature, he is capable of great kindness, is hospitable, rides straight to hounds and is a capital all-round sportsman.

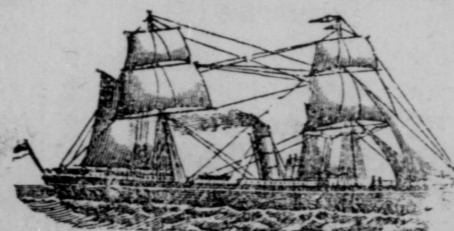
Official returns to Sept. 1 show that the Boers have captured during the war 281 officers and 7,288 men, of whom 235 officers and 6,196 men have escaped or been released. One officer and eighty-five men died in captivity. The number of British remaining in the hands of the Boers is 1,052.

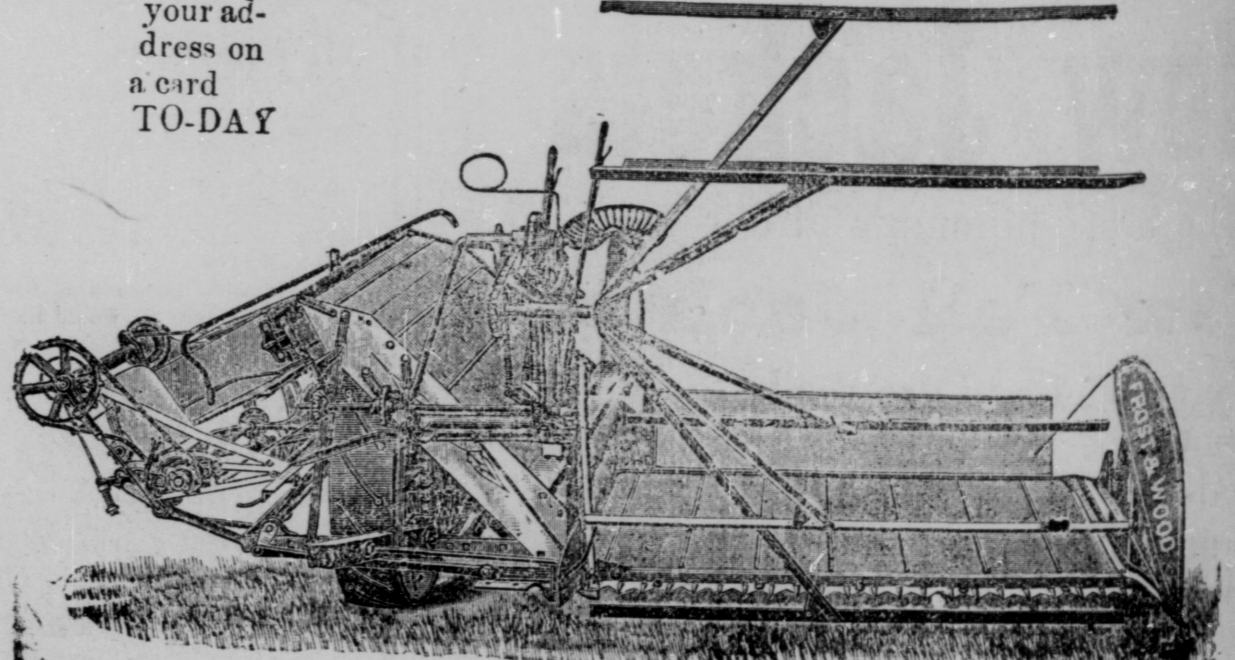
