FARMERS are all engaged getting in their turpentine. The recent rains have done great good. The hay and other crops promise very well.

LEWIS CARVELL leaves this morning for Boston. He will return by next trip of State of Indiana.

ON Sunday night one of the hands of the State of Indiana fell overboard, and was rescued with difficulty in a much exhausted condition.

SOME short time ago the Government called for tenders for sewerage and Sanitary improvements in connection with the Provincial building and the Law Courts, and we note the contractor, Mr. Lemuel Harris, has commenced the work. We learn there is to be a pipe laid around each of the buildings to carry off all the rain water from the roofs, and also larger pipes to drain the matter from the urinals and water closets. These pipes will connect with a main pipe about the centre of the gate on the south side of the Provincial Building and continued from thence to near the corner of the St. Patrick's Hall it will be connected with the Dominion sewer. The contractor expects to be through about the first of August next, and by the energetic way he is pushing it it looks like business. The plumbing work is being done by Mr. John Garrick, a very efficient workman. Mr. Robert F. Irving is inspecting the work for the Government.

THE LEGISLATURE.

House of Assembly.

MONDAY, June 29th.

House met at 4 p. m. Mr. H. C. McDonald introduced a bill to further amend the County Courts Act, 1878. Read a first time.

Mr. Bell introduced a bill to incorporate the Cape Traverse Hall Company. Read a first time.

Mr. Warburton moved the House into committee to consider an act to authorize the sale of a piece of land in Charlottetown formerly owned by the Hon. Edward Whelan.

Reported agreed to. Mr. Underhay in moving that the debate on the Bill relating to Public Lands be resumed, argued that the proposed discounts were unfair to those who had already settled for their lands in full, and that the changes would not be of any benefit to the country.

Mr. Warburton explained that the object of the Bill was to close up the office as soon as possible, and save the expense of keeping it open which amounted in all to about 20 per cent of the receipts. He thought those who had paid off their lands were in favor of closing up the Office and saving the expense.

Mr. A. J. McDonald thought the principle of the bill an unjust one, and that the object of it was to place the lands of the country in the hands of the lawyers.

Mr. Bell would understand by the language of the leader of the opposition that it was that hon. gentleman's policy to supplement the revenue by taxation unless the Dominion government lent them assistance. Now the opposition wanted to encourage this government to impose an assessment act, so that if dissatisfaction arose they might regain power. As a matter of expediency he justified the present Bill in that it involved the greatest good to the greatest number. At 6 o'clock Mr. Bell was still speaking.

Mr. Rogers objected to the bill as not beneficial to the country. It would bring water to the mill of the hon. leader of the government; he was a lawyer and had lots of money to lend, and of course farmers would go to him to raise the money and get the 12 per cent discount. He insisted that if those who were negligent in paying for their lands got a discount, those who paid promptly should have a reward.

Mr. Richard explained that the object of the bill was to close up the office and save the cost of administering it; and he had met several supporters of the last speaker who were entirely satisfied with the proposal.

Mr. Gordon opposed the bill because it favored those who were delinquent in the purchase of their lands. He recounted the way in which those who paid for their lands economized and stinted themselves to do so, and contended that by this law, that these would be compelled to keep those who were tardy. He pointed out that it should be noted that the hon. member from Bedouque only said the bill was expedient; he did not claim that it was right. He thought the bill was founded on socialistic or communistic principles, that it took from those who had and gave to those who were not deserving.

Mr. Roberson was satisfied that the sooner the Land Office was closed the better. He declared that the arguments of the opposition were very contradictory and illogical.

Mr. Arsenault was opposed to the bill as unjust and ridiculous. He did not think the poor man would gain by the bill as he would go on as at present paying by small installments.

Mr. Matheson found that the bill which he himself cordially supported was well received by those of his constituents whom he had the pleasure of meeting during the past two or three days. He believed it much better to do this than go on paying 17 per cent year after year for cost of collection.

Mr. A. J. McLeod said it was not for the poor, as it was not likely that the man who could not pay in twelve or fifteen years would now be prepared to take advantage of the discount by paying in full.

Dr. Jenkins could see nothing objectionable, objectionable, or iniquitous. It was better to pay 12 per cent than 17 per cent. He was disposed to support the bill, but feared that it would not meet the expectations of its framers. He thought it not quite fair that it favored wealthy speculators, many of whom had pillaged the lands of its district.

He thought the office would never be satisfactory while it was run as a political machine. He suggested it be put in the hands of a competent accountant to manage it who would get his own assistants and give sufficient security.

OTTAWA, June 29.—Parliament was not sitting to-day, as it was the fast of St. Peter and St. Paul.

Chinese Lepers.

VICTORIA, June 29.—Dr. Smith of Tracadie lazarotto, has discovered six cases of leprosy among Chinese in Victoria. In two instances the Chinese stabbed victims of the dread disease to escape contagion.

Strike in St. John Mills.

ST. JOHN, June 29.—The mills here have been working much less since a summer holiday. This morning the owners announced that they were going back to ten hours after 13th July, alleging that they were unable to carry on business because of low markets, and competition with Bangor and other places where the men work ten and twelve hours. As a consequence of this about eight hundred men went on strike. Fully two thousand employes here are likely to be called out at meeting this evening.

Fire on Board an Allan Liner.

MONTREAL, June 28.—The Allan liner steamer Montevideo, from London, arrived Sunday. On Wednesday fire was discovered in the hold and was subdued after great difficulty. Several hundred tons of cargo were damaged. The men were nearly all suffocated while moving twelve tons of gunpowder which was stored in the hold.

Stabbed in a Fray With Italians.

FALL RIVER, June 29.—Matthew Callen while with some companions engaged in an altercation with a number of Italians was stabbed in the side and died this morning.
