

# Squid Netting Is A Lot More Profitable Than Is Jigging

HOLYROOD, Nfld. (CP)—There's money to be made on the squid-iggin grounds.

Squid that are pulled squirting and squealing from Conception Bay here are the color of gold, and worth nearly as much.

A good man on a good day can make \$80, but the average runs

closer to \$20. A whopping \$150 a day is not unheard of. Three freezing plants compete for 200,000 pounds of Holyrood squid daily in the season, and until their capacities are filled they'll buy from anyone. Company script is as good as money here.

**AMATEURS COMPETE**

About 150 of the 250 fishermen who go after the squid here from August to late October are Holyrood men. The others come from places like Northern Bay, Carbonear and the Southern Shore.

Others who work in St. John's come out at night to jig and dip for squid. This makes the regular squid men unhappy. They say people who make good livings should not thoughtlessly but in and take dollars from those whose sole livelihood at the time is catching squid.

General Secretary Max Lane of the Newfoundland Federation of Fishermen says "there's not much anyone can do. The sea is free. Squid are there for the taking. I don't see anything wrong with a city man getting low wages augmenting his income by catching squid. Policemen for example. They get high wages and I know policemen who catch and sell squid in their off-duty hours. But I disagree with big money makers going after the extra dollar."

Fishermen sell their squid for about 1 1/2 cents a pound—a squid weighs about half-a-pound — to Job's Limited of St. John's, Fishery Products Ltd. of Holyrood and Moores, Ltd., of Harbor Grace. Company script is used like money in Holyrood and Carbonear.

**BIG BAIT BUSINESS**

The companies freeze squid and sell them to the Portuguese fishermen who cross the Atlantic in their white baited ships each spring to fish until fall on the Grand Banks. Portuguese use 500,000 pounds of frozen Newfoundland squid a year for prices up to five cents a pound. Squid is good bait—its rubbery and won't come off the hook. Codfish consider it delicious.

Holyrood is the centre of the commercial squid fishery, and squid jiggin as such isn't practised much here.

A man named Lewis in a dory out on the grounds, clad in slicker, sou'wester and hip rubbers with black squid juice running down his face told why while he worked his jigger. "It takes all day to fill a boat using a jigger," he said. "With a dipnet you can fill a boat in half an hour."

He was using a jigger instead of a dipnet that day, he explained, because rain in the morning left fresh water floating near the surface. The squid stayed deep to avoid it.

**FAMED IN LEGEND**

The kind of squid jigging that makes Newfoundlanders write poems and sing songs is still carried out by cod fishermen in villages all along the coast. Men go out at the end of their fishing day, cluster in their boats and yarn until squid strike in. They jig until the next morning's fishing. The federal government maintains a frozen bait service when squid are running.

The Newfoundland squid is famous in story as well as song. A Holyrood man who asked not to be named tells of the squid and John Cabot, recognized here as discoverer of Newfoundland in 1497.

Everyone knows squid emit a black ink as an underwater smoke-screen, he said. But people don't know squid carry pens as well, the Holyrood man said. He slit open a squid and removed its only pen, the transparent, flat, one-piece spine, shaped like a stylus on either end.

"John Cabot had a rough passage coming to Newfoundland," he said with a twinkle. "He lost many of his things, including pen and ink. When he reached Newfoundland and found the squid he opened a squid and took from its backbone a pen."

"He opened the inksac in the back of the squid and wrote the charter of the discovery of Newfoundland. He sent it back to the Queen of England."

## Had Long Career

James Joseph Deveney, 75, outstanding figure in construction and building circles and one of Nahant's Old Guard since August 5th, at his home, 63 Spring Rd. His widow is the former Teresa Campbell of Campbell's Cove, P.E.I.

Born July 28, 1881, and a lifetime resident of Nahant, Deveney attended Nahant schools and Franklin Institute. He started as a carpenter at 17, and in his lifetime was superintendent of construction, writer, town official and newspaper correspondent. Mr. Deveney for many years was owners and architects representative for leading firms of Boston, and formerly was vice president of L.L. Wilcutt and Co. and a partner of Charles Cunningham and Co.

As a Nahant resident, Deveney labored officially and unofficially for the town. He was a member of the school committee (1906-12); member and chairman of the board of assessors (1921-34); selectman (1931-33); member of the board of appeals (1939-40); building inspector (1945-48); on the committee to revise the town by-laws (1949-51) and on the committee to build the elementary school started two years ago.

**WAS UNLATCHED**

When chairman of the board of assessors in 1929, a personally-conducted survey unearthed several acres of land and a number of buildings that were not listed in the valuation book of Nahant. Appraised and revaluation of real estate so increased the total that the tax rate of \$41 was reduced to \$34.

In addition to his Nahant school and Franklin Institute education, Deveney made use of university extension courses. His versatility was such that he was asked to prepare a historical sketch of Nahant for the 100th anniversary celebration of its incorporation as a town. His brochure is now on the shelves of college, university and public libraries.

He was a member of the former Maolis Club and St. Thomas Aquinas N.S.S.

He is survived by his wife, Mrs. Teresa (Campbell), daughter, Mrs. Henry F. Marks of Marblehead; son, James Campbell Deveney of Swampscott; and three grandchildren. Funeral services were conducted Tuesday from the Rhoads funeral home in Lynn, with a 10 a.m. mass at St. Thomas Aquinas Church, Nahant.

## Souris Dragger Hauled On Slip At Georgetown

On September 5th, at 10.00 a.m. the dragger, Souris II was hauled on the Georgetown Marine Railway Dry Dock, where she was scrapped and painted and had a new propeller put on. Repairs were also done to the rudder and some of the engine sheathing was replaced. The hull, deck, and Pilot house all received a coat of paint.

Five Georgetown workmen were employed at the repair, replacement and painting work.

The Souris II is one of the dragger fleet fishing out of Souris, for Eastern Fisheries. Work was completed and the dragger launched at 1.30 p.m. on September 7th.

This dragger was built in Lower Caraquez, N.B., in 1950 by Paul and Priout Construction Co., Ltd. She is Diesel powered, and is 31 ft registry, 56 ft., long with a 15 ft. beam. She carried a crew of four, under Command of Captain J. Bjornson.

Handling and launching operations at the Georgetown Marine Railway Dry Dock, are under the supervision of Mr. Lemuel MacCormack, who is the Dock Master.
