

Local and Other Items.

SNOW.—They had an inch of snow in Fredericton on Tuesday morning.

ISLAND HORSES.—A large number of Island horses went west this afternoon en route for the United States market.

SUPREME COURT.—The Supreme Court met in Summerside on Tuesday, Mr. Justice Peters presiding. There are a good many civil cases to be tried.

ENTERPRISING.—The Annapolis Spectator, which suffered by fire some time ago, has resumed its former size and is as bright and newswy as ever.

SOLD.—We understand that Mr. W. S. McKie, of this city, has sold his trotting horse Telephone to an American gentleman for a handsome sum.

POLICE COURT.—Two drunks—Hugh McCarron and Frank Cavanagh—were fined \$6 or 20 days, and \$30 or 30 days, respectively; and a disorderly conduct case was adjourned till to-morrow.

A RAILWAY TOWN.—Truro has 22 conductors, 70 brakemen, 23 drivers, 28 firemen. Altogether there are some 250 railway employees, and the L. C. R. dispenses \$10,000 per month in wages to them.

NOT GUILTY.—The Coteau murder trial was concluded at Montreal on Tuesday afternoon, and the jury returned a verdict not guilty against Caza. The announcement was received with wild applause and cheering which the efforts of the officers of the court could not subdue for several minutes.

CIVIC.—The Summerside Town Council election took place on Monday last, resulting as follows: Manson, 268; Campbell 208; Doyle, 208; Compton, 203; Mills, 198; Baker, 193; Harrington, 180; Montgomery, 179. The six first named were accordingly declared elected.

RACES AT KINKORA.—John O'Ronaghan, Esq., desires to call attention to the grand day of trotting to be held on Kinkora Driving Park, on Oct. 9th. The Park is in good condition, and the races are nearly all filled. He expects all the races to be filled, and the best day of trotting ever held on Prince Edward Island.

GOING TO WORK.—Ottawa advices state that the department of militia has been advised by Col. Houghton, D. A. G., of Montreal district, that the Italians on the western sections of the Hereford railway are going to work, a settlement having been reached. The troops, however, will be kept under arms for a few days, as no word has reached the department of the condition of affairs on the eastern section.

LANNON WINS.—The much-talked-of fight between Joe Lannon, of Boston, (formerly of Charlottetown) and Jim Glynn, of Brooklyn, N. Y., came off at South Boston, a short time ago, and resulted in a decisive victory for the former. Both men were in excellent condition, Lannon tipping the scales at 185 pounds. Lannon fought with a rush from the start, his opponent standing up well, and doing some clever work. In the fifth round, Lannon struck Glynn a terrific left-hander in the face, which dazed him somewhat, and followed up his advantage with a shot from his right on the neck, that sent the Brooklyn representative to his corner, where he remained in a perfectly passive condition for about twenty seconds. When he regained his feet, Glynn asked, "Was I knocked out?" The referee rather thought he was, and decided that Lannon was the winner of the battle. The fight was for \$750. Lannon is highly esteemed by the sporting fraternity of Boston, many of whom predict that he is the coming champion. Joe himself is working hard for the coveted title. His greatest ambition is to win the championship, and exhibit the belt in his native city. If he does not succeed in doing so, it will not be because he did not try hard.

TELEGRAPHIC NEWS.

The Times-Parnell Affair.

LONDON, Oct. 3. It is reported that the Times has resolved, as it incurred great expense in bringing witnesses to London to testify in the O'Donnell trial, and as it is ready to pursue the same course in connection with the trial of Parnell against it for libel, which is to be tried in Scotland, it will not incur large expenses in appearing before the Parnell inquiry commission, but will simply supply evidence enough to justify the commission in summoning Parnell to the witness box to compel him to show his hand. The Times, it is said, will furnish the commission with notes of other witnesses whom the commission will be authorized to summon to testify.

Montreal Miscellany.

MONTREAL, Oct. 3. The Parisian, of the Allan Line, due here yesterday, is aground on the soft mud in Lake St. Peter and is being lightened. Neither ship nor passengers are in danger. Premier Mercier's action in issuing a proclamation giving effect to the veto in District Magistrate's Act, and his new proclamation constituting a new Magistrate's Court under the law of 1869, has caused surprise in legal circles, as it was expected he would bend to the inevitable and abolish the court altogether. Considerable trouble is likely to be experienced.

On the Brink of Starvation.

QUEBEC, Oct. 3. News from Moisie, 202 miles east of the Saguenay, is of the most appalling character. The whole population of the district is on the brink of starvation. The fisheries this season have signally failed. The crops, of no great account at any time, have also turned out badly, and the few provisions in the place are high in price. The unfortunate inhabitants do not know which way to turn for food and clothing. They are in a sad condition and winter has commenced. Their case is one of the severest hardships.

The Andover Tragedy.

ANDOVER, N. B., Oct. 3. This morning, the jury in the Tobique shooting case came into court after being locked up all night, and reported that they had agreed on a verdict of manslaughter with a recommendation to mercy. The prisoners did not seem much affected when the verdict was announced. They were remanded to jail until this afternoon, when they were brought into court and sentenced to fifteen years each in the penitentiary.

Late Ottawa News.

OTTAWA, Oct. 3. The decision in the Ellis contempt case has been reserved. On motion of Henry Q. C., the Preceptor case has been inscribed for hearing this term. The East Simcoe and Maitland election cases have been decided in favor of the sitting members, owing to the six months limitation clause. The Haldimand appeal is now in progress. A branch of the Scottish Home Rule Association was organized in Toronto last evening. A snow storm visited various parts of Ontario and Quebec last night. A special cable says: "Wiman's suppressed letter is published in all the papers and creates amusement in Canadian circles as letting the cat out of the commercial bag, showing that political union with the United States was the ultimate aim of Wiman's movement." The St. James' Gazette says that Wiman is very kind to give us early information as regards the invitation for Canada to sink her interests in the States.

The Election Void.

BRIGHTON, Ont., Oct. 3. Judge Burton this morning declared the East Northumberland election void, and Edward Cochrane, the Conservative sitting member, unseated—Cochrane to bear the costs.

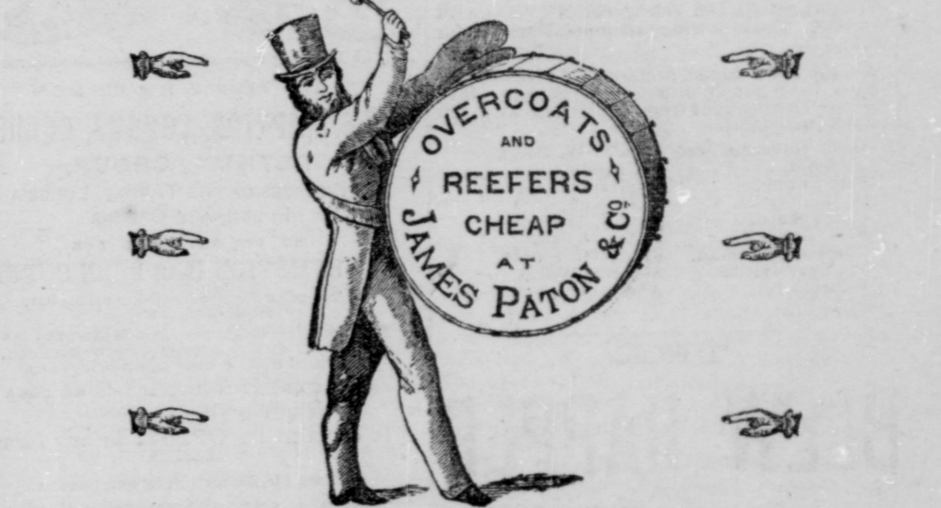
