I also pointed out that this man hadn't deprived them of anything but had created something out of nothing and it was only fair that he should maintain control of the fruits of his investment. I said to him: "You would not spend a thousand dollars to build a trout dam and then sit back and watch an army of fishermen move in an clean it as bare as the proverbial Mother Hubbard's cupboard."

It's strange how many people look at things. If a city feller rented a farm in the country that had lain dormant for years and put in a crop of potatoes, strawberries, fruit trees, etc. the residents of the district wouldn't feel that they had a right to move in and help themselves to whatever was growing on the land, yet on the other hand if a dam is built that proves highly successful from a fishing or shooting standpoint there are many who feel cheated if they're not allowed free access to the sport made available by another's foresight and cash outlay.

The dam I mentioned has cost the builder approximately one thousand dollars to date. A flash flood

before the bypass was completed washed it out and it had to be re-built a second time. Added to this extra unlooked for expense is the cost of a small club house and the yearly rental paid to the farmer for the privilege of using his land. It is not a large dam and would only stand public fishing for a short period.

This columnist is not in favour of the leasing of old established farms and natural ponds but feels that the more dams that are restored or built on virgin territory by private enterprise the better it will be for sport in general and will help maintain our shrinking water levels. Supposing for the sake of argument there are twenty-five private dams constructed this summer, this will result in lessening the fishing and hunting pressure on public areas. I am definitely not in favour of private enterprise building a dam and then holding it in reserve till public angling and hunting preserves are depleted. That has been done in the past but this practice, I am pleased to report, appears to be dying out.

There are many outdoorsman who holler for fishing and hunting grounds and yet are not willing to spend ten dollars to help achieve such a goal. Public angling and hunting pressure has increased at such a rate over the past few years that the only way a sportsman can be assured of healthful and remunerating outdoor sport is to create his own. The Provincial Department of Industry and Natural Resources contemplate stepping up their dam building program this coming season and new public sporting areas will be available in 1954.

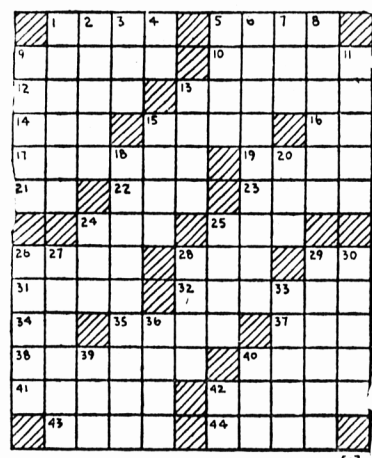
