GOVERNOR DEWDNEY, of the Northwest, has been sworn in at Ottawa, and is administering his government from that place. It is said he will not go to Battleford, but remain in Ottawa till the new capital is located on the line of the Pacific railway.

COLLISION ON THE I. C. RAILWAY.—Yesterday evening the "Truro" express and a special coal train collided north of Windsor Junction. A fireman named Cameron was killed, and Conductor Donkin injured. No passengers were seriously hurt, but the engines are badly smashed up.

SUDDEN DEATH.—The wife of Bradley J. Case, livery stable-keeper, St. John, N. B., drove over to Fairville Friday evening last, to attend a social. Just as she had finished removing her wraps in the dressing-room she fell dead on the floor. Heart disease was the cause.

The mail carrier who arrived at Georgetown from Murray Harbor yesterday, reports seeing the "Northern Light" in the ice between Murray Harbor and Cape George. He says there was open water between the steamer and Murray Harbor, but she was far into the ice close to the Cape George side of the Straits.

The "Religious Intelligencer" is the first St. John paper to come out strongly in favor of the adoption of the C. T. Act in that city. The "Intelligencer" rather faults the Baptist minister who, writing from "Mediac" to a denominational paper, wished that "the Scott Act was in the bottomless pit," or words to that effect.

WILLIAM O'SHAUGHNESSY's two and a half year old boy, of Ashland, got a raw bean into his windpipe last Saturday. Four doctors were in attendance more or less of the time until Wednesday, trying to get the bean out, but their efforts were unavailing, and the boy died. Two of the doctors, G. C. Pierce of Ashland, and J. J. McLean of Hopkinton, desired to perform tracheotomy, but the father objected.—Times.

A BIG CROP OF BIGAMISTS.—This is proving a good year for bigamists. The latest is reported at Ottawa. A baad doctor named Griffiths, a former partner of Dr. Orton, M. P., who is employed as temporary clerk in the Railway and Canals Department, has a wife in Western Ontario, from whom he has been living separately. A short time ago he married a young woman in Ottawa. Wife No. 1, hearing of it, has taken proceedings against him for bigamy.

To the Charitable of the Citizens of Charlottetown.

A great deal is said of local distress and starvation in the city. In passing down Dorchester street this evening, the most pitiable spectacle of suffering I ever met, was the Willow Rochester. On entering her home I found she had burned her bed and bedding and only a miserable bundle of straw remained in a corner of a room. There was nothing visible in the house to eat. This is a sad state of affairs in a civilized community. Let us strive to do something to remedy it. I gave the unfortunate victim, a sum sufficient to enable her to live a few days. It would be well for the authorities in the matter to have her removed to the Government almshouse or some other place, that she may be saved from the terrible death of starvation.

TELEGRAPHIC NEWS.

Special Dispatch to the Examiner.

OTTAWA, Feb. 7.

It is understood that the official report of the Pullman Car Snuggling Case will show that the Government has been systematically defrauded for years. It is probable that a heavy fine will be imposed. A short time ago a number of Pullman car conductors were dismissed for robbing the Company. One of these, it is said, gave information that the Company were systematically robbing the Government, and will now get satisfaction against the Company, and a considerable sum as an inducement.

The Edison Electric Light Co., who have applied for a charter in the Dominion Parliament, have reconsidered, and will place their patent in the control of local companies, under charter of the Provincial Legislatures.

Most of the Departmental Reports are ready for distribution at the opening of Parliament.

LONDON, Feb. 7.

Parliament assembled to-day. In the Commons Sir Stafford Northcote offered a motion that Bradlaugh be not allowed to swear, which was adopted, and after some discussion Bradlaugh withdrew.

Mr. Sexton, M. P., gave notice of a bill to repeal the Coercion Act. The Speaker read a letter from Mr. Forster, Chief Secretary for Ireland, informing him of the arrest of certain Irish members of the House.

Mr. Dwyer Gray, moved that the letter be referred to a Select Committee, citing precedents in support of his motion. He contended that the Coercion Act had been violated.

Mr. Gladstone opposed the motion which was finally rejected.

HALIFAX, Feb. 7.

The Bill for the Consolidation of Provincial railways passed the third reading in the House of Assembly this afternoon, and was sent to the Legislative Council.

CHICAGO, Feb. 7.

Fourteen new cases of small pox and six deaths yesterday.

Toronto was visited a few nights ago by a destructive blaze. The sufferers are Hay & Co. and P. D. Conger, whose conjoint losses will reach nearly \$80,000.

A Salvation Army procession was recently attacked by a Sheffield mob, and the leaders severely beaten, some eighteen or twenty being sent to the hospital.
