MONDAY

Able Seaman Joseph K. MacDonald, Morell, is a member of a communications staff of nine which will man radio equipment and make meteorological observations at the Arctic radio station on Padlong Island.

The island lies off the east coast of Baffin Island, across Davis Strait from Greenland. The Defence Department recently announced that the operation of the station was taken over by the Canadian Navy from the United States Air Force.

The strike of employees of the Island Telephone Company, scheduled for today, has been postponed. Mr. Arthur E. Holland, of Summerside, president of local 1811, of the International Brotherhood of Electrical Workers, said last evening that this decision was made at a union meeting in Charlottetown on Saturday evening.

Five graduating nursing assistants in the Provincial Sanatorium were presented with their Pins and Certificates at an impressive ceremony in the Auditorium of the institution yesterday afternoon. The graduates were: Mary Jane Gill, Union Road, Mrs. Emma Eugene Johnson, Charlottetown, Floris Margaret Lannigan, Souris, West, Mary MacRae, Belfast, and Bertha Kathleen Robertson, East Baltic. The chairman of the Commission, Col. G. Elliott Full, presided and in brief introductory remarks commended the graduates on the step they had taken in the interest of the sick whom it was now their duty to serve to the best of their ability in a kind and efficient way. Miss Hazel L. Stearns, Dietitian pinned the emblem of their calling on each of the grad-

uates and Col. Full presented the coveted certificate of efficiency as each name was called. Premier A. W. Matheson spoke briefly expressing the hope that each graduate would find satisfaction in administering to the sick in the helpful manner called for in their training.

"Of the twenty thousand Canadians who are handicapped by blindness at least two thousand would have retained their sight had they been treated in the early stages of their difficulty," said Mr. R. J. Hill, Maritime Supervisor, Canadian National Institute for the Blind, in addressing the Rotary Club at the weekly meeting held in the Charlottetown Hotel yesterday.

"Twenty-five hundred blind persons from a single cause, Trauma, has brought vividly before the people of Canada and elsewhere, the need of care and early treatment of this insidious eye trouble, which as a rule is progressive in its inroads on sight," Mr. Hill said.

WEDNESDAY

The Sanderson and Borden Hereford herd of twenty-two top ranking animals are entraining for Amherst this morning to place in competition at the Maritime Winter Fair, Fulton Sanderson and Robert Borden, both of North River, owners of the herd, are optimistic about their entries which keen observers rate as possibly the strongest Hereford entry ever to leave the island.

Some of the best known bloodlines in America are in the herd, many of which have been consistent show "stoppers" on Maritime circuits, having won all major awards for several years past.

That St. Dunstan's Credit Union had added 115 new members during the past year and its assets now totalled \$117,669 were the highlights of information brought out at the annual meeting held last night in Holy Name Hall. The meeting was presided over by the president, Dr. J. C. Murphy.

In the report presented by him for the Board of Directors, Dr. Murphy said they had held 11 meetings in the past year and commented on the importance of the move of the headquarters to the new office on Great George Street. However, he noted that it meant increased expense.

He said he felt that there was a great need for an educational program and related how an effort had been made in this direction through contacts with new members. Of the increase in membership during the past year he said it was the greatest in recent years. Replying to a question from the floor he stated that since the move, assets had increased and later Lieut. Col. L. F. MacDonald, treasurer, said the increase had amounted to \$20,000 since last May.

THURSDAY

"The local unit is the important one," said Mr. Harry F. Smith, national president of the Junior Chamber of Commerce of Canada in addressing a dinner meeting of the Charlottetown chapter last evening at the Queen Hotel. Other speakers were vice president Lyman Purnell of Saint John, N.B., and Mr. E. D. Reid, President of the Charlottetown Board of Trade.

Mr. Smith continued, "This year our programme calls for an increase in membership, an effective speaking school in every club and executive Jaycee training."

"Control measures have resulted in steadily declining tuberculosis death rates and for the first time our sanatorium has not a long waiting list for admission," Mr. Sidney T. Green, president of the P. E. I. Tuberculosis League, stated in his report at the annual dinner meeting held yesterday at the Charlottetown.

However, he felt that preventive measures were not keeping up with developments in treatment as over 100 new active cases a year are being detected. But there were encouraging signs in the right direction in the increasing number of people being referred for x-rays by family physicians and public health nurses and the number of requests being received from organizations and businesses for the services of the x-ray unit.

One of the main features of a most interesting evening's program was a reading by Mrs. Gusie Bryant; P.N.G., who gave a brief resume of the charges and lectures of the Rebekah Degree.

Dr. Jean F. Webb, acting chief of the Division of Child and Maternal Health Department of National Health, Ottawa, arrived in the City yesterday for consultations with officials of the Provincial Department of Health and Welfare, as to how they can better improve the health conditions of mothers and children.

During her stay on the Island, Dr. Webb will visit hospitals, especially the maternity departments, and confer with physicians and the hospital staffs. She will also hold informal talks with Public Health nurses in the Province.

Island Beautification Society at their eighth annual dinner meeting held at the Charlottetown Hotel last night with over two hundred in attendance. Lt.-Col. E. W. Johnstone who presided, in his annual report as President said that while the number of entrants this year did not exceed that of last year, the officers and judges were greatly pleased with the improved over-all picture of country homes. "I attribute this," he said, "to the example set by neighbours throughout a district."

"In this Province with respect to Polio, we have been fortunate in two respects. First the number of cases during the past year has not been large and secondly that the victims of previous epidemics have been afforded treatment of a high standard in our Polio Clinic," were the words used by Mr. J. 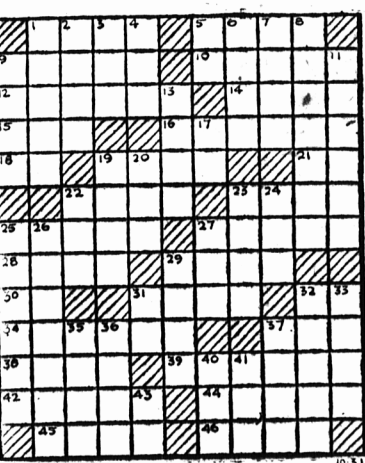
