# Membership In Scouts, Cubs Continues Increase, Reports At Annual Meeting Indicate

The population of Scouts and Cubs in Prince Edward Island continued to show an increase over the previous year, it was reported at the annual meeting of the Provincial Council of the Boy Scouts Association which was held at the "Y" Centre, Summerside, Thursday evening with the president, Brig. W.W. Reid, D.S.O., E.D. presiding. The total numbers of Scouts is 413, Cubs 773 and Leaders 131 for a grand total of 1,317, as compared to 1,252 the previous year. Five new groups were welcomed during the year. They were, 9th Charlottetown "Pack C", 1st Montague Troop, 1st Parkdale "Pack B", 1st Southport Scout Troop and the 1st Southport Scout Troop. This now brings the number of active groups to thirty-two, throughout the Province.

Parent, reporting on the World Jamboree which was held at Niagara-on-the-Lake from the 18 to 28, August, 1955, said that the Island was well represented by the 57 boys and four leaders and the 18 senior boys and leaders at Atlantic Headquarters. # Thirteen Court Cases At Alberton

There were thirteen cases on the docket at the Alberton court house yesterday with Magistrate R.S. Hinton, Q.C. presiding. Under the Temperance Act a resident of Tignish was fined \$20.00 and cost for being intoxicated in a public place and a party from Bloomfield pleaded guilty to possession of liquor not purchased from a vendor (moonshine) and was fined \$25.00 and costs. For the same offense, possession of moonshine, a man from Alberton was fined \$25.00 and costs. Under the Highway Traffic Act a farmer from Bloomfield was fined \$5.00 and costs for having an overweight motor vehicle and a commercial truck driver from Casumpec on a similar charge was fined \$10.00 and costs. Two persons from West Devon and one from Piusville were fined \$5.00 and costs each under the Fish and Game Act for angling for trout without a license. A party from St. Louis was fined \$5.00 and costs for operating a motor vehicle without a drivers license.

The case of a party from Mimmegash area, charged under the Excise Act with unlawful possession of a quantity of manufactured or imported spirits (three gallons of moonshine) was adjourned until June 5th at Summerside. Under the Fishery Regulations of P.E.I. a fisherman from Tignish was fined \$18.00 and costs for retaining a quantity of short lobsters and a fisherman from Alberton South, for the same offense, was fined \$10.00 and costs. The fishery cases were carried over from the 1955 fishing season.

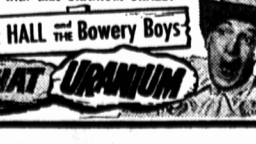
## HEALTH PLAN NEEDED

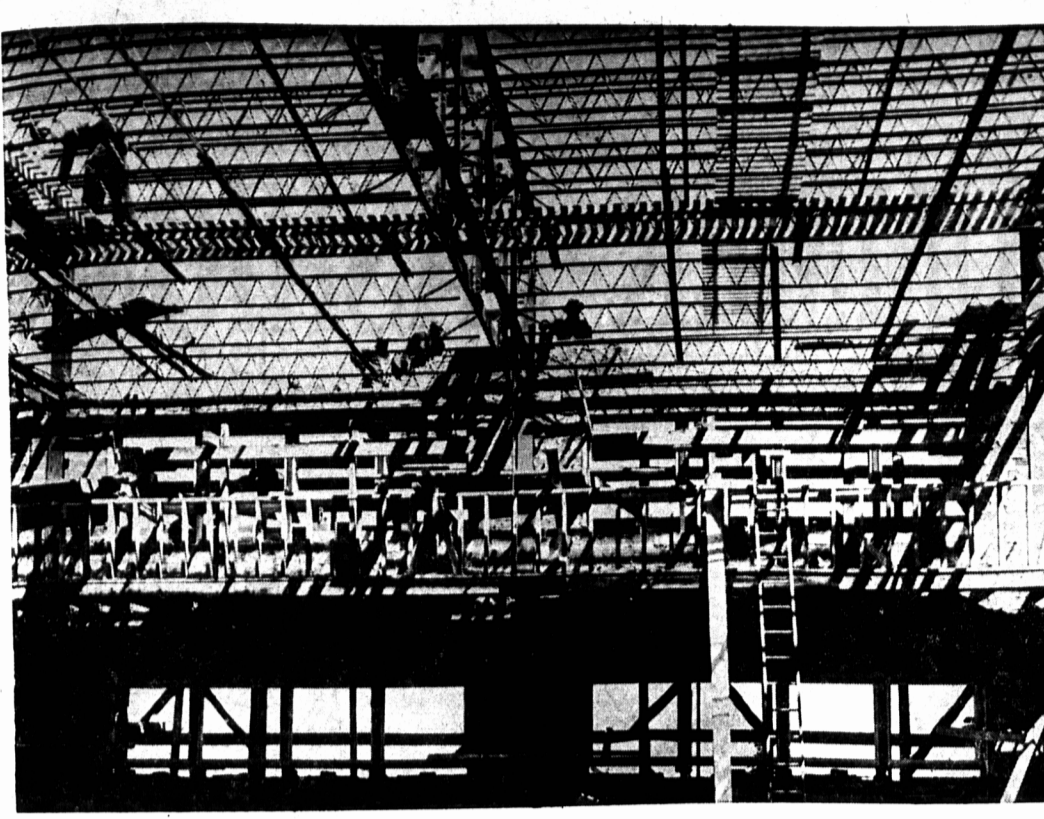

# STEEL OF CIVIC AUDITORIUM FORMS UNUSUAL PATTERN

Grey steel against the blue of the sky forms the unusual pattern seen from within the Civic Auditorium in Summerside where some twenty-five men are employed in the construction of this project which is expected to be completed by mid-August. Measuring 124 feet by 60 feet 10 inches, the auditorium is a permanent construction of brick and steel pipe, lined on the inside with four-inch-thick concrete blocks. M.F. Schurman Co. Ltd. are the general contractors and Laurie Coles is superintendent of the construction. The main floor will contain a combination auditorium and gymnasium together with stage facilities. On this floor at the right of the main entrance will be two gym instructors offices. To the left of the main entrance is a large kitchen equipped with facilities so that the main floor can be used as a banquet area. To the left of this will be a storage room for chairs. The stage is located at the north end of the main floor together with two stair wells leading to dressing rooms and shower facilities on the ground floor. Here also will be a library, and a librarian's office, with a separate entrance from Summer Street. On this main floor will also be a large room which has been designated as a play room, and which may possibly be used by the Boy Scouts and Girl Guides organizations. Here also are three rooms each 14 feet square which are intended as small meeting rooms. The auditorium floor will be finished with hardwood, and will have a seating capacity of 100 persons, while a balcony or promenade at Mezzanine level, sloping towards the stage and extending the full length of the building on either side, will hold about another 200 persons. At this level also, on the south end of the auditorium, is a projection room. The steel-acoustic ceiling and thermocrete block walls in the auditorium are designed for sound absorption. # Slemom Park Community Features Active Council

Slemom Park is the only community on Prince Edward Island that enjoys the singular feature of having all of its residents employed by the same organization. The development, situated beside the RCAF Station at Summerside consists of 258 houses which provide living accommodation for approximately one thousand persons, including the wives and dependents of married personnel attached to the station. It is in fact the third largest community on P.E.I., being exceeded only by Summerside and Charlottetown in population. As any other town of comparable size Slemom Park has found itself afflicted with many of the problems that face a thriving community, and possibly some which would not affect a civilian town of the same size. Notwithstanding the fact that it has a great turnover in residents the community fosters many an integral part of community life. Slemom Park has an active Boy Scout Troop, a Cub Pack, Brownies and Girl Guides, Chapel Guilds, a Catholic Women's League and a Fish and Game Association thrive and operate with as their counterpart in civilian communities. The presence of the A.V.M. Johnson School necessitates the operation of a school board and the presence of children raise problems of looking after their welfare in school and out of it.

No community can actively look after the interests of its residents without a council, and Slemom Park is no exception. At Slemom Park a council consisting of a Mayor and eleven councillors is elected annually by secret ballot. Members of the council are elected from the residents of the park and their wives who volunteer their services in the interest of the community. For election purposes the community is divided into eight wards who elect one councillor from the smaller wards and two from the larger ones. The last election was held in February of this year when Squadron Leader Bill Lafferty D.E.C. was installed as mayor, replacing his predecessor Flight Sergeant Harry MacAuley. Returned with him was a full slate of councillors headed by Flight Lieutenant Lloyd Graham as Deputy Mayor. The council has several functions. Chief among these is the providing of a facility for planning and conducting community activities among the residents of Slemom Park, including such items as social functions, sports, arts and crafts and other seasonal events. The council provides an organizational outlet for fostering such projects as playgrounds, traffic safety, and perhaps one of its most ambitious tasks, the beautification of the community. To supervise these functions the council also must recruit its supervisors from among the residents of the park, and provide the necessary liaison between the community and the station proper.

To finance all these varied activities the council must raise its own funds and be entirely self-supporting. Since it cannot tax its constituents as civilian councils do, it depends on the active support of the residents in attending council sponsored entertainment features and similar fund raising schemes. To date it has been entirely successful in this regard. The council, as a general rule has no authority in matters which affect RCAF policy. When a matter does arise which involves such a sphere, the commanding officer of the station is consulted for a decision. Meetings are held on the first Tuesday of the month to discuss and seek solutions for problems which have been submitted to the councillors by their constituents. Projects are reported on, new ones originated and on, and all the other myriad details which affect a council are aired and discussed. Some of the tasks presently being organized by the council are the planting of trees in the married quarter area, preparing and allotting vegetable plots in the station garden, and clearing an area of scrub brush near the main entrance. But perhaps the largest project on tap is the removal of a building no longer required by the Airforce, from the station area. The building, which formerly housed a heating plant has been purchased from the Airforce with council funds is being dismantled and removed to Margate where it will be re-assembled and used as a summer camp. This project like the other organized by the council is being accomplished solely through the use of volunteer labor recruited from the residents of Slemom Park.
