S'side Children's Aid Committee Is Planned

A meeting was held in the Town Hall, Summerside, on Tuesday night presided over by Mayor Henry Wedge to discuss a report which had been made by Mr. F. R. MacKinnon, director of child welfare for the Province of Nova Scotia who had conducted a survey of the City of Charlottetown and the Province generally in regard to child welfare work.

The report had been presented in Charlottetown on Monday night at a meeting of the Children's Aid Society and was reported in Tuesday's Guardian. One of the recommendations was that a Community and Children's Aid Society of Prince Edward Island be established which should be composed of two main committees located in Charlottetown and Summerside.

The meeting approved the idea of setting up a planning committee in Summerside to be composed of five men and five women which would work with a group from Charlottetown towards this objective. A nominating committee composed of Mrs. Robert Palmer, Mr. J. Lorne Driscoll and Mr. J. Lloyd Gorrill was set up to name this committee.

They plan to meet shortly for this purpose. There was a great deal of discussion on the need for organized child welfare work in Summerside and many pitiable cases which were known to some of those present were discussed. It was the feeling of the meeting that if the general public was aware of the great need for something to be done in this regard there would be general support for the movement and financial contributions would be forthcoming.

Those aware of the situation stated that in Summerside there is a serious need of organized social welfare work and that a great many children are being brought up with little chance of becoming useful citizens.

Mr. MacKinnon's report was read to the meeting in his absence by his assistant, Mr. George Hart. Among those present who took part in the discussion were Mayor Alan Nicholson, J. R. 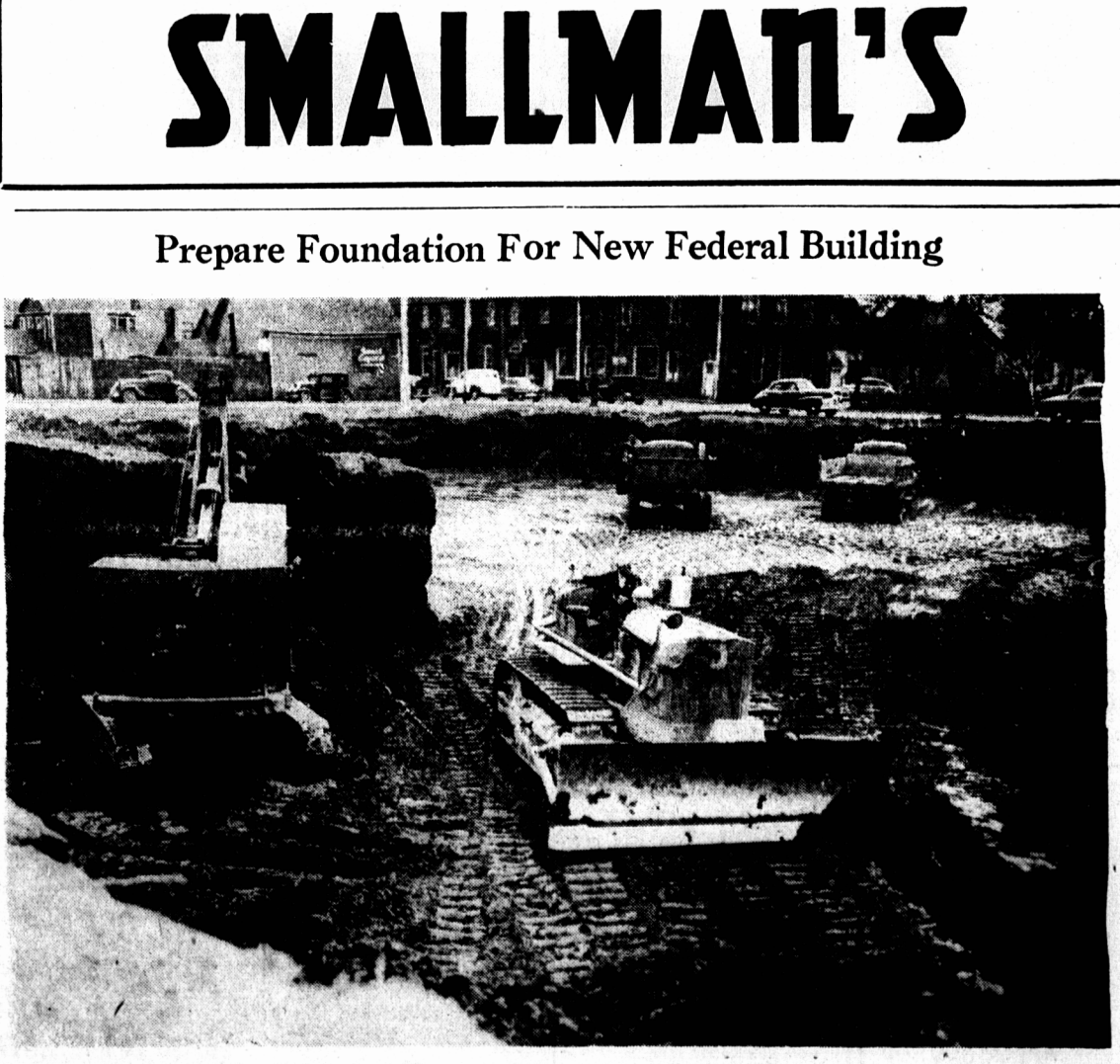

Shown above is the excavation being made for the new Federal building on Central Street in Summerside. Probably never in the history of the Town has so much construction work, both public and private, been in progress at one time. A new Prince County Hospital is better than midway towards completion and work is starting on a new Royal Bank building. Two miles of streets will be paved this summer and this work will commence immediately. A number of new homes are under construction and others are planned. The Summerside Branch of the Canadian Legion will decide tonight if they will erect a new Legion home this year. One hundred and fifty new housing units are nearing completion at the R. C. A. F. station and work will shortly commence on 105 more.
