

# Boston Red Sox And Detroit Tigers Report "Million Dollar" Deal

 DETROIT, June 3—(AP)—The pennant-contending Boston Red Sox and the last place Detroit Tigers swapped nine players today in a "million dollar" deal that jolted the baseball world.

The trade, one of the biggest in the American League in years, shipped all-star third baseman George Kell and outfielder Hoot Evers to Red Sox. Tigers got slugger first baseman Walt Dropo, outfielder Don Lenhardt and infielder Johnny Pesky. They were the big names.

Red Sox also obtained Johnny Lipon. Tigers' regular shortstop, and relief pitcher Dizzy Trout. Boston recalled first baseman Dick Greent from Louisville to fill the first base gap.

In addition, Tigers acquired third baseman Fred Hatfield and pitcher Bill Wright.

Biggest surprise was Kell's departure. But general manager Charlie Gehringer said the Tigers said "the head" began helping us enough while we were in the cellar so we gave him up to get some long ball punch in Dropo and Lenhardt."

Kell, a \$42,000 player, led the American League in 1949, was second in 1950 and third in 1951. Kell, on the all-star team for the last five years, was batting .296 this

season.

Red Sox manager Lou Boudreau said Kell was to start tonight against Cleveland and Evers as soon as the speedy outfielder fully recovered from a broken thumb.

Tiger manager Red Rolfe said Pesky was to start at short, Dropo at first, Lenhardt in left field and Hatfield at third in Philadelphia tonight in the biggest shakeup the Tigers line-up has felt in years.

Both clubs hailed the deal as beneficial.

"I'd call it a million dollar deal," said Gehringer. "Kell would probably have brought a quarter million himself if anybody wanted to spend cash for a baseball player."

"Our immediate aim was to get Kell," said Boudreau. "Now we've got a set ball club, something we didn't have before."

General manager Joe Cronin of the Red Sox said the deal would help both clubs.

Gehringer said the trade almost fell through after Lenhardt cracked a base-loaded home run yesterday to give the Red Sox a 6-2 10-inning victory over Chicago. But he and Cronin talked some more and finally worked it up.

The Tigers sent promising young Dick Littlefield, a lefthanded pitcher, to their Buffalo farm club to make room for the additional player gained in the trade.

# New York Giants In 17-4 Victory Over Cubs

 New York Giants twice batted clear around in successive six-run innings and clubbed 17 hits Tuesday to crush Chicago Cubs 17-4 and end a three-game National League losing streak.

The Giants, who had lost five of their previous six games, included a two-run homer by Wes Westrum, three triples and three doubles in their massacre of four Cub tossers.

The slugfest made it easy for righthander Jim Hearn to achieve his fifth victory against one loss by scattering nine hits.

Giant leadoff batter Dave Williams scored four times. He walked three times, doubled and singled.

New York caved in the roof on Cub starter Joe Hatten with a five-hit, six-run assault in the fourth.

Johnny Klippstein, who relieved Hatten in the fourth, fared no better in the fifth when the Giants made it six tallies again, this time on six hits.

All other major league action was at night. In the American League, Detroit was playing at Philadelphia, Cleveland at Boston, Chicago at New York and St. Louis at Washington. In the National League, Brooklyn was at Pittsburgh, Philadelphia at Cincinnati and Boston at St. Louis.

SYDNEY, N.S., June 3—(CP)—The Sydney Community hockey club will hold a meeting this week to study the plight of Sydney Millionaires, once the giants of Maritime hockey who trailed badly in the Maritime Major Hockey League last season.

Present indications are that Millionaires, far in debt, will operate as a team this year but not in the Maritime circuit, it was reported tonight. They would be interested in a Nova Scotia league.

A meeting of the M.M.H.L. is scheduled to be held at New Glasgow next Sunday.

"Lefty" MacAleer is slated to start on the mound today when the Maritime Central Airways team meet the Curran and Briggs Juniors in Summerside. It was learned from M.C.A. coach Earl Goss last night. Should the Boston Red Sox go into a slump it might be advisable for manager Lou Boudreau, general manager Joe Collins and owner Tom Yawkey to take a quickie train-out-of-Boston. Before yesterday's big deal which saw five Boston players go to Detroit in exchange for four Tigers, the Red Sox were leading the league by four percentage points and had been playing pretty good, probably even surprising ball.

Lou Boudreau was on the air yesterday evening about an hour before the game between the Sox and the Indians got underway and expressed the following opinions about the deal. The trade was made, he said, to give the Sox better balance and to strengthen them for the tough stretch drive in September. During the month of September, the Red Sox play only six games at home. Obviously the Sox wanted players who could hit in places where Fenway Park. Don Lenhardt, for example, could only hit in Boston where he had a short wall to aim for.

George Kell was the big man in the deal with his sharp line drives. Boudreau admitted that Kell fields very well but not as good as Freddy Hatfield, third baseman who went to Detroit. Evers, who has not played this year on account of a thumb injury, is a sort of question mark but if he shows near his 1949-50 form he will be a great aid to the Sox. He will be used in left and centre field. Lipon will be used as a utility man to spell off Junior Stephens while Dizzy Trout will do relief pitching and help out the over-worked Ivan DeLoek.

Dick Gernie, who played with Kentville two years ago, will take over the first base job as soon as his injured thumb permits. In speaking of the players who left Boston Boudreau stated that it was a tough decision to have to trade them. Pesky and Dropo were as close to me as anyone on the team, he stated. "The five players gave me 100% and I know they will help the Tigers."

WINNIPEG, June 3—(CP)—The Royal Canadian Golf Association announced today that top prize in the 1952 Canadian open golf championship July 16-19 will be \$3,000, an increase of \$750 over last year's first money.

Balance of the \$15,000 total prize money will be spread among 34 players. The last two places get \$100 each instead of the \$50 and \$50 paid in 1951.

Recent entries indicate a strong field for the classic to be played at Winnipeg's St. Charles Country Club. These include Al Bessellink, Chicago, who stands eighth in the 1952 list of pro golf money-winners; Fred Hawkins, El Paso, Texas, who tied Ben Hogan for seventh spot in the 1952 Masters tournament; Ansel Snow, Myrtle Beach, Calif. Earl Stewart, Jr., Fort Wayne Ind.; Art Wall, Jr., Chicago.

Hawkins finished in a second place tie in the 1951 Canadian open, two strokes behind winner Jim Ferrier.

HELSINKI, Finland, June 3—(AP)—Russia today announced it would participate in the summer Olympics here, thus bringing to a close months of speculation on whether the Soviets would send teams.

The only sport the Russians will not participate in is field hockey, a women's sport.

The announcement did not come as a complete surprise because the Russians have been attending most Olympic meetings and are members of most international federations—a requisite for participation in the games.
