HOME FOR INTERMENT.—The bodies of Frank Baldwin and James McInnis, of this Province, who were accidentally drowned at Groveton, N. H., on Monday, arrived in the city last evening and were this morning forwarded to St. Teresa's for interment. Patrick Baldwin, a brother of one of the deceased young men, accompanied the remains. It seems that Baldwin and McInnis were employed in a pulp mill at Groveton, and went swimming in the river near by. They had not been long in the water when Baldwin showed signs of drowning. McInnis at once went to his assistance, and the two lost their lives. Both bodies were recovered shortly after the disaster. Baldwin was 19 years of age and McInnis 23. The widowed mothers and other relatives of the young men have our sympathy in their affliction.

FROM MONTREAL.—The steamer Campana arrived from Montreal about nine o'clock this morning. Among the passengers, some of whom stop off here are Senator and Mrs Masson, Mr G H Bergeron, M. P., Judge Delorimie, Mrs George Redpath and the Misses Redpath. The Campana left port early this afternoon, and will return on Monday.

FIRE.—The dwelling house of F. L. Hazard, Esq., on Euston and O'Lebar streets, was damaged by fire this morning. The fire, which is believed to have been caused by electric wires, started in the cellar near the verandah, and by the time the firemen arrived it was well under way in the partition leading to the upper part of the house. The firemen, who were on the scene with all possible alacrity extinguished the fire not, however, before some damage was caused by water and the cutting of the walls to admit of getting at the seat of trouble. The house has been closed for several days past, Mr. Hazard and family being at Bellevue. The damage caused by the fire is covered by insurance.
